### Power Team comes to county for assemblies

Four members of the John Jacobs Power Team are in Castro County this week to give inspirational assemblies.

The power team will be giving nightly performances at the Dimmitt High School Auditorium that started Wednesday and will continue through Sunday at 7 p.m. nightly.

In addition, there will be three school performances. The first of these will be at Hart on Thursday at 9:30 a.m. at the

Hart High School Auditorium. The others will be in Dimmitt on Friday. The assembly for the elementary students will be at 10 a.m. while the event for the junior high and high school students will be at 1:30 p.m.

Howard Rhodes, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt, said that the group would basically address the issues of drug and alcohol. That's in addition to performing feats of strength.

The four Power Team members in question are Carey Leighow, Jamie Morrison, Mark Kerr and Adam Brassfield.

Leighow, from Dallas, was previously in special operations for the U.S. Army and has flown aboard Air Force One.

Morrison, from Kansas City, earned a degree in Exercise Physiology from Missouri Western College, where he played baseball and football and was selected by for the National Collegiate all-star football

Kerr, from Durham, North Carolina, is ranked fourth in the world in the World's Strongest Man competition. He is currently in training for the CBS "Drug Free" Strongest Man Competition.

Brassfield, from Memphis, Tennessee, has been nicknamed "The Human Cannonball".

Rhodes estimated that the team has been in existence for "about 25 years".

"We perform feats of strength to enthuse, astound and get the attention of today's young people," Jacobs, the founder said. "We then deliver a motivating message of hope, relevant to today's young people."


The team has been featured on the television program Walker, Texas Ranger as well as Cable News Network, People magazine and USA Today.

Jacobs also said that the group had received a number of

endorsements, including one from President George W. Bush.

"These school assemblies provide great opportunities for people of all ages to enjoy your displays of strength, speed, motivation and inspiration," Bush said. "Children are our most precious resource. We must teach them to make the right choices, so they can develop healthy bodies and minds and have the opportunity to achieve their highest potential. I commend the Power Team for reminding students of the importance of education and faith and the dangers of alcohol and drugs."

Under this new policy, any contact by a law enforcement officer requires the completion of an interview card. This card will list the nationality, sex, etc. of the person interviewed. This policy is applicable to any contact including pedestrian.

The contact will also be video taped by a recorder in each police car. The state requires the police department to hold these video tapes for 90 days.

Two readings are necessary before a vote for annexation can take place at a meeting to take place after the second reading. The second reading will happen at the next city council meeting.


### Sava announces judge candidacy

Bill Sava had filed for nomination as Castro County Judge subject to the March 2002 Republican primary election.

Sava, currently executive director of the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, has resided in Castro County since 1965, when he was transferred from Texarkana to be the postmaster here. He retired from the postal ser-

vice in 1997. "I still have a few good years left and I feel that I can serve the people of Castro County effectively if I am elected," Sava said. "I plan to work to achieve a higher degree of cooperation between our communities and to actively support those projects which promote economic development and would benefit our citizens through the creation of jobs."

Sava is a member of the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club and St. Anthony's Catholic Church. He has chaired the Rhoads Memorial Library Board and has worked

### Willard announces 242<sup>nd</sup> judge plans


Eric Willard, a Plainview attorney, has announced plans to run for 242<sup>nd</sup> District Court Judge.

Willard has had a law practice in Plainview since 1996 and has also taught legal research and writing at the Texas Tech University Law School for one

A 1986 graduate from the University of Oklahoma law school, Willard has had a private practice since 1991. He also went to Oklahoma to work on ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). Willard has also worked as a staff attorney with the New Mexico Court of Appeals Prehearing Division and taught legal research and writing at the Texas Tech University Law School.

"Our community needs a strong judge with compassion and common sense that controls his court with a firm hand, not a club," Willard said. "Our community needs a judge they know and trust to make the right decisions. I believe I can be that judge."

Willard, 45, was born in then went on to earn a Bachelor's of Science in Biochemistry in 1978 at LSU

and worked two years toward a Ph.D in Physical Chemistry at Oregon State University.

After the aforementioned ERA campaign, Willard was a medical research assistant for the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation.

