SALES TAX IS CONSIDERED BY CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Congress appeared today to be in a mood to give careful consideration to a general sales tax as a means of increasing the federal governments revenue this year by \$9,000,000,000.

One congressional leader believed that such an increase, bringing total tax collections to \$27,000,000,000, was impossible without a sales tax.

Chairman Robert Doughton, Democrat of North Carolina, of the House Ways and Means Committee, and other committee members have shown an increasing interest in the sales tax proposals.

President Roosevelt is understood to look with some disfavor, though not openly condemning, the sales tax idea, but some congressional observers believed that he would sign a sales tax bill, if submitted to him by the congress, especially if it carried time limitation provisions.

New revenues are needed to take care of the ever-increasing armament program, and to meet the requirements in planes, tanks, guns and ships, as outlined by the President in his message upon the state of the nation, delivered to the new congress Tuesday.

Desdemona 4-H Club Boy Top Man In Lamb Feeding

Marvin Dupuy, a member of the Desdemona 4-H Club, was top man in the lamb feeding program for Eastland county 4-H Club boys during the month of December, according to Joe M. Glover, Jr., Assistant County Agent. For the 31 day period beginning Dec. 3, 1941, and ending Jan. 2, 1942, Marvin made an average gain of 12.4 pounds per lamb with his lamb feeding demonstration. Marvin is feeding his lambs underground shelled corn and cube cake at the rate of 1.5 pounds of corn and 1-3 pound of cube per lamb each day. One half of this is fed in the morning and the other half in the afternoon. Plenty of hay is kept out before the lambs in a hay rack at all times and Marvin sees that fresh clean water and loose salt is available at all times.

Other boys who made good gains with their lambs for the period and following the same feeding methods were as follows: Bobby Lee Boyd, Colony, 10.2 pounds; C. M. Wyatt, Carbon, 7.75 pounds; Mac and Jack Weston, Carbon, 7.6 pounds; Dan Stuard, Colony, 7.6 pounds; W. T. Eaton, Olden, 7.4 pounds; Don Schaefer, Rising Star, 7.4 pounds; J. C. and Glenn Donaldson, Kokomo, 7 pounds.

Japanese Navy Is Anxious For Fight Press Chief States

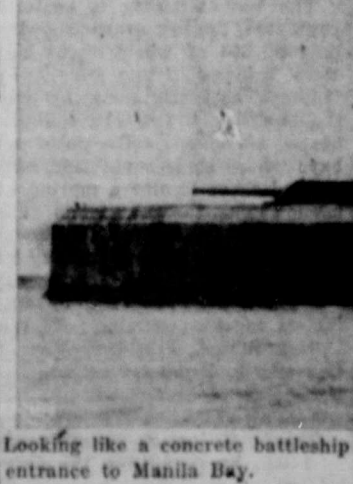

"We thought," they added, "that because they came from Japan, you could have them melted for bullets, or something, and, maybe send them back where they came from."

Keith and Janet received cash for the scrap metal and announced they would buy defense stamps with the money.

Icy Pavements In County Cause Some Damage To Vehicles

Automobile traffic through Eastland County was somewhat disrupted by cold weather and slick pavement Wednesday night, with several minor accidents being reported when cars skidded into ditches.

Greyhound buses were "grounded" in Ranger for several hours because of the icy pavement on the highways, and a large cattle truck, with trailer, skidded into a ditch in the eastern part of Ranger.

Cattle, being taken to the livestock markets in Fort Worth, escaped from the overturned trailer and roamed for a time over the highway. Ranger police assisted in righting the trailer and in rounding up the cattle.

In other accidents bent fenders and minor damage was reported when cars slipped from the road.

TWO RUNAWAY BOYS FOUND BY OFFICERS

Two boys, who live in South Hampton Roads, Tenn., and Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and who had run away from their homes, were picked up by Ranger police Wednesday afternoon and are on their way home today.

