Pharmacists Have Part In National Defense Program

AUSTIN, Texas. — Recommendations to pharmacists concerning the part they can play in national defense have been received from the United States Office of Civil Defense, according to Dr. G. V. Cox, State Health Officer, who is serving as State Chairman for Health and Emergency Medical Service.

The Office of Civil Defense has every pharmacist to register with the Chief of the Emergency Medical Service in his community, stating what supplies he has available; register with the Training Office of the local Defense Council for any delivery trucks available for emergency transport; register his pharmacy with his air warden, indicating the telephone and refuge facilities he has available.

Every pharmacist should place services at the disposal of the Civil Defense Council for distributing literature and information on Civilian Defense; inform him of the location, and character of protection facilities in his neighborhood so that he can direct citizens to shelters, warden posts, casualty stations, and first aid posts; review and extend his training in first aid and pre-emptive self-instruction to his employees.

Large pharmacies should establish a first aid detachment among their employees which can be immediately available as a stretch team to assist rescue squads. They would be equipped with a stretcher and with first aid supplies.

Dr. Cox pointed out that the Office of Civil Defense urged pharmacies to keep their stocks of drugs, medical, surgical, and laboratory supplies constantly replenished.

Singapore Battle How Is Looming In Far Eastern War

SINGAPORE, Jan. 23.—The slaying fighting front is surging steadily closer to the big navy base at Singapore and the public tonight began talking about the "Battle of Malaya," however, still is raging to the north, where Imperial forces are fighting increased Japanese pressure on three main sectors, less than 60 miles away from Singapore.

TYLER, Tex. (UP)—Ten-year-old Mary's step-mother forced her to get up at six o'clock in the morning and do all the household work before she went to school.

The step-mother also administered frequent whippings.

Then, came the blackest night of all. Her father left town for a few days.

Mary could stand her home no longer. So, shortly before 3 a. m. she sneaked into the night and started a trip to her real mother's home, which was in California.

Night Policemen L. L. Sides and J. T. Billingsley spotted her before she had gone far and brought the little girl to the police headquarters for a talk with Desk Sergeant Bruce Mosley.

After hearing her story, Mosley called a fellow employe of her father's. When he arrived she ran to him with outstretched arms.

He consoled her and told Mary that she could stay at his home until her father returned and the affair was straightened out. With that she smiled through her tears and left.

The hard-bitten boys at the police station were accountably sad.

Farmers Warned to Be Careful About Quality of Seed

AUSTIN. — Because of the scarcity of seed and the danger of poor quality in the seed offered for sale this year, B. V. Hasselfield, Tivoli, recently elected president of the Texas Certified Seed Breeders Association, warned farmers to carefully examine the tag before buying.

"Because of bad climatic conditions this year, many growers made little or no seed. And much of that seed harvested will have inferior germination," Hasselfield stated.

Texas law requires that all seed, excepting that sold by the farmer who grew it, and sold unadvised in his own county, must be tested and tagged. The tag shows germination, purity and weed content of the seed, and any farmer may protect himself by simply examining the tag before buying.

If seed has met the exacting requirements of the certification program, it may also bear the certified seed label, as issued by the Field Seed Certification Division of the State Department of Agriculture. The program is voluntary, but offers an additional guarantee of good seed to the farmer, Hasselfield said.

Representative Is Back In The Army

AUSTIN. — Roy Irving Tennant, Representative from Longview in the 45th and 46th Texas Legislatures, is back in the Army for the second time, both times a buck private.

Tennant, who has been in the State Comptroller's Department, first was inducted at Fort Sam Houston and sent to Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells.

One of the smallest men to get to serve in the House of Representatives, Tennant carried a caddy's full pack through the Louisiana maneuvers and didn't drop out at any time.

Then he was discharged under the 28-year-old limit that had been in effect. With war declared and the 28-year limit removed, he was inducted again last week.

Family Meal Looks Like C of C Banquet

HEAD COACH OF BULLDOGS HAS RESIGNED

H. G. Jennings, head coach of the Ranger High School football team for the past two years, today submitted his resignation to Dr. G. C. Boswell, superintendent of school and to the members of the school board.

The letter of resignation, which was handed to Dr. Boswell this morning by Coach Jennings, reads as follows:

"To Dr. Boswell and Members of the Ranger School Board:

"Due to present conditions and circumstances I feel it advisable that I change my work for next year, and will not be a candidate for re-election to my present position. I feel that it is proper and right that I should make a statement at this time to enable you to make early arrangements and plans for the coming football season. I wish to sincerely thank the faculty members, school board members, and football fans who have co-operated in carrying out our athletic program during the five years I have been connected with the Ranger School System. I am vitally interested in both the present and future welfare of every athlete who has been under my supervision, and with added experience and weight I see no reason why the Bulldogs of 1942 should not make a fine record.

"I want to assure the members of the Board and the patrons of the school that I shall have the same interest in my school work throughout the remainder of this year as I have had in the past.

