RAIN DEATH TOLL NEARS DOZEN MARK

DUNKIRK, Ohio, Nov. 10.—The toll of dead in the wreck of the Pennsylvania Railway express train near here today stood at 12, with more than 59 wounded, with the toll expected to rise even higher.

The Chicago-New York express was traveling along near Dunkirk late Sunday night, when the cylindrical head of a freight train blew off and landed in the tracks in front of the swiftly moving express.

Before the train could be stopped the engine had been derailed, and knocked over a signal tower and had plowed along for 200 yards. More than a quarter of million dollars in damage was done in the wreck, it was estimated today, after traffic had been resumed on the main line.

Company officials stated that an inquiry would likely be held Thursday.

NAZIS BEGIN NEW ASSULT AGAINST REDS

The German forces in front of Leningrad and Moscow have begun a renewed offensive, the Russians admitted today, with fresh Nazi troops being thrown into the apparent effort to encircle Moscow.

Red Army communique, however, reported that the Nazis were still stalled all along the Eastern Front, and stated that the Red Army was ready for any renewed efforts to capture either of the two principal cities.

The Germans, meantime, announced that they had widened the breach in the Soviet defenses upon the Crimean Isthmus.

Russian sources stated today that the Nazi drive upon Moscow was still stalled and that severe weather prevailed throughout the northern part of the front. Germany was quiet regarding operations in front of Moscow.

CHURCHILL WARNS JAPS BRITAIN WILL AID U. S. IN PACIFIC CONFLICT

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill, speaking before the House of Commons today warned Japan that should any trouble arise in the Pacific between Japan and the United States, Great Britain would declare war on Japan within the hour.

Churchill stated that Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden had received word from neutral countries that Adolf Hitler would soon begin another "peace offensive" but told Commons that any such proposals would never be accepted by Great Britain as long as Hitler was in power. "We owe this, not only to Britain, but to our Russian allies as well," Churchill stated.

Churchill also revealed that a large part of the American Navy was not in action in the Atlantic and told Commons that the British Navy had recently been strengthened by the addition of new and powerful battle units. He said that the British Navy had already cowed the Italian Navy, and pointed to a recent encounter in which two Italian destroyers and 10 merchantmen had been sunk in a Central Mediterranean convoy.

The arch criminal of Europe, as Churchill described Adolf Hitler, is now frightened over the wrath of Europe over the executions of hostages in the occupied countries, the Prime Minister stated.

The warning to Japan about a showdown in the Pacific came at a time when a Japanese envoy is enroute to Washington to discuss proposals with the United States government. Churchill pointed out that Britain is now in a position to keep a powerful naval unit in the Pacific, or in the Indian Ocean, if it should be necessary.

Meantime the British Admiralty announced the sinking, without giving any details, of the British destroyer Cossack, which had won fame in the capture of the German prison ship Altmark, early in the war and releasing British seamen who had been captured by German surface raiders. The Cossack also took part in the naval engagement in Narvik Fjord in Norway and was one of the British naval vessels that took part in the running sea battle which ended in the destruction of the giant German battleship Bismarck on her maiden voyage.

DALLAS.—Unusual interest on the part of the nation's drilling fraternity attaches to the address Gus C. Street, Jr., Regional Wage-Hour Director, is scheduled to make November 13 at the two-day meeting here, November 13 and 14, of the American Association of Oil-well Drilling Contractors.

This is due to the fact that, after January 15, the Wage and Hour Division, U. S. Department of Labor, is expected to inspect or reinspect, on a national basis, the operations of drilling contractors in all of the several hundred oil fields in the United States. For association members and many non-members, Brad Mills, of Dallas, executive secretary of the association, last summer worked out with the Wage and Hour Division a mass compliance agreement.

More than 300 association members, including representatives of the nation's major oil concerns, are expected to be present at the Dallas meeting, according to Mr. Mills.

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Wedding Rings Of British Brides Are Now Only 9 Carats

LONDON.—"With this ring I thee wed" meant before the war the placing of a band of 22 carat gold on the finger of the woman. And 22 carat it was, no matter what her station in life.

