It is a cause worthy our undertaking it, not only because we go to rescue from oppression a people conquered by ruthless force despite their dependence on us. It is a worthy cause also because the same force which overcame them menaces us, and all the world. There can be no peace until it is eliminated.

Shoulder to shoulder, American boys and Filipino boys are dying in Luzon. They are indeed brothers in blood, and so the whole Filipino people and the whole American people become blood brothers also.

For what do we have there? We have Hitler, the racial maniac, clasping firmly the "yellow fist" he not so long ago professed to despise.