Membership Drive For West Texas CC Is Getting Started

ABILENE.—The West Texas chamber of commerce today announced the beginning of its 1942 membership campaign. Letters to 166 affiliated towns referred to "that short period of the year when our directors take hold of the pleasant job of raising their towns' proportionate share of the organization's operating budget."

The annual campaign starting in January is substantially completed within two months.

Directors in 56 towns already have sent for their 1942 membership briefs and are at work raising their quotas. One town, Eden, in Concho county, remitted its full quota even before 1942 arrived. The remittance, through the Eden Business Men's club, was mailed to the WTCC headquarters office Dec. 23 by M. J. Green, club president, and M. B. McVay, director.

M. C. Ulmer, mayor and banker of Midland, also WTCC vice-president, this year heads the membership bureau. Ulmer has written the 196 directors reminding them of their action at the chamber's Midland convention in November in setting up a five cents per capita town quota. Ulmer's letter called attention to the West Texas chamber's policy, maintained since 1930, of paying as it goes. He said, "We have made our regional chamber a going concern with absolutely no debts and with cash resources with which to get the job done. We do not solicit our modest budget requirements through commission salesmen. The small staff with the organization are all on a salary basis, and the money we get largely comes to us through the voluntary services of our town directors and committees. The result is that our West Texas chamber leads all organizations of its kind in the nation in its sound financing plans."

Negro Faces Beer Selling Charge

A charge of selling beer has been filed in Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood's court at Eastland against Henry Bisby (col.). The offense is alleged in the complaint signed by J. W. Morrow, a representative of the Texas Liquor Control Board, to have been committed on or about September 8, 1941, and the sale is alleged to have been made to one Vernon Hammond.

Bisby made bond in the amount of \$500.00.

MANY PLANES AND VESSELS ARE ATTACKED

British-American Air Forces In 10-to-One Victory Over Japanese Fliers.

Armed forces of the United Nations inflicted heavy losses on the enemy today in counter attacks against the spreading Japanese offensive from Burma to the Dutch East Indies and strategic islands off of Australia.

American, British, Chinese and Dutch fliers—apparently strongly reinforced with the newest type of war planes—blasted eight warships and transports with a dozen direct hits, dumped 20 tons of explosives on the big enemy base at Hanoi in Indo-China, and shot down 19 to 26 Japanese planes that vainly attempted to raid the Burmese port of Rangoon.

American and British fighters over Rangoon took the sensational toll of possibly 35 per cent of an estimated 70 attacking aircraft, while not a bomb fell on the city itself, the Rangoon radio reported. Two allied planes were lost for a 10 to one triumph over the Japanese.

Rapidly improving performances of the allied air forces throughout the Far East fighting zone came at a time when the Japanese were thrusting into Bismarck, Solomon and New Guinea island sectors northeast of Australia and were pushing closer to Singapore on the hotly-contested land front in Malaya.

Still another Japanese invasion force headed toward the big Dutch oilport of Balikpapan on the East Coast of Borneo, suffered large losses when Dutch warplanes scored 12 direct hits with bombs weighing up to 660 pounds on eight enemy vessels.

On the other fronts the situation was:

Philippines — Forces of Gen. Douglas MacArthur fought off continuous attacks by reinforced Japanese troops, inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy.

Australia — The militia at the island outpost was believed to be fighting "to the limit" against Japanese air and sea fleets that had landed at Kieta on the Bougainville Island in the Solomon group. Enemy landings were also reported at Rabaul, on the New Britain and on the New Guinea Islands.

Bill Johnson To Face 2nd Assault To Murder Charge

The recent 91st district court grand jury returned an indictment against Bill Johnson of Rising Star charging him with assault with intent to murder one Shelby Nunally also of Rising Star. The offense is alleged to have been committed on January 16, last.

Johnson is also under an indictment for assault with intent to murder one V. B. Fenwick of Rising Star. He has faced trial on this charge twice, the last time resulting in a hung jury. The case is scheduled to be tried again Monday, January 26 before Judge B. W. Patterson of the 88th district court at Eastland. Bond has been posted in all cases.

Pioneer Citizen Of County Passes

Dan McBeth, 77, for 50 years a resident of the Rising Star community, died last Sunday. Funeral and burial was at Rising Star.

Mr. McBeth, who was born near Brunswick, Ga., in September, 1864, came with his parents to Texas and in 1883 settled in the Curtis community near Rising Star. He was married to Miss Harriet Richardson, who with three children survives him. Surviving children are: Miss Vera, who made her home with her parents, Emory McBeth, of Mt. Pleasant and Mrs. George Stephenson of Patriots. He is also survived by one brother, Joe McBeth of Rising Star, and one sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Rigby of Floydada.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Presidents William Green of the American Federation of Labor and Phillip Murray of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, accepted a peace proposal today that had been advanced by President Roosevelt.

Under the President's proposal a joint committee will be established, comprising three representatives from each of the labor organizations, to maintain labor peace for the duration of the war.
