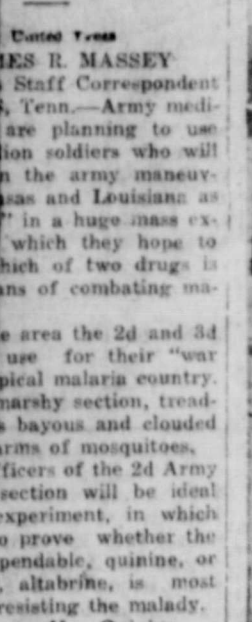

Aims of Ranger Junior College

By Dr. G. C. Boswell, President
Ranger Junior College proposes to serve the people. One of its chief aims is the advancement of understanding to disseminate knowledge and culture, and stimulate search for truth. Another is preparation for life, to train for citizenship and fit each individual for some useful vocation. A third aim is the cultivation of aesthetic, ethical, and spiritual values of life, to appreciate the beautiful, inculcate the highest moral standards and to propagate spiritual ideals.

Ranger Junior College opens its sixteenth annual session on September 8. It is one of 22 municipal junior colleges in Texas. There are only two other institutions of its kind within a radius of one hundred miles or more from Ranger. Thus, Ranger Junior College is able to offer two years of standard fully accredited college work to students of Central West Texas at a lower cost than other colleges of this section.

Ranger Junior College serves three specific objectives. First, it serves as a preparatory school for senior colleges by offering the required courses for the first two years leading toward higher degrees. Closely allied to this function is that of giving introductory or exploratory courses in the main fields of education and human endeavor to students who have not yet decided upon their life's work. The third aim and function of the college is to furnish a degree of cultural or vocational and specialized training, that is, a terminal education to those who for any reason cannot or will not extend their formal education more than two years above the high school.
