BOBCATS CLAW MUSTANGS HEREFOR'D HERE FRIDAY

When gridiron drills began for the Bobcats September 1, Coach Blaine had several objectives in mind. One of these was to come out on the long end of the score when the Cats played Olton. This Olton football machine had already marred two very good football seasons for Dimmitt, the first in 1938 and then again in 1943.

Friday night's hard earned 35-0 victory marked the realization of this dream. However, the score was not indicative of the true strength of these ball teams. The Bobcats passing and explosive jaunts of Warren and Ziegler helped to bring scores at crucial moments.

Captain Lonnie Rice played a whale of a game from his quarterback post, and is rapidly establishing himself not only as a great passer and field general but also as an exceptional ball carrier. The entire line of Fulfer, Brannan, Miller, Davis, Howell, Martin, and Jowell played better than average games. Especially noticeable was the manner in which Junior Fulfer dominated Patterson, highly publicized Mustang center. Brannan looked exceptionally good from his defensive end post as did Jowell offensively. Wade Thompson, stellar end but recently converted into a fullback, turned in a nice game. Taylor and Darnon, ends; Hodges, fullback; and Wilkinson, halfback were reserves who looked good.

This week comes the thundering Whitefaces from Hereford. Naturally the Cats are banking on taking this one, but not one of them is expecting an easy battle. In the past three seasons the Hereford lads have averaged 54 points per game while holding the Cats to 2 points per contest. Take your pick, but we will string along with the purple and white.

Just as soon as soils surveys can be made on these farms, assistance in working out a complete and coordinated plan for the application of conservation practices will be given to each of these farmers. Then technical assistance in putting the plan into operation on the ground will be furnished by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

The family moved to Castro county when H. L. was nine years old.

He was married to Miss Vivilene Murphy, May 28, 1937, and they made their home in Dimmitt. To this union was born one child, a daughter, Wynonna LaVerne Duke.

The deceased entered the Army April 25, 1944, and served at Camp Breckenridge, Kentucky. He was transferred to the Nichols General Hospital, Louisville, Kentucky. From there he was given an honorable discharge on the fifth of July, 1944.

H. L. became a Christian in August, 1939. He was baptized by L. E. Carpenter, Minister of the Church of Christ in Dimmitt at that time.

For about three years the deceased had been suffering from a blood disease. Death came at 2:35 Thursday morning, October 30, at the Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo.

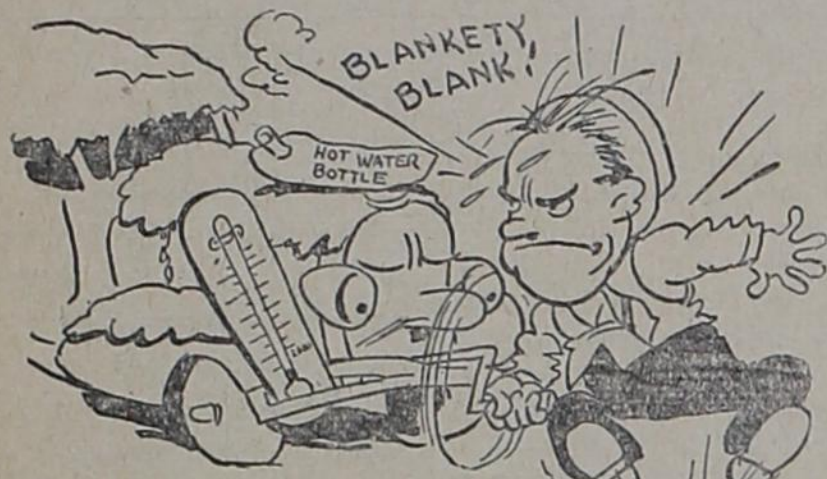

CONTROL CATTLE GRUBS

A little time and trouble now, plus some rotenone, can put Texas cattle and dairymen on the road to saving a large amount of money according to R. L. King, county agent.

How? By spraying for cattle grubs.

Statistics show that forty-two percent of all Texas cattle are grubby. Grubby cattle are discounted on the market at about one cent a pound. The total loss to Texans in the cattle and dairy business in terms of milk, meat and leather each year comes close to five million dollars.