Paul Teasley, 14, of South Hampton Roads, was questioned by Patrolmen Founds and Boyd, and admitted he had run away from his home. Boyd wired his mother, and within an hour had received a telegraphic money order for his railroad fare home. He was placed on a Texas & Pacific train later that night.

Later a youth who claimed his name was Jack Wolf of Breckenridge was picked up, and he later admitted he was Jerry Standard, 16, of Cedar Rapids. A wire was sent to his father, and again within an hour the police had heard from his parents, this time by long distance telephone. Money for his transportation home was wired to Boyd and the boy was put on a Greyhound bus at 11:45 Thursday morning.

Young Teasley said he was enroute to Corpus Christi, and from there was going to California, but was vague about his plans. He said he just ran away from home to see more of the United States. Standard said he left home Nov. 1, 1941, and his parents had received no word from him until the wire from Boyd was received. He said he was delivering a newspaper route in Cedar Rapids, but thought he could make more money elsewhere.

Both the boys, after being detained in the city jail for a time, were anxious to start home, the officers reported.

LONDON, England, Jan. 8.—Fresh Russian divisions are driving the Germans back from Moscow and are "turning the tide" of the fighting on the Eastern Front, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said today in telling the House of Commons that the "German army in Russia today is not the German army of six months ago."

BRITISH CONTINUE THEIR RETREAT IN MALAYA WITH JAPS BREAKING THROUGH

Many National Guardsmen Are Being Recalled

Adjutant General J. Watt Page announced today that, with certain exceptions, all enlisted men of the National Guard of the United States not now in active Federal Service will be called to active duty during the period January 5 through January 28 by order of the Secretary of War.

The War Department directive, General Page pointed out, orders the recall to active service in the Army of the United States of enlisted men of all complements, including the Regular Army Reserve, the Enlisted Reserve Corps, and the National Guard of the United States, and revokes a recent directive authorizing recall of these men on an individual voluntary basis. He said:

"In Texas approximately 1,800 National Guardsmen not now in active Federal Service will be affected by this order. Included among these are men who have been discharged from active service during the past several months (some because they were 28 or older, some because of dependency, and some for other reasons) and assigned to the State Department under State control.

"Active duty orders have today been issued to all eligible for recall, instructing them to report to the nearest district recruiting office, in the same manner as an applicant for enlistment, on specified dates during the period Jan. 5 through Jan. 28. Those who are accepted for recall to active duty will be sent to appropriate reception centers. Assignment will be in accordance with the following general principles:

"a. Only men qualified for full military duty will be assigned to the field forces.
"b. Men who have had at least three months' active Federal service during the two-year period immediately prior to reporting for duty will be dispatched direct from reception centers to units or installations. All others will be sent to replacement training centers.
"c. Men will be assigned to the branch of prior service and, where practicable, to their former unit or installation, if it is within the continental United States.

"d. Men will be assigned to units or installations in grade, to be absorbed as vacancies occur."
With regard to deferment from active service on this order Gen. Page said:

"Enlisted men who are necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety or interest and those key men essential to national defense, as defined in the Selective Service Regulations, will be deferred. Those who claim dependency will be deferred only where the dependency is established beyond a reasonable doubt and is critical in nature."
"In all questionable cases involving deferment, the confidential opinion of the local board will be obtained through the State Selective Service Headquarters. In the past local boards have determined all questions of dependency deferment with sympathetic regard for the registrant and his dependents, and any reasonable doubts in such cases will be resolved in favor of the government.

"Active duty orders will be accompanied by complete instructions for submitting requests for deferment. These requests must reach the office of the Eighth Corps Area Commander not later than January 12, 1942."
General Page explained that the date shown on the order to report has been fixed on the assumption that deferment will not be claimed. If claim for deferment is entered, he said, the date to report for active duty automatically changes to January 28, 1942, unless, in the meantime, the individual receives definite written instructions that his claim for deferment has been approved.

TYLER, Tex. (UP)—A sand lizzard with a forked tail in a perfect "Y" for "Victory" was dug up by Works Progress Administration workers in a rock pit near here.