Today newly weds of all classes are having to be content with 9 carat gold rings, and a large section have been cheated altogether by fraudulent rings which have appeared on the market, stamped it is true, but fraudulent in that they do not bear a hallmark and offend against the Wedding Ring Act of 1885 which made a gold wedding ring illegal unless it bore one of these marks—a leopard's head, anchor, York rose, sword or bell—the hallmarks of the only six assay offices in England and Scotland.

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A Fire House Dog Proves Too Loyal And Too Bellicose

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—On a farm near Marshall, Mo., a dog is said to be grieving himself to death because he was forcibly retired as an unofficial member of Kansas City's fire department.

Bum, as firemen at one of the suburban stations knew the dog, lived at the station for eighteen months. He chased fire trucks until he wore the padding from his paws and blood oozed from them last winter as he raced down the icy streets.

Recently Bum ran to a fire a few blocks from the station. A neighborhood dog challenged him and Bum was taken to a hospital for a three-day treatment of badly chewed ears.

A citizen complained about Bum's fighting, and an order went out that the dog's connection with the department must end. A firing station operator offered the dog a home, and Bum was tied outside the station. When a fire truck roared by the station Bum chased the rope, broke free and raced after the truck.

Then it was that Bum was removed to the farm. His new master told firemen that the dog had refused food, that only nourishment he would take was a little milk.

In the last few months of his service Bum had been permitted to sit on the truck when firemen answered an alarm. A newspaper published Bum's picture once, and his owner recognized it. The owner took his dog home, but in a few hours Bum was back again.

Let Us Be Ready

On this day, 23 years ago, the booming of cannons, the rattle of machine guns, the killing of men ceased. Americans with all their hearts hoped that a war to end all wars had come to a sudden and dramatic stop. The German military machine waved the white flag, and the time for peace was at hand.

It was only later that people began to count the full costs of victory. So it is that each Armistice Day since the first has been for thoughtful men and women a grave one when they felt more like praying than cheering. It was a prayer that peace might continue to bless this nation, that never again would it have to drink of the foul and bitter cup of war.

Hence, Armistice Day, 1941, has more than its usual tragic overtones. Once more the world blazes. Once more freedom trembles. Once more the German military machine overruns defeated states. Once more even the most determined pacifist feels danger drawing ever closer.

It is, therefore, fitting that President Roosevelt has designated this armistice week as civilian defense week and has indicated the theme should be that the only effective answer to total war is total defense. It is not enough to build a Navy and an air armada and train an Army.

The following week is to be devoted to arousing all to a sense of the pressing need for civilian defense, and the specific ways in which each may participate. England's experience has taught that civilian defense fights fires, clears up the wreckage left by bombs, takes care of the wounded and dying, and aids in the shelter of those who take refuge below ground. This kind of work cannot be improvised. It requires patient training. Only thus can effectiveness be secured, so that, if war comes, order may be improvised. It requires patient training. Only thus can suffering ease.

Everybody is called upon to take a share in this task. There is no time or place for laggards or shirkers. The citizenry owes this debt to itself and to those who made the armistice of 1918 possible.

To day there should be a rededication to demonstrate we are not fair-weather Americans. On this day of remembrance, when the shadows are lengthening and the storm seems ominously close, each of us should say:

"I am ready. Tell me my duty and I will do it. This is my high resolve. I can do nothing less."

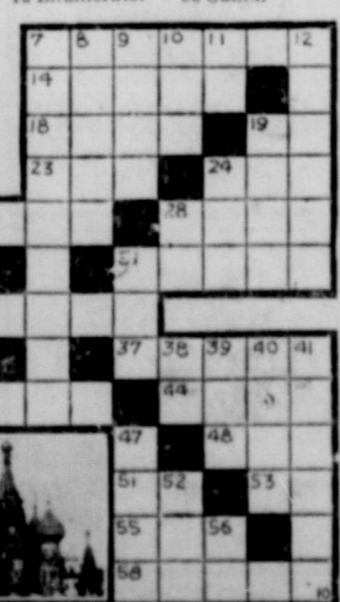
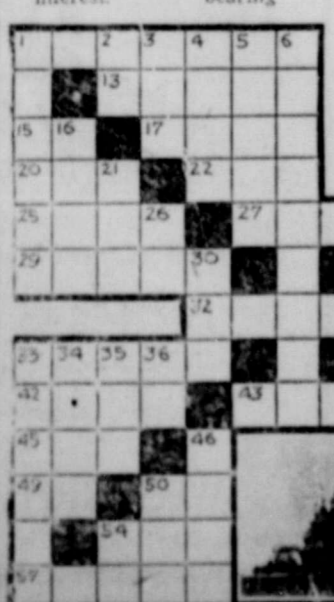