"I believe public trust in the judicial system is decreasing, not increasing," Willard said. "Likewise, a judge should try not to waste a juror's time, like when a plea bargain or an out-Andrews. He earned a GED and of-court settlement could have been reached. Trying cases just to try cases makes no sense and is wasteful."

Since Sept. 11, there has been a resurgence of patriotic pride. The U.S. Flag can be seen flying everywhere to honor those who died and as a symbol of unity. Many individuals asking questions about proper flag etiquette have contacted the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) and we appreciate their questions.

To assist in displaying our nation's symbol, I would like to share a few guidelines:

(1) A flag displayed on a car should be fastened to the rightside bumper, antenna or window.

(2) If displaying a flag on a wall, the blue field should be in the upper left corner and it should never touch the ground.

(3) When displaying an all-


Consignments of farm equipment are current being accepted for the Nazareth Knights of Columbus farm auction, which will be held Feb. 16.

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

"You can count on me!" We've all said it. We've probably all meant it. But have we always carried through?

#### Accountability

Ethical people, responsible people, have a sense of duty. They keep their commitments. They accept responsibility for every decision they make - or don't make. Two hundred years ago in England, Edmund Burke observed that 'All that is necessary for evil to triumph is for good men to do nothing. If anything, that is even more true today, in our more democratic society: We are all accountable for the state of the world, and we must act, not be passive in the face of wrongdoing.

Accountable people consider the possible consequences ahead of time. They accept personal responsibility for predictable consequences of their actions and inactions. An accountable person does not shift blame onto others, nor take credit for another's work. Because they see the influence their behavior inevitably has on the attitudes and behavlor of others, accountable people lead by example.

#### Self-Restraint

Being responsible includes exercising self-restraint and delaying gratification. That means responsible people control their words and actions. They wait for their rewards.

Ethical people don't have a win-at-any-cost attitude. They realize that if you aren't willing to lose. you have to be willing to stoop to do whatever it takes to win ... even if it's unethical. Ethical people show a sense of responsibility with self-discipline and self-control. They make decisions that take into account and advance long-term interests.

#### **Pursuit of Excellence**

Responsible people really try to do excellent work, especially when other people are counting on them to do well.

/ Diligence: It's O.K. to make mistakes, but there's a moral obligation to be prepared and work hard.

Doing Your Best: Do the job as well as it can be done, even when there is a shortage of time and resources. Ethical people do the best job possible with the resources they have.

Perseverance: Ethical people finish what they start. They overcome obstacles. Good Work Habits: Pursuing excellence requires

good work habits. Those work habits include an obligation to put in a full day's work for a full day's pay, not bothering others and meeting deadlines.

Continuous Improvement: Ethical people look for ways to do things better. They seek to develop their knowledge, skills and judgment.

#### Responsible Do's

Think before you act! Consider the consequences for yourself and others. Then decide whether the action is trustworthy, respectful, responsible, fair, caring and a mark of good citizenship for everyone affected by the decision.

Be accountable! Take responsibility for the consequences of your actions and lack of action.

Be reliable! Always perform your duties.

Set a good example in what you say and do. Act as if someone whose respect you want is always

Take the initiative to make your school, organization, neighborhood or home better for yourself and others.

Do your best! Make everything you do worthy

Stick to it! Meet your responsibilities even when it is difficult to do so.

Tinish your work before you play.



### News office to act as phone drop-off

The Castro County News will be serving as a drop-off for used cellular phones as part of a Donate a Phone drive.

The drive is part of the nationwide Call to Protect, a national educational and philantrophic initiative that began in 1996 "to provide the security and mobility of wireless phones to victims of domestic violence."

The project is spearheaded by Nelda Laney, wife of Texas Speaker of the House Pete Laney. An earlier drive in Austin had secured more than 10,000 cell phones for victims of domestic violence.

"All types and brands of cell phones, working and non-working, can be donated," Laney said. "All will be sent to a Motorola factory, where they are stripped and refurbished."

Once the phones have been

refurbished, they will then be returned to the area, where in turn they will be activated with local numbers, the universal 911 emergency number and a nonemergency local number, most likely the Hale County Crisis line, according to Laney.

She emphasized that all information is removed from the phones before they are sent back to the area.