SINGAPORE, Jan. 8.—British forces in Malaya fell back on the Lower Perak Front, following penetrations of defense lines by Japanese tank attacks, a war communique said here tonight.

The British retirement was positions south of the Slim River communique said, and added: "There are indications of enemy infiltrations east of the Selangore area, north of the key city Kuala Lumpur, but otherwise the situation continued unchanged."

Infiltrations to the east indicated the Japanese were attempting to work through the jungle in the middle of the Malay Peninsula, in an effort to envelop or flank the British lines.

The town of Slim River, on the railroad, approximately 50 miles south of Kuala Lumpur. The withdrawal in the Slim River sector was a continuation of retirements almost every day this week in an effort to establish a strong front in the defense of Kuala Lumpur, an operation which the Japanese have been attempting to prevent by flanking attacks.

"Enemy infantry and tank maintained heavy pressure Wednesday on the Lower Perak Front," the communique said. "One point the tanks penetrated our defenses. Our forces were withdrawn to south of the Slim River.

"We suffered some losses of guns and transports.
"In the Selangore area there are indications of some enemy infiltration eastward. Otherwise the situation remained unchanged.

Civilian Defense And Red Cross Working Together

AUSTIN.—Outlining the immediate steps being taken for emergency health measures for national defense, Doctor Geo. V. Cox, State Health Officer, who is acting as Chairman of Defense Health and Emergency Medicine, today announced that the Offices of Civilian Defense and the American Red Cross are have, now available, seven types of defense work training course.

In those lines of work closely allied with emergency medicine care, those considered most important and which have heretofore been given precedence in organization, are first aid training, nurses' aides training, canteen service, motor corps, home nursing, disaster relief, and home service to assist with the problems of families of the men in uniform.

Since there has been some confusion concerning the proper procedure for enrolling in civilian defense work, Doctor Cox emphasized the fact that County Judges and Mayors throughout the state are acting as defense coordinators and advised all who wish to enroll to communicate with these officials for full information.

Training will be available for all who wish to register, Doctor Cox stated, and workers will be assigned to those duties which they prefer, and for which the are best fitted.

County Quota On Defense Bonds Is Over One Million

Eastland county's quota of Defense Bond and Stamp sales for the coming year, as set out in the estimates of sales for the State of Texas, amounts to more than \$1,000,000 it was announced today. The exact figure for Eastland county, which is more than that of the surrounding counties, is \$1,322,600.

Other figures show Johnson County with \$1,192,000; Palo Pinto County with \$789,300 and Stephens County with \$764,600.

The figures for the entire state show slightly more than \$50 million bond purchase quotas for every man, woman and child in the state.

In Majesty, in Justice and in Peace

Winston Churchill has now brought into the very highest circles the discussion of what are to be the relations between the British Empire and the United States after this war shall have been won.

The discussion has been going on for many months, and every kind of proposal has been made from that of a simple military alliance to that of a federal union of the two countries such as to include a common currency, a complete free trade area, and a virtual common government except in purely domestic affairs.

The fact that Japan's mad act has put America squarely in the war has given a touch of reality to this discussion—it has removed it from a sphere in which it seemed largely theoretical to one in which it is an urgent problem requiring solution.

The grim necessities of war are going to bring certain joint activities never before undertaken. The United States has been steadily drawing closer to Canada, even before we plunged into the war, and even now certain tariff barriers are being broken down which years of peaceful effort could not eliminate.

That peace must be organized after this war in such a way as to be a working system and not a pious hope, is something on which every citizen of the free countries now in the war will agree. There are many plans for such a system, and which will emerge after the war it is not possible to judge.

Churchill's phase was a mere hint and suggestion rather than a plan, when he said that the British and American people will "for their own safety and the good of all, walk together in majesty, in justice, and in peace."

That does not imply, by any means, that they will walk alone. There are other partners in this war, Russia, China, the Netherlands, Norway, and a dozen others. Certainly it is desirable that all walk together, for it is only if all the peoples of the world actuated by good-will and a love of freedom walk together that there can be justice and peace.

