20,000 Youths In Texas Will Receive NYA Student Aid

AUSTIN.—During the 1941-42 school year the National Youth Administration Student Work program will enable approximately twenty thousand Texas young people between the ages of 16 and 24, inclusive, to stay in school, according to J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator.

Allocations have been made to the 254 counties and directly to schools in cities having populations of 25,000 or more. Many of the county placement committees already have met, and their recommendations for allotments of NYA Student Work jobs to schools now are being received in this office.

Wife Killer, 58, Near Last Mile

McALESTER, Okla.—Warren Abby, 58-year-old Oliver, Ia., farmer, is scheduled to die Aug. 29 in the McAlester penitentiary electric chair for the slaying almost two years ago near Clinton of his 78-year-old wife, whom he met through a matrimonial advertisement.

Only Governor Leon Phillips can save Abby with an act of executive clemency and Phillips has refused thus far in his administration to halt an execution. The criminal court of appeals affirmed the death sentence and refused to grant Abby a rehearing. He was charged with murdering his wife, Julia Abby, October 16, 1939, on the roadside between Bridgeport and Clinton.

The two had met through a matrimonial advertisement and were secretly married Jan. 26, 1936. Mrs. Abby continued to operate a drug store at Cherry Valley, Ark., and Abby operated a cooperative farm in Louisiana. Late in 1939, Mrs. Abby sold her drug store for \$1,500. She paid off the mortgage on Abby's farm and the two decided to go to California after disposing of the rest of her property in Arkansas. Mrs. Abby owned stock in a zinc company, but when they attempted to sell it they found it was worth only a fraction of the \$10,000 at which she had valued it.

They started for California, however, spending the first night at a tourist camp near Bridgeport. They left the camp before dawn and Abby killed his wife about 6 a. m.

He struck her on the head and body eight times with an iron rod that had been placed in the automobile during their trip. Abby decided to tell officials that she had been struck by a hit and run driver while he was repairing a tire on his car.

He carried her body to Clinton and told the story to officers. They went to the scene of her death, however, and in a field found the rod with which he had struck her. Abby confessed to the slaying and pleaded "self defense" and "insanity" at his trial.

He testified that he struck his wife once and that everything went black and that he did not realize that he had hit her seven other times. The jury and Judge B. B. Barefoot, presiding over the criminal court of appeals, refused to accept the theory and gave him the maximum sentence.

"The jury," Judge Barefoot stated in the courts' opinion, "was justified in finding that this marriage to the deceased was because he believed she had valuable property and could be used by him in carrying out his cooperative farming scheme."

Old License To Wed Has Curious Phrasing of Words

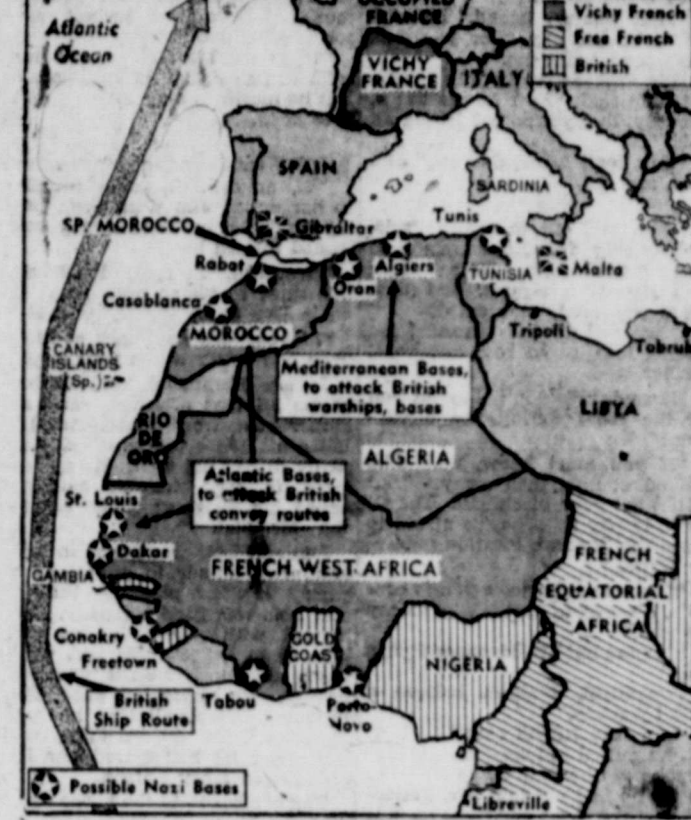
MONTGOMERY, Ala.—The following marriage license was uncovered in Sumpter county, dated early in the last century.

Reporter-Private Tells of Experiences While Training With U. S. Air Force

Editor's note: Private Groff, a graduate of the Pulitzer School of Journalism, Columbia University, and former reporter for the Buffalo Evening News, is now on duty at Will Rogers Field, new U. S. Army light bombardment base. The following is by Private Groff on "Life in the U. S. Air Force."

