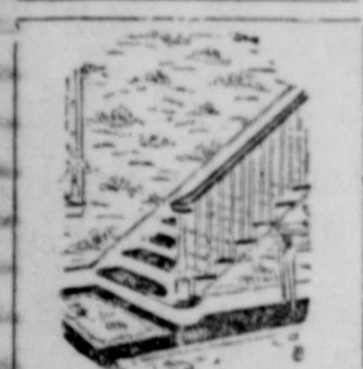

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BONDS

THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF RANGER, CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS. TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 15th day of August, 1941, at the City Hall in the City of Ranger, Texas, to determine whether or not the Commission of the City of Ranger, Texas, shall be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City, in the sum of THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$35,000.00), for the following purposes: To improve, extend, and repair the City's sewer system, including the purchase of equipment and appliances and the acquisition of full rights pertaining to said sewer system, and which election was duly called and ordered by that certain Ordinance of the City Commission of the City of Ranger, Texas, passed and adopted by said City Commission on the 15th day of July, 1941, and which Ordinance is made a part of this Notice and is in words and figures as follows: TO WIT:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS, SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, THE PROPOSITION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BONDS, TO THE AMOUNT OF THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$35,000.00), BEARING INTEREST AT THE RATE OF FOUR PER CENT (4 PER CENT) PER ANNUM AND MATURING REGULARLY OVER A PERIOD OF SEVEN (7) YEARS FROM THEIR DATE, AND THE PROVISIONS OF SUCH BONDS SHALL BE USED TO IMPROVE, ENLARGE, EXTEND AND REPAIR THE CITY'S SEWER SYSTEM, INCLUDING THE PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT AND APPLIANCES AND THE ACQUISITION OF FULL RIGHTS PERTAINING TO SAID SEWER SYSTEM, SUCH BONDS TO BE PAID AS TO BOTH PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST FROM AND SECURED BY AN ENCLAVING FIRST LIEN ON AND PLEDGE OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT THE HOLDER OR HOLDERS OF SUCH BONDS, IF AUTHORIZED AND ISSUED, SHALL NEVER HAVE THE RIGHT TO DEMAND PAYMENT THEREOF OUT OF ANY FUNDS RAISED OR TO BE RAISED BY TAXATION; DESIGNATING THE PLACE FOR HOLDING SUCH ELECTION AND NAMING THE OFFICERS THEREFOR; PRESCRIBING THE QUALIFICATIONS OF THE VOTERS WHO WILL BE AUTHORIZED TO VOTE AT SUCH ELECTION; PRESCRIBING THE FORM OF SUCH ELECTION; ENACTING PROVISIONS INCIDENT AND RELATING TO THE SUBJECT AND PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Commission of the City of Ranger, Texas, deems it necessary and advisable to issue the revenue bonds of said City, in the total amount of THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$35,000.00), for the following purposes: To improve, extend, and repair the City's sewer system, including the purchase of equipment and appliances and the acquisition of full rights pertaining to said sewer system, and; WHEREAS, the fact that the City of Ranger is now without an adequate sewer system constitutes an emergency measure for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety of the City, and the citizens, demanding that the charter provisions requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting and requiring their publication, be suspended, and such provisions or rules of the charter are hereby suspended, and that this ordinance become effective immediately upon its passage and approval. PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this 15th day of July, 1941.

SECTION 5: That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, who own taxable property in said City, who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 6: All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BONDS" and those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BONDS."

Navy Improves On Its Harbor Nets

SAN FRANCISCO—Working almost unnoticed, 250 officers and men from the 12th U. S. Naval District are solving problems of great importance to national defense.

Working with a crane, a few buildings on a hillside overlooking San Francisco Bay, three boats, a field for weaving nets, several thousand anchors and 100 miles of

heavy steel wire, these men are fashioning defenses which ultimately will be used in every major U. S. harbor as protection against submarine and mosquito boat attack.

Called the California City Naval Net Depot and Training Station—a school specializing in the science of trapping submarines in steel nets—the situation started from scratch, inasmuch as the science of submarine defense was found to be greatly lacking when a U-boat pierced the "wonderful" British battleship Royal Oak.

New type nets are being de-

veloped, as are new systems of laying them and keeping them in position.

The nets are woven by cables in sections and are stored. When they are to be put to use, the sections are joined by a large clamp.

A crane lifts them out of the water's edge and anchors are attached to pull them down to the proper depths. Floats hold the nets while they are being towed to their positions and later serve as markers.

The nets are being tested now for their resistance to swift currents, under the direction of Commander S. M. Haight, an Annapolis graduate, class of 1918, who has commanded submarines and destroyers.

