## Mission to Ankara

A world which used to call Turkey "the sick man of Europe" today finds itself with a raging fever, and Turkey almost the only country with a normal temperature. To the next phase of the world-wide conflict Turkey, sitting astride the road to the lower Caucasus, to Iran and India, to Syria and the Near East, may hold the key. It is the road to oil, the road to a junction of German and Japanese forces, a road to prolongation of the war ad infinitum.

No greater task lies before the allied nations than to keep Turkey at least neutral and in the mood to fight if Germany's next drive should come her way. Turkey must be shown that it is to her advantage to cleave to the allied cause, for it is on advantage that the acts of nations hinge.

There are two ways to do this, talking and acting. As far as talking can go, the United States has made an excellent first move in sending to Ankara Laurence Steinhardt, a diplomat who has proved his worth in more than eight years of exacting service.

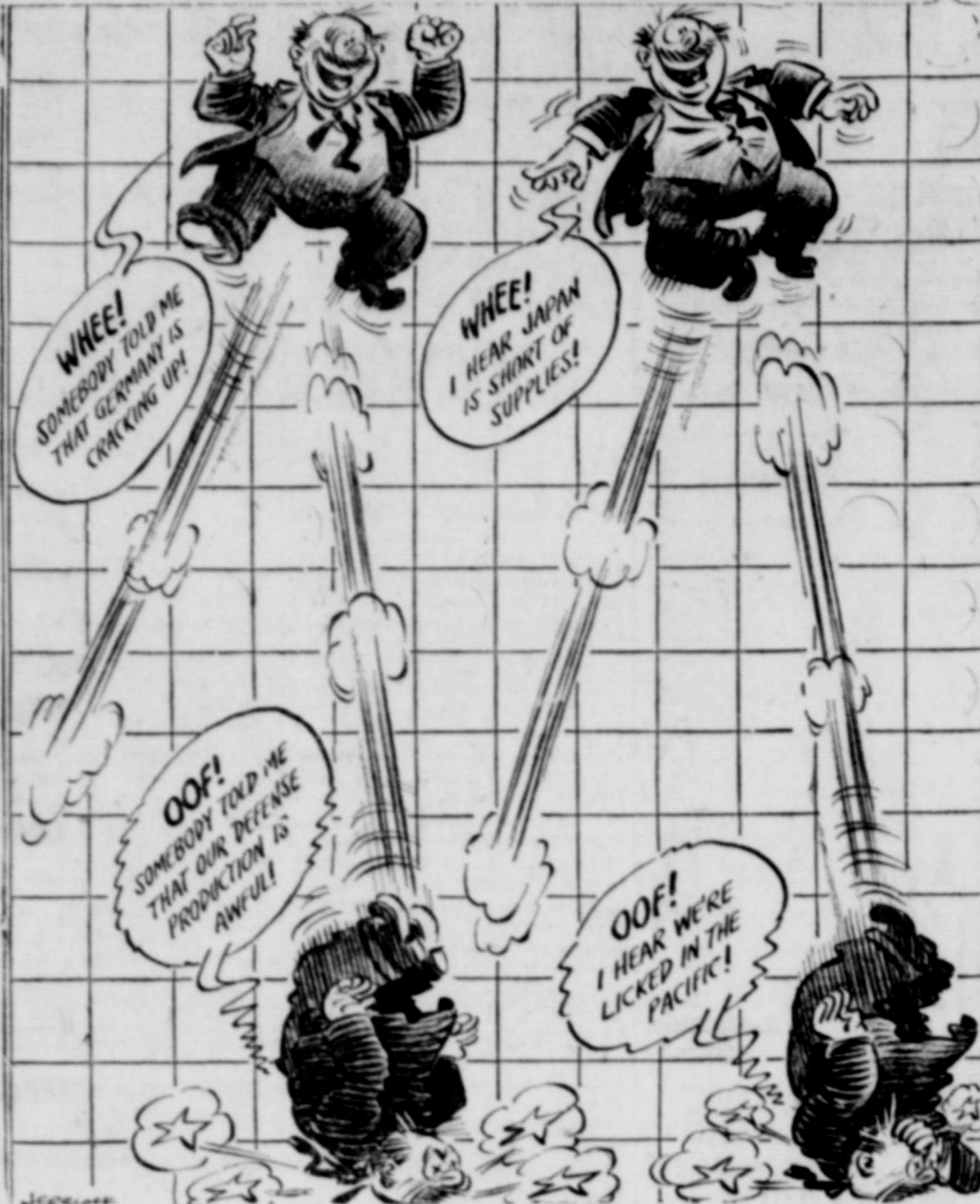
Steinhardt, an acute New York lawyer, was appointed in the early days of the New Deal. While not a career man, he has since that time served as ambassador to Sweden, to Peru, to Russia, and his appointment to a fourth ambassadorship, at Ankara, will give him a record equaled by few career men with a lifetime in the State Department. His experience, compressed into a little more than eight years, is greater than that of many men with 20 years' service. He has made good at every job, and few diplomats ever faced a more difficult job than he when he was sent to Russia at a time when our relations with the Soviets were at sixes and sevens. He knows a great deal about Russia, about Europe and the world. We will be represented at Ankara by a man who sees clearly, talks plainly, and inspires confidence.

