

"I want to take this opportuniagain to caution all registrants, regardless of classification, to keep in touch with their local boards and to notify them immediately of any change of address," General Page said. "A registrant becomes liable to severe penalties provided by the Seleclive Service Act for delinquents f he fails to notify his local board promptly of any change of ad-