Every thought given to this future is a valuable thought, for while all energy and action must now be devoted to winning the war so that the future may be brought to being, it is also necessary to have some idea (and the more good ideas the better) of what that future is to be.

FARM HINTS

What is a good chick?

A good chick should have good breeding, free from disease, careful sanitation, and good feeding.

How many chicks should be started?

Be sure you have one square foot for each chick, prevent overcrowding, at the age of 3 weeks they should have 1 square foot of floor space each.

See that there is plenty of ventilation and fresh air at no drafts, scrub the house thoroughly and disinfect, put clean litter on the floor, about 1 inch is enough.

Scrub the feed hoppers and disinfect. Provide 1 inch of feeder space for each chick, provide at least 2 water fountains for each 100 chicks, wash water

fountains and disinfect daily. Place founts between and around feed hoppers so chicks will always have fresh water close to feed.

Build roosts before chicks arrive and about 8 inches above floor, at the age of 3 weeks let the front edge rest on floor so they will learn to roost early, helping to prevent overcrowding.

How to Feed

Fill hoppers daily or as often as necessary, don't fill to full to prevent them from wasting the feed.

After the birds have consumed 2 pounds of chick starter each, no more, change to growing ration.

Remember these Fundamentals: Chicks will thrive if they have:

Fresh air, not too hot (more birds are killed by overheating than by chilling.)

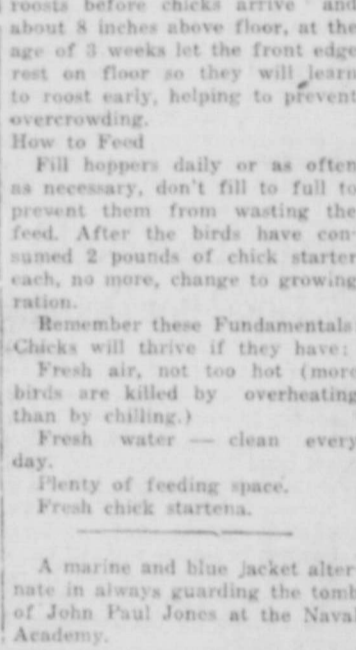
Fresh water — clean every day.

Plenty of feeding space. Fresh chick startena.

Bulk of Mexico's Army Is Rushed to Pacific to Guard Against Japs

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Mexico, thanks to the Roosevelt policy

is really a good neighbor, is proving it at the present moment, not only by breaking off diplomatic relations with Japan, Germany and Italy, but also by taking military precautions so that Lower California and its huge gulf may not be used by enemies of the United States.

And that is precisely one of the biggest things that has occurred in the Western Hemisphere since the Japs treacherously attacked Hawaii.

In the last World War American authorities had reason to believe that German warships and raiders secretly used the waters of the Gulf of California. In the after years the Gulf at times has been a favorite place for Jap "fishermen."

In the present crisis with hostile airplanes reported off the coast of California, the theory has been that they either based themselves upon aircraft carriers standing some 200 or 300 miles off the American coast or upon such vessels somewhere in the Gulf of California.

The Mexican government is doing its level and full best to see that the latter is not true now and that it may not be true in the future.

It is a tremendous task as a little geography will demonstrate.

European Aid To Force Changes For Food Packages

NEW YORK (UP)—The U. S. public faces many changes in food habits, according to the magazine Food Industries.

The government plan calls for an increase of 15 per cent in our food output to take care of present additional demands, but, Food Industries pointed out, the U. S. is preparing to feed an additional 10,000,000 in Britain next year, perhaps a like number in Russia and our own 400,000-man army.

Reports from Britain state that cheese, dried milk, evaporated milk, dried eggs, fruit and tomato juices, poultry, meat, bacon, lard and pork products most urgently needed. These products have to be processed and packaged before shipments.

There is a packaging problem. Food to Britain requires a steady flow of 10 to 15 million paper board containers per month, in addition to millions of cases of canned goods.