Private, U. S. Army Air Force—OKLAHOMA CITY.—Our platoon was marching along the road on the way back to Will Rogers Field when suddenly the drill sergeant blew a shrill blast on his whistle.

"Gas," someone muttered. We held our breaths, whipped out our masks, stripped them over our heads, blew hard to expel any gas, sucked in air to see if the masks were properly adjusted, then settled down to the pace again.

We strode in silence. Going up an incline the nose-piece flaps fluttered faster, wheezing in protest. A bomber flew low overhead. The sergeant blew again, this time twice. We scattered along the road like leaves before a gust.

Prone in dusty grass we lay until he gave another signal. As the plane grew smaller in the sky we went back on the road again.

"Boots, boots, boots," the man beside me canted into his rubber mask, as though to himself. The muffled recitation made me grin.

Another blast on the whistle now, and we all bent our heads to the ground, letting in a small breath to test the air.

"Gas all gone," said one as he pulled off the masks, as though he were making a joke, which, in fact he was. This was of course no sham. We were practicing defense against chemical agents and plane strafing.

As we walked we held the gas masks in our hands to let them dry. Perspiration trickled from some, from others, spilled.

By now we were at the gates of the post.

"Where is it?" the leader of another platoon asked our sergeant.

"Behind the hospital," the sergeant said.

He got questioning looks from the men in the ranks but he only smiled.

SOVIET OK OF PLAN SOUGHT; JAPS ANGERED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Secretary of State Cordell Hull said today that he hoped all civilized nations of the world, including Soviet Russia, will rally around the Roosevelt-Churchill program for destruction of Nazi tyranny and the new world order.

Hull's expression was made in response to press conference questions as to whether he would welcome endorsement of the eight-point peace aims by the Soviet Union.

TOKYO, Aug. 15.—The Tokyo press today denounced the eight-point program formulated by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill as tantamount to a declaration of war aimed to weaken Japan.

One newspaper warned that Japan would be prepared "for the worst eventuality."

West Texas Fair At Abilene Will Start Sept. 29th

ABILENE.—The annual West Texas Fair will be held here September 29 to October 4. Roscoe Blankenship, president of the Fair Association, announced today.

Premium lists will total approximately \$5,000, an increase over a year ago. Blankenship said in announcing plans now nearing completion for the nineteenth annual renewal of the event.

Third annual Texas Palomino show will be held under supervision of the Texas Palomino Association, with W. B. Mitchell as president, and premiums totaling \$600 are to be awarded.

An innovation this year will be a Quarter Horse Show, to be held under regulations prescribed by the American Quarter Horse Association. Premiums will total \$300.

The Hereford division heads the premium list with a total of \$750, an increase over a year ago. D. H. Jefferies is show chairman for this division.

Other new classes for livestock will be added, and an elaborate entertainment program will set a new high, said Grover Nelson, fair manager.

Nick Stuart and his nationally known band, Stars Over Broadway, a glamorous review before the grandstand nightly, and the Texas exposition shows will headline the entertainment.

In the livestock departments, sheep and goat division will include classes for Rambouillet, feeder lambs, Southdowns, Hampshires and Angoras.

Department superintendents, named by Blankenship, include Knox Farr, livestock; J. L. Moore, agriculture; Pat Cooper, poultry; L. R. Higginbotham, FFA and 4-H Clubs; Hattie Tarker, home demonstration and 4-H girls; Mrs. John Drensen, women's department.

The fair dates were set this year in advance of the October dates for the annual State Fair of Texas, in Dallas, Blankenship said. The two conflicted last year.

With weeks to go, inquiries about the fair and exhibit space are setting the fastest pace in years, Fair Manager Nelson said.

Country Club Is To Serve Watermelon On Monday Night

Plans worked out by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill for harder blows against the axis began tak- ing shape today with immediate emphasis on bolstering the Red Army against Hitler's armed forces.

Maintenance of the Eastern Front against the renewed drives of the German forces and checking any Japanese move to interfere with war aid to Russia was probably emphasized in the joint message to Josef Stalin of Russia. The message was said to pave the way for dispatch of high American and British missions to discuss short and long term aid plans with Soviet leaders in Moscow.

Authoritative comment in London indirectly warned Japan to avoid any attempt to interrupt the British-American war shipments across the Pacific to Russia, because Britain intended to "do her best" to deliver the goods, regardless of any blockade of Vladivostok.

British authorities put the greatest emphasis on parts of the Roosevelt-Churchill talks dealing with aid to Russia and precautions against Japanese moves in the Far East, although the presence of high naval officers at the conference illustrated the attention given to still greater improvement in the methods of protecting British convoys in the Battle of the Atlantic.

German claims of "ceaseless pursuit" of the Red Army in the Ukraine indicated the need for speed, although the Russians said they still were defending Odessa and Nikolaev and the main forces were falling back intact in orderly retreat to new lines on the Dnieper River and that they were still defending the Soviet war industries.