If it should become necessary, the nets will be set to catch enemy craft. Two vessels will be on guard above the nets. Between

Axis Held Together With Haywire

What holds the Axis together? Is it hope of loot? Is it sheer overawing of Italy and Japan by the superior force of Germany? Is it desperation born of the thought of "What if we lose?" Is it a vast mutual international inferiority complex?

Maybe it's simpler than any of these. Maybe it's just haywire.

Recent publicity efforts of the Axis powers suggest that the strain of the past 10 years has been too much, and that the much-vaunted ingenuity of Axis propaganda has exhausted itself and gone completely haywire.

If there is anything that a super-race and its super-by-courtesy hangers-on must never do, it is to appear ridiculous. Yet if anything could be more ridiculous than some of the recent efforts of Signor Gayda and the pupils of Dr. Goebbels, it would be hard to find it.

The Italian government-controlled newspapers are all sympathetic with the thought that the United States by its conduct is risking war. It is deeply concerned by the thought that American boys may be asked to continue military training for more than a year. For a country which was pitch-forked into war by a single leader and without the ghost of a reason, a country whose every male child is from the age of 5 subjected to rigorous military training all of his life, such comments are so ridiculous as to result only in a long horse-laugh.

The crocodile tears of a Berlin paper, which charges that President Roosevelt is "circumventing the rights of Congress, are equally ludicrous. It is hilarious for a country which threw its own Congress completely out the window eight years ago to take this stand in relation to an incident in which every American child of 7 knows that the President has put the issue squarely up to Congress.

Two countries which have openly avowed their intention to put an end to "decadent-democracies" shed crocodile tears over the rights of democratic citizens and the functioning of freely elected democratic legislative bodies? It is to laugh.

The object of the propaganda services of totalitarian countries is not to make other people laugh. When the telegraph wires in the lands of the barbed wire go haywire, it's time to look for short circuits.

The leather in saddles goes into shock and belts for the Army, Navy and Marine corps; the metal in hairpins, razor blades telephones and fountain pens is destined for bombers ad attack planes. Mattresses, long underwear, woolen socks and batteries are consigned to the War Navy department. Cork and rope and twine of all kinds are scarce because the chemicals of which they are made are essential to defense production. A hard winter, you say? These winter Saturday nights are going to be fine for the country boys because according to defense contracts officials, "you won't be able to buy a washtub within 90 days."

New Hampshire Is Seeking a Revival Of Fish Industry

DURHAM, N. H.—Though it has the shortest coastline of any coastal state, New Hampshire once had a \$1,000,000 saltwater fishing industry. The industry virtually is non-existent now, but two University of New Hampshire professors—C. Floyd Jackson and Herbert Warfel—believe the industry can be re-established. Preliminary surveys, they say, indicate that modernization of fishing and marketing methods, control of shore pollution and reclamation of waste fish would make the state's coastal city of Portsmouth one of the nation's leading fishery centers.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., July 31.—Mounting lions, weasels, coyotes and bobcats are dying out because of the work of the Predatory Animals and Rodent Control Association.
Association agents claimed today they have killed 15,000 of the state's larger undesirable animals by trapping, shooting, poisoning and other methods.
The casualty list include 12,912 coyotes, most numerous of the predators; 2,068 bobcats; 839 wolves, and 24 mountain lions.
Rodents were exterminated "by the thousands," the Association announced, and prairie dog towns and gopher-infested areas are being cleaned out or controlled.
Best hunting for the bigger game was in Hudspeth county where 1,123 predatory animals were taken. Zavala county was second with 1,049 captured or killed. The greatest number of bobcats—41 per cent were taken in four western counties. Culberson, Hudspeth, Presidio and Jeff Davis.
Texas farmers, ranchers and business men are able to operate more economically and with less danger from disease because of the predatory and rodent control program, Association officials said.

Closing Of Era Of Hired Man Nears

By United Press
EAST LANSING, Mich.—Economists of Michigan State College believe that the one-time backbone of the nation's farms—the hired man—is on his way to obsolescence.

Many reasons are listed for their contention. It is pointed out that mechanized equipment, such as mowers and milkers, are doing most to make the hired man's help unnecessary.

In addition, economists point out that the draft and the lure of higher wages in cities' stepped-up production industries are discouraging any apprenticeships on farms.

Speaking at one of the general assemblies of the annual Farmers Week on the campus, I. E. Baker, social economist of the Federal Department of Agriculture, said that a survey of 1,000 farms in Blackford county of Indiana showed only fifty hired men.

He attributed the drop in farm hands in Indiana to the fact that both the daughters and sons of the farmers are migrating to the city.

Prof. E. B. Hill of the college, in another speech during the Farmers Week, said that in the