The paper box shortage is already acute, due not only to shipping of food under lease-lend, but because the army is buying items in millions of corrugated and fiber containers.

Tin foil materials for wrapping processed cheese, and transparent cellulose (such as cellophane) also are facing a shortage. Draastic changes in food packaging are ahead for the U. S. consumer because of such materials shortages.

Lower California is a continuation of the American state of California. It is a peninsula separated from the Mexican mainland by the Gulf of California. It is about 750 miles in length with a breadth varying from 30 to 150 miles.

It is mountainous, with some peaks rising over 4500 feet, and for the most part arid. With the exception of the strip near the U. S. border, it has no railroads and few good roads.

The vast territory is sparsely populated, the last census showing only 95,416 of whom about half were Indians, living mainly by fishing. The lonely coasts on both the Pacific and the Gulf side are broken by many smaller gulfs and bays where ships could find haven and there is also a myriad of islands. The famous inlets are Magdalena Bay on the Pacific ocean side and Conception Bay on the Gulf side.

With such a land offering temptations to the enemies of the United States, President Manuel Camacho took prompt action.

UNCLE SAM CO-OPERATES

The U. S. just as promptly co-operated, by permitting the passage of a considerable number of Mexican troops through the United

States to reinforce the defenses of Lower California. They were to pass in transit over United States territory from Nogales, Arizona to Tijuana, Lower California, via San Diego.

At the same time President Camacho appointed the former president, General Lazaro Cardenas, as commander-in-chief of all the Mexican army, air and naval forces in Western Mexico, including Lower California.

Military and naval authorities connected with the Mexico Embassy in Washington explain this as of particular significance.

Relying upon the ability of the U. S. Navy and air forces to keep watch and ward in the Gulf of Mexico, the Mexican authorities are leaving in the eastern states of Mexico only enough troops for proper police purposes.

Soon 80 per cent of the regular army will be garrisoned in western Mexico. Just how many men this means is a military secret. The old Mexican army used to contain about 26,000 troops, but in recent times it has been considerably enlarged. Fairly large garrisons will be maintained at the cities of Guaymas and Mazatlan, which are important ports on the Mexican mainland on

the east side of the Gulf of California. On the eastern shores of Lower California there will be garrisons at Santa Rosalia and at La Paz, capital of the peninsula. On the west coast of Lower California there will be garrisons at Ensenada in the north and at Magdalena Bay far down the peninsula.

Mexico has never maintained a large naval force. The last register showed one coast defense ship, five gunboats and about a dozen coast guard patrol ships. Nearly all of these have now been stationed in the Gulf of California to patrol its waters. How immensely important this is was demonstrated recently when one of the Mexican ships held up two Jap "fishing" vessels at the tip of the peninsula and intended the nine "fishermen." It was said seven of them looked very much like Jap soldiers and the others had the bearing and education of Jap officers.

Mexican airmen are doing their part in making air patrol over the peninsula and the Gulf. Moreover the Mexican government has indicated to the United States that American airmen can join in this work if the authorities desire to do so.

THRIFT CAN DO MUCH FOR WAR EFFORT

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Thrift, just plain, good old American thrift, can do as much toward winning this war as almost any other single thing.

The opinion of Mrs. J. W. Walker of Plainview, Tex., president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

She pointed out that housewives spend 75 per cent of the family income and thus three-fourths of the responsibility for saving rests on the housewife's shoulders.

"This is her first and most serious obligation at the present moment," Mrs. Walker said.

She listed six categories in which special efforts should be made to conserve items on which possible shortages loom in the future.

They include paper, tin, other waste items, surplus family budget items, spare time and human values.

Mrs. Walker suggested that all paper articles be saved. Envelopes can be carefully opened and pasted across its face. In England, she explained, the average life of an envelope is four postings. Card-board shortly may be at a premium and the Office of Production Management already is restricting its use, she said.

She urged Texas women to become "garbage conscious" and to look for such things as tin and bones and scrap fat which should be cleaned, dried and saved. Tin cans, Mrs. Walker emphasized, contain as much as 70 per cent steel.