So much for that. However, such a mission can accomplish only so much with bare words. Action must back them up. Sufficient allied force to demonstrate to Turkey that North Africa, the Red Sea basin, Iran and the Caucasus can be held are an important supplement to any words Steinhardt can speak. Arms to help equip the Turkish armies for defense are needed and recent extension of Lend Lease to that country must be made effective.

Just what active demonstrations will be required of allied good intentions toward Turkey, and the means to back up those intentions, we do not yet know. But this is one of the most important diplomatic missions of our time, and we trust that the competent hands to which it has been entrusted will be supported in such a manner as to make it completely successful.

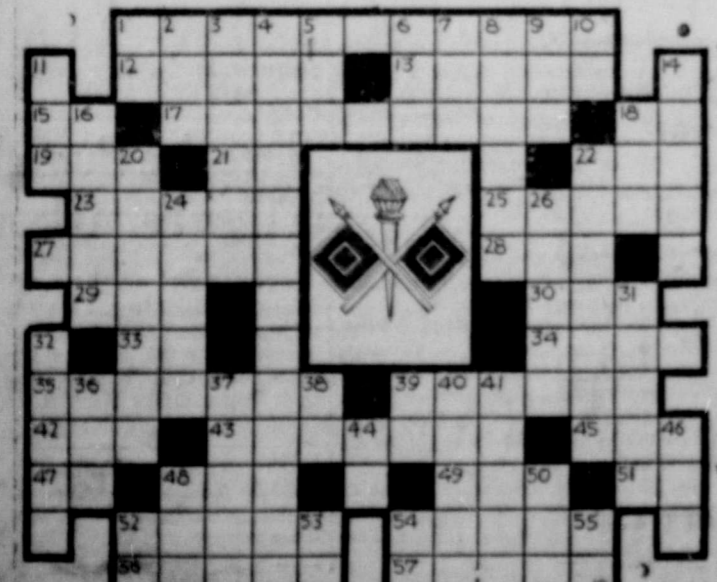

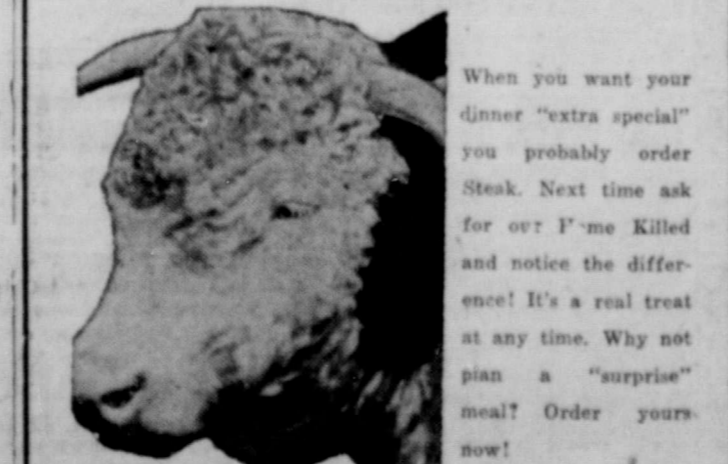

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## Vitamin Treatment Of Measles Urged

NEW YORK. (UP) — The possibility that measles — now more prevalent over the country than for some time — may be treated successfully and its complications avoided by the use of large doses of vitamin A is suggested in the current issue of Clinical Medicine.

