Migrant Rush To California Starts

FRESNO, Cal.—Migrant families are arriving in the Fresno district of California's San Joaquin Valley at the rate of approximately 100 families a month, Austin V. Harper, district supervisor of the rural resettlement division of the farm security administration reported.

Harper found few if any of the migrant workers with sufficient training to qualify them for defense jobs.

He said his record showed 20 per cent of applicants for aid came to California from Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Missouri. He declared nearly one-half of the families applying for aid had spent from one to three years in Arizona before continuing on to California.

Harper said he believed the continued flow of migrant families to California was due to widely circulated reports of a boom in California's defense industries, with consequent high number of available jobs.

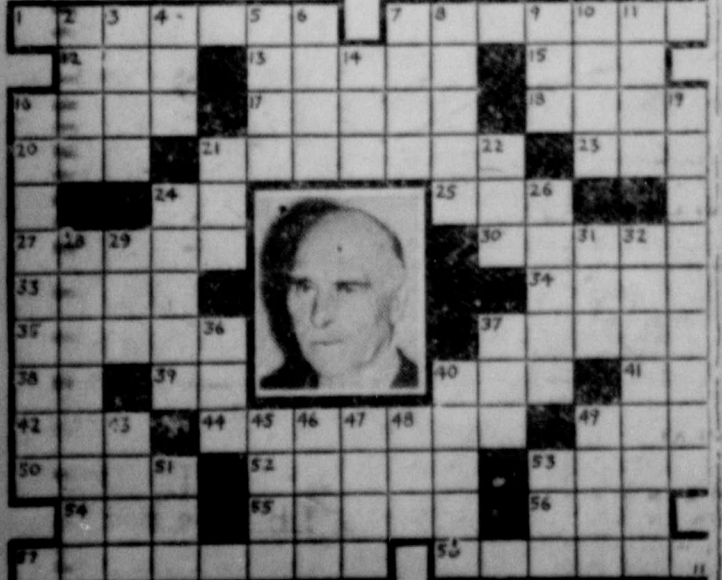

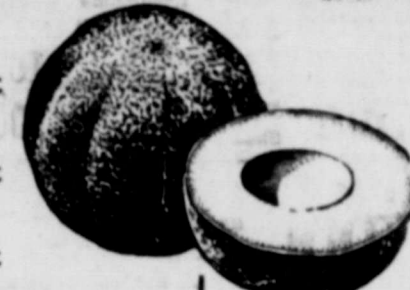

Stern Rationing In British Prisons Is Being Urged

LONDON—Convicts who enjoy luxuries beyond the reach of the ordinary civilian may have a few meatless days if the suggestion of a prison officer, writing in the current issue of The Prison Officers' Magazine, is put into effect.

"Surely it would not hurt these fellows any more than it does us," he writes, "and remember, too, that one prisoner gets as much cheese in one week as I am able to get—eight ounces for four of us in a fortnight."

"In our prison of a daily average population of 120, I have seen seven cheeses, of 70 pounds in weight, go during one week."

"Meat also is a problem to us and all outside, but the meat that goes into our institution does not seem to indicate that there is any scarcity at all."

Glacier Priest Is Sure Alaska Is Natural Defense

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah.—Famed "glacier priest" Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard is convinced that Alaska's rugged mountains and violent storms offer the United States a "perfect" bulwark against invasion from Asia—and at the same time the best base for offensive action abroad.

In Salt Lake City recently on a vacation from his multiple duties as scientist, explorer and now

civilian defense advisor for the army, Father Hubbard scoffed at the theory America could be invaded either through Alaska or the Aleutian islands in the Pacific.

"Alaska," he said, "is the logical stepping stone for mass flights of American warplanes across Asia and Europe."

"But, with the United States in control of all possible airdromes as well as strategic harbors in

Alaska and the Aleutians, any military movement in the opposite direction would be extremely hazardous. A major air movement over Alaska's storm-swept mountains would be virtual suicide for an attacking force."

Father Hubbard said Alaska could be dominated, by whatever force reached it first—and the U. S. Army, already in control, "can hold it against any combination of enemies."

Harbor Homes A Puzzle For Canada

VANCOUVER, B. C.—If Canadian wartime authorities decide to close Vancouver harbor, as they have in Halifax, they're first going to have to do something about the "floating population."

More than 500 people call Vancouver harbor home. They live in houseboats and in cottages and shacks built on rafts. There are several clusters of them—some of them mere floating shantytowns huddled together in helter-skelter fashion, and others neat and attractive, occupied by average wage earners who would rather live on the water than anywhere else.

The "Fifth Avenue" of these

communities is in Coal harbor, an arm of the main harbor formed by the lee of the Stanley Park peninsula.

There the houseboats are arranged in neat rows, connected by well-built wooden "streets" built on huge logs. The boats are equipped with running water, electricity and telephone service.

Occupants of these houseboats don't have to worry about real estate taxes—there's no tax on a tract of water.

All they have to pay for the privilege of living there (presuming they own the houseboat) is a mooring fee. This may vary from \$3 to \$12 a year. The national harbors board gets a percentage of this revenue.

Apart from the Coal harbor community, however, the floating houses present a crazy scene similar to the sump settlements in Shanghai. Many of them are left

high and dry when the tide goes out, and the Salthuck mud gives off a high odor. The rats are plentiful.

In the past year, the city has been making a drive to clean up these "floating slums," but has been handicapped by the fact that most of the people living in them could not afford to pay rent for an ordinary flat ashore. Squatters' shacks along the harbor front have been torn down, but most of the "floaters" still are sticking it out.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas secondary school and college officials who will have charge of the NYA Student Work program next year will be in a much better position to serve the young people employed on NYA part-time jobs in their institutions as a result of the NYA information program concluded this week, which was sponsored by 34 Texas colleges in cooperation with the State NYA School Work Council, J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator, said today.

An estimated 5,000 summer school students, including scores of school officials and educators, were reached by Council members and NYA personnel through class lectures, individual conferences, and open forums, during which both the NYA Student Work and Out-of-School Work programs

were discussed. Members of the Council spent considerable time away from their own work or to participate in the program. Chairman John P. Austin, former Robinson county superintendent; A. F. W. Bell County superintendent; Comstock, Dallas, principal North Dallas high school; Foster, Longview, school superintendent; J. Houston, director of schools; G. B.