Articles having iron, copper, zinc and lead also should be set aside, as should waste cotton and woolen rags and rubber goods.

The last three categories in her list, Mrs. Walker said, are as important in the war effort as are the more concrete first three.

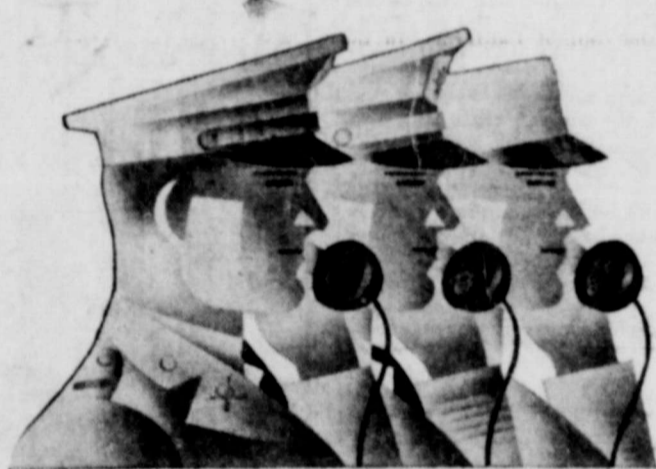
War Comes To The Rockies

Cotton Farm Now Raises Livestock

WELLINGTON, Tex. (UP) — Tom P. Harwell got tired of seeing his cotton land blown out. So he converted his 620-acre farm 11 miles northwest of Wellington into a general livestock farm that's in the "food for freedom" campaign.

He now produces purebred cattle, grows feed, and increased the farm's milk and egg production. Before he changed the picture, the farm contained:

One field of 49 acres abandoned because of erosion; 200 acres in cultivation, half in cotton and half in feed crops; 335 acres in pasture; 31 acres in shelterbelt.

Harwell signed with the Soil Conservation Service. Technicians helped him plan a new version of the farm. This is what they provided:

120 acres in grain sorghum, 43 acres in sweet sorghums, 68 acres in Sunday grass for supplement pasture, and a 15 acre orchard with the pasture and shelterbelt acreage left alone. Contour tillage was substituted for straight-row methods on all fields.

This year erosion has been practically eliminated and good crops produced. The 49 acres abandoned have produced a good crop of sudan grass and a portion of the feed crops were harvested for grain, but a large portion has been stored in trench silos for feeding the stock.

A permanent herd of registered Jersey cattle has been purchased. Two hundred laying hens were obtained to supplement the original 50. The 15-acre orchard was planted on a previously cultivated field, it contains peaches, plums, cherries, grapes and berries and is expected to start producing in two years. Rye was sowed in the orchard area this fall to serve as a cover crop during the high wind.

Baylor Has Largest School of Theology

WACO, Tex. (UP) — The 203 ministerial students enrolled in Baylor University is the largest body of theology scholars in any school in the United States, believes Dr. J. B. Tidwell, head of the Baylor Bible department.

These students, Dr. Tidwell said, serve 100 rural, town and city churches throughout Texas in addition to their school work, and travel an aggregate of 47,480 miles monthly. During November they preached 500 sermons, performed 15 wedding and conducted 25 funerals. They counted 114 additions to their churches during the month.

Cattle Rustling Is Starting In Texas As War Aftermath

AUSTIN.—High prices for cattle have brought about a revival of cattle rustling in Texas—and a renewal of the ancient war of Texas Rangers and cattle thieves.

Capt. Ernest Best, a native of West Texas who has spent more than 30 years in the saddle as an officer, actively leads a detachment of six rangers who expect to make 1942 a bad year for the cattle thieves.

Best is a tall, slender hipped, smooth shaven man with a piercing eye. Although he was born in Albany, Texas, his first service as an officer was in New Mexico, as deputy sheriff at Roswell. He later was an officer of the New Mexico Cattle Sanitary Board for a number of years, interrupted by service as sheriff of Lea county, N. M. He has been a member of the U. S. Border Patrol and was a sergeant of Texas Rangers until his work in stopping cattle

thefts gained him his present captaincy.