In a preliminary clinical note Dr. Irwin I. Lubowe of New York reported that he had tested the treatment on a number of cases all of which responded in some measure. Coughing, Dr. Lubowe said, was "reduced to a minimum and the occasional complications of mastoiditis, otitis media and pneumonia are avoided."

The magazine suggested editorially that this was a favorable time for further testing of the treatment by other doctors and commented that it might prove of "great value."

(e) On a truck operated exclusively for one or more of the purposes stated in the preceding sections or for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Transportation of ice and fuel;
2. Transportation of material and equipment for the equipment and maintenance of public roads;
3. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction and maintenance of public utilities;

tion and maintenance of public utilities;

4. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction and maintenance of production facilities;

5. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction of defense housing establishments and military and naval establishments;

6. Transportation essential to render roofing, plumbing, heating and electrical repair services;

7. Transportation by any common carrier;

8. Transportation of waste and scrap materials;

9. Transportation of raw materials, semi-manufactured goods, and finished products, including farm products and foods, provided that no certificate shall be issued for a new tire or tube to be mounted on a truck used (a) for the transportation of commodities to the ultimate consumer for personal, family or household use; or (b) for transportation of materials for construction and maintenance except to the extent specifically provided by subsections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of this section (e).

(f) On farm tractors or other farm implements other than automobiles or trucks for the operation of which rubber tires or tubes are essential.

(g) On industrial, mining, and construction equipment other than automobiles or trucks for the operation of which rubber tires or tubes are essential.

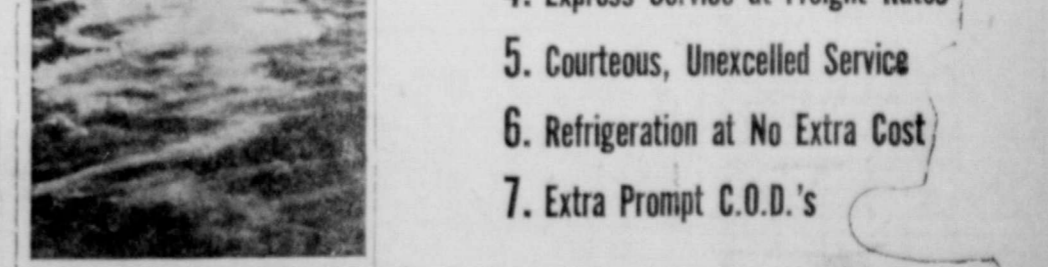

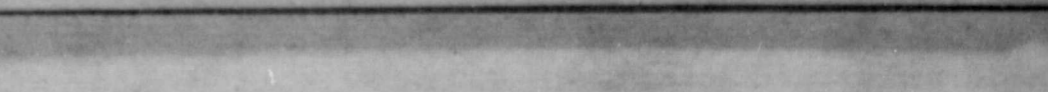

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## Texas Vegetables Find Wide Market

NEW YORK — During the week ended January 3, Texas growers moved a tonnage of mixed vegetables equivalent to fifty-three carlots into consumption in fifteen states, the District of Columbia and Canada through the Atlantic Commission Company, produce-buying affiliate of the A & P Tea Company, the firm reported here today.

H. A. Baum, general manager of the commission company, said the vegetables were marketed through retail stores served by company distribution points in Buffalo, Dallas, Flint, Indianapolis, Memphis, Montreal, St. Louis, Chicago, Des Moines, Grand Rapids, Jacksonville, Milwaukee, New Haven, Syracuse, Columbus, Detroit, Huntington, Louisville, Minneapolis, New York and Washington.

The substantial volume of mixed vegetables moved from throughout Texas by the A & P and other distributors, together with other market developments, was sufficient to maintain a steady market during the week, the report pointed out.

Baum said the bulk of the vegetable purchase in the state were made directly from growing areas through the company's Harlingen field office.