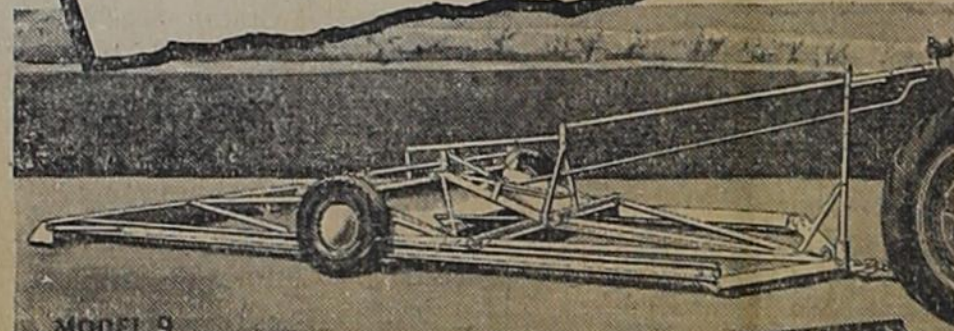
Most farms and ranches cause their own trouble with grubs, County agent R. L. King points out. Heel flies are the parents of grubs, and the flies seldom migrate over a half-mile. So treatment for grubs in the fall and winter will control the heel fly on the farm and ranch in the spring.

Spray the backs of the animals with a mixture of 7½ pounds of 5 percent rotenone in 100 gallons of water at about 30-day intervals in the fall and winter King says. Rotenone dust can be used on small herds.

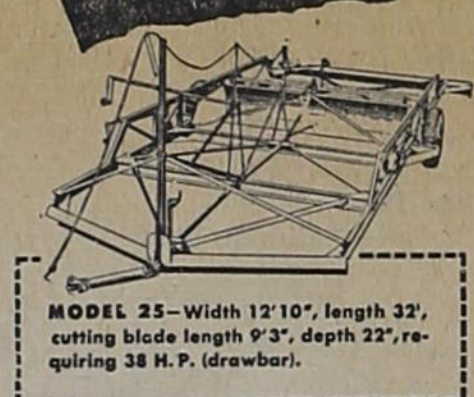
Control now will help to save feed next year, too, as it takes from 10 to 15 percent more feed to fatten a grubby steer than one free of grubs.

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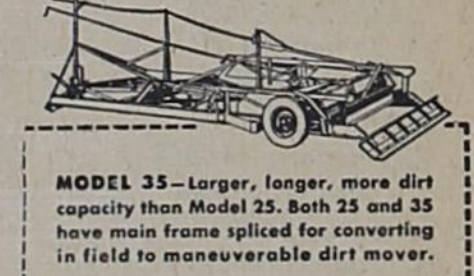

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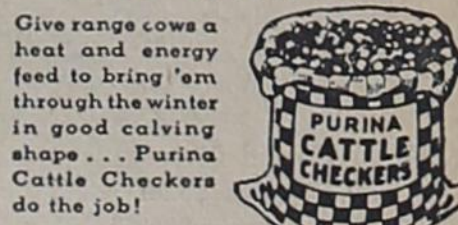

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FEATURE FRUIT

Now that flour and eggs are on the list of critical foods, it's a good idea to feature fruits in desserts for the family. A variety of fruits, fresh, canned and dried, are on the market this fall, and there is plenty of sugar and sirups for sweetening.

All homemakers know that baked pears and baked apples are easy to prepare as well as good to eat. Dried apples, peaches, apricots and prunes can be served many ways. Raisins add taste and texture variety to such dishes as baked apples, apple-raisin marmalade, fruit and waldorf salads.

Spiced prunes are good hot or cold and may be served as a relish with the meat course or as a dessert. Prepare the prunes in the usual way, says County Home

Demonstration Agent, then toward the end of cooking, add sugar to taste, a few grains of salt, such spices as clove, nutmeg, cinnamon or allspice, and a little vinegar or lemon juice. Other dried fruits can be spiced by the same recipe.

If fruits are used as much as possible, Miss Seago points out, there is less need for cakes, pies and puddings. By cutting down on baked desserts, the housewife is doing her part in the government's program for saving certain foods.