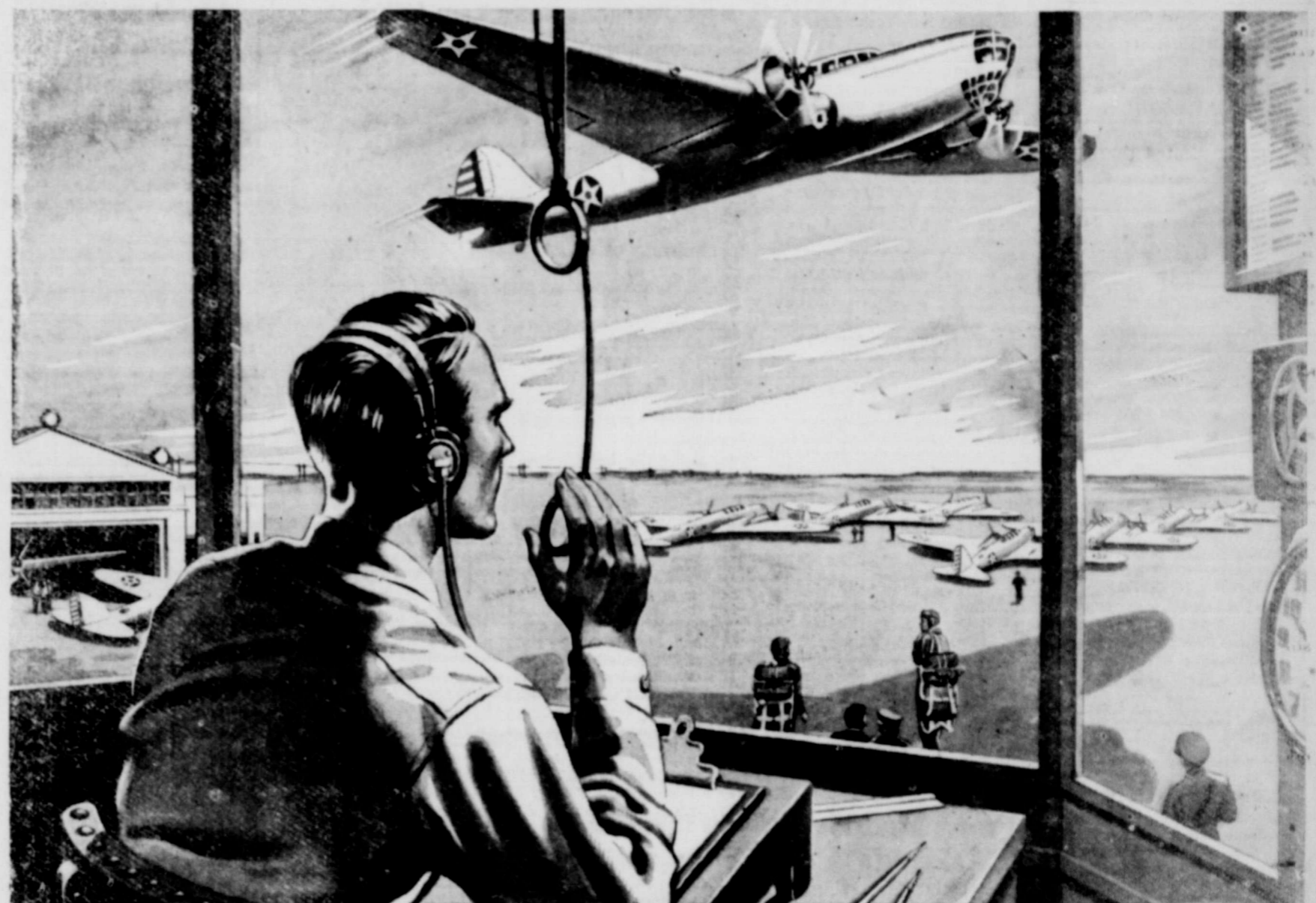