Two Texans Are Killed In Crash Of Ferry Plane

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Two Texans were among the 12 Americans killed yesterday in a crash of an Atlantic ferry plane taking off for the United States. This was the second disaster of this kind in England in the past six days.

Twenty-two persons, including Arthur Purvis, 51, head of the British purchasing commission to the United States, died in the latest crashup.

Casualties included Capt. W. L. (Buster) Trimble of Fort Worth and Capt. E. B. Anding of Rosebud.

60-Car Freight Is Wrecked, Burned Near Brownwood

BROWNWOOD, Aug. 15.—Thirty-two cars of a 60-car Santa Fe Railroad freight train derailed today and an unestimated amount of goods was damaged when fire broke out after gasoline spilled from two tank cars.

Railroad officials said the cause of the derailment had not been determined. They said that the fire, which was still burning late this morning, hampered work of wreckers crews seeking to clear the rails.

Cold Won't Prevent A Bond Conference

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—Gov. Coke R. Stevenson suffered today from a severe cold which he contracted on a two-day trip to Junction, but his office announced that a conference with county officials will be held as scheduled this afternoon.

Place of the meeting will likely be changed to the executive mansion, it was stated, because of the governor's slight illness.

Pastor At Cisco To Resign Sept. 1

Rev. Luther Pryor, pastor of the Cisco Nazarene church for the past 14 years, has resigned his pastorate to accept a call by the church at Durger. He plans to take his new position Sept. 1.

No Escaping the Consequences

As fervently as anybody, we wish the world were so constituted that we didn't have to decide things. If we could just rock along in some kind of Golden Age languor, letting things work themselves out, convinced that everything would be all right somehow without our deciding anything, that would be dandy.

This is a cold iron-and-steel world, however. It is a world in which we have had the most conclusive demonstrations that the most dangerous thing of all is just to settle back lazily and drift.

Right now, for instance, Congress has the responsibility of deciding whether to break up the army built thus far and start building a new one, or to hold the present establishment intact until there is a change for the better in the conditions that dictated building that army in the first place.

It is an unpleasant decision. Some people will be displeased either way. But Congress has often complained that authority was being taken off its hands by the executive. With authority goes responsibility. In this matter, it has both, and the people will hold its members responsible for the consequences of its decision.

Every man, woman, and child has the same responsibility, in proportion to his or her influence and power; and in a democracy no person is without power. Every person ought to make his or her decision on national policy. And each decision bears responsibility for its consequences.

Should the United States resolutely bear down on every course of action that will help to defeat the Nazi aggressors? Those who believe and urge that, bear potential responsibilities; we might get into a war with all its horrors; we might become involved in the realignment of a Europe we do not know how to realign; we might achieve other unforeseen results, mostly evil.

Should the United States draw back from active aid to those who resist aggression; pull back to a static defense of this continent, indifferent to what may happen in the rest of the world? Because the immediate consequences of this view are less apparent, some like to kid themselves that it is without consequences. Yet that decision implies taking this chance: if the Germans and Japanese win, break up the British fleet and empire, restrict according to will all U. S. contacts with the rest of the world, foment Nazi revolutions in half of South America, they might then force a war into which Americans would have to be flung with an even year's training, whether that proved adequate or not, whether the outposts were adequately manned or not.

Yet those consequences, either way, must be faced; the only unpardonable course is to advocate a line of conduct, thinking and hoping against all reason that it will have no consequences at all.

Either decision today could be wrong; that is the hard thing about decisions, they could be wrong. Either decision implies future possibilities that are unpleasant.

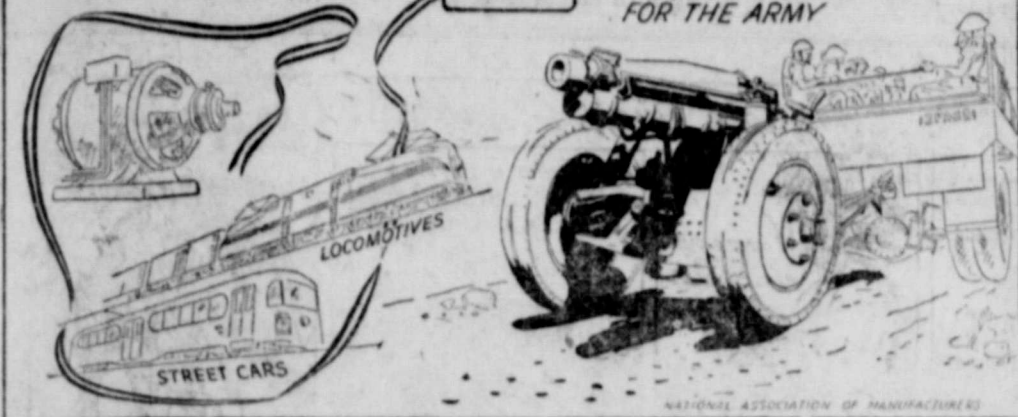