Working with Best on this detail are Rangers E. H. Marshall of San Augustine, Raymond Waters and Norvell Redwine of Lubbock, Leon T. Vivian of George West, T. J. Flournoy of LaGrange and John Klevenhagen of San Antonio.

Modern cattle thieves operate with motor trucks instead of seeking to drive off herds, so the rangers have changed their tactics too. Most of their work is at night, stopping and checking trucks.

Gilliland will maintain offices in Dallas as an independent.

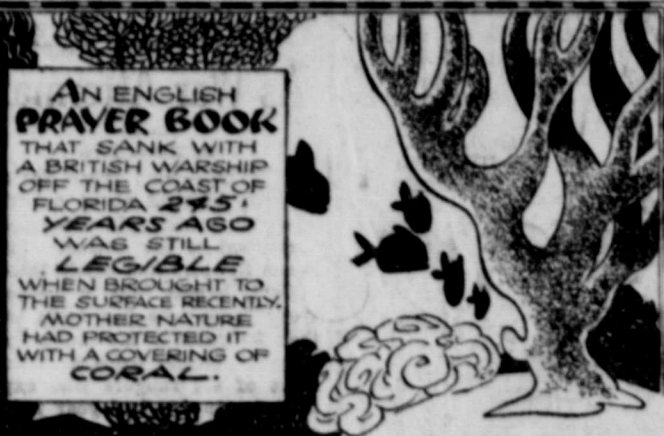

Spurred by the two-fold patriotic purpose of paying tribute to The Man in the White House and lending help to crippled children, America's athletes and fans have flocked to the banners of the National Sports Council of the Committee for the Celebration of the President's Birthday.

To help observe our President's 60th anniversary on January 30th, and thus raise funds to combat Infantile Paralysis, some 10,000 college and high school coaches, 1,777 sports editors and writers, 9,000 bowling-alley proprietors, 4,000 roller-rink operators, the 37 boxing commissions of the National Boxing Association and hundreds of promoters of every type of sport have been enlisted in the 1942 fight infantile paralysis campaign.

Answering the appeal of Grantland Rice, chairman of the Birthday Committee's Sports Council, athletes have volunteered their services, coaches have arranged benefit varsity events, professional promoters are staging birthday shows and fans have pledged themselves to patronize the benefits.

Major phases of the vast, nation-wide campaign include: Basketball: Every college, high school, independent amateur, semi-professional and professional club has been urged to stage a benefit game.

Bowling: Every bowling-alley proprietor has been asked to dedicate January 30th to the President's Birthday Celebration and donate a portion of the receipts that night.

Roller-Skating: Each roller-rink operator has been asked to stage a "Birthday Waltz" on skates on January 30th and donate part of the proceeds.

Boxing: Ape J. Greene, president of the NBA has asked each of the 37 member state boxing commissions to urge its promoters to stage at least one benefit boxing show.

These are but a few of the activities of the National Sports Council which has endeavored to mobilize every fan, every athlete, baseball, football, golf, tennis, skiing, swimming, ice-skating — all sports have been given their marching orders for the March of Sports and all have fallen into line.

East Texas Field To Have Blackout

By United Press. GLADEWATER, Texas.—The world's largest oil field will be blacked out in a few weeks to test defense facilities of 26,000 wells which bring forth a third of the nation's petroleum.

The blackout, sanctioned by local authorities and the Texas Railroad Commission, will be brief—15 to 30 minutes—but it will show how well is the protection from aerial attack.

Hundreds of gas flares dotting the countryside among the forest of derricks will have to be snuffed out. Electric lights on the derricks, helping in the increased production to speed the nation's war effort, will have to be darkened.

The blackout, planned for late January, may be but one feature of a general test scheme which also includes a mock air raid. If cheerfully and picked up the quickening pace.