"Many people ask if their numbers or accounts can be stolen," Laney said. "We can assure them they can not be be. The goal of the program is to provide safety, not a cell phone for normal use."

She also encourages civic clubs and organizations, churches, 4-H and other youth groups and businesses to collect phones for the drive. The deadline is Jan. 31.



Birkenfield, however, answered immediately for Nazareth with a basket. The Lions were then called for walking and Wilcox hit his three-point shot for a 64-57 lead.


Trinity would cut it to four at 64-60, but Wilcox then made two more free throws to keep the Lions at bay.

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#### Showmanship ..... RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. GENERAL 1. All entries must be sent to the Young Farmers, Vo. Ag. Dept. Dimmitt High School, 1505 Western Circle Drive, by 5 p.m. on Jan. 18, 2002. Any incom-

plete, unsigned or late entry will be fined \$25 Entry fee—to be used for bedding, show expenses, etc.: \$15.

3. All livestock must be in place by 4 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 24, 2002 and no earlier than noon Wednesday. Weighing will begin at 4:30 p.m. All entries must

4. All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the officials. Only one weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion

of the Superintendent. 5. All animals must receive state validation from the County Agent or Ag

6. Each exhibitor will not be allowed to enter or show more than three steers, three barrows and three lambs. An exhibitor will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and only two animals in any division. If an individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the Superintendent immediately after judging as to which three animals he will place in the sale.

7. The number of animals that will be sold through the auction will be as follows: 125 barrows, 125 lambs, , or 75% of the total animals that are weighed in, whichever is the smaller number. Due to the decline in the number of steers and heifers, up to 15 head will sell; or 75% of the total whichever is greatest. 8. The percent of the animals to be sold will be figured on each class. If an animal eligible to sell is pulled, the next animal in line from that class will sell. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.

9. There will be no floor this year. 10. All livestock will be sifted by weight.

11. Two showmanship trophies will be awarded for Steer, Swine and Sheep. The senior showmanship will be for exhibitors aged 14 and over, and the junior showmanship will be for exhibitors aged 13 and under. The animals must have been owned, fitted and groomed by the exhibitor for the exhibitor to be eligible for a showmanship trophy.

12. No steer will be allowed in the show that has not been owned as of July 1. Barrows and lambs must have been owned as of Nov. 1

13. Only active 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show. All livestock entered in the show must have been fed under the supervision of the Castro County Agent or Vocational Agriculture Teacher of Dimmitt, Hart or Nazareth High Schools and must be so certified by one of the above on the entry card. 14. To be eligible to show, all 4-H club members must be enrolled in a Castro County 4-H club under the supervision of the Castro County Agent, All FFA members must be enrolled in a Castro County school. All exhibitors must reside in Castro County, be at least nine (9) years of age or in the third grade, and be enrolled in a public or private Elementary or Secondary school located within Castro County. Any exceptions must be approved by Dimmitt Young Farmers. 15. All animals must be reasonably dry and clean before weighing. Any animal not so, may be declared ineligible to show by the committee in charge of the

16. Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the truck. Any animal left in the barn after trucks are loaded are the responsibility 17. The Dimmitt Young Farmers shall reserve the right to disqualify any exhibi-

tor or animal for any reason that is deemed necessary. Also, the Young Farmers will not be responsible for any injury, loss or damage to persons or property arising from the Castro County Junior Livestock Show and Sale.

18. Exhibitors and show officials will be the only persons allowed in the show

19. Any animal sold on floor must have been entered in the show. 20. Any exhibitor found violating the rules may be subject to a fine up to \$200 and suspension from the County show for a period of one (1) year. The person signing the entry card may also be fined up to \$200. Entry cards will not be accepted from the offending organization until the fine is paid.

21. All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a deposit of \$50 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the livestock show management immediately after occasion for such protest. The protest committee will consist of the Young Farmer officers and the various Division Superintendents. All committee decisions are final. The Castro County Junior Livestock Show and Sale and the Dimmitt Young Farmers are indemnified from any and all liability for all legal and other proceedings which may ensue from

the committee's decision. 22. No animal may leave the stock show premises from the time of weigh-in until after the show without the approval of the Superintendent. All take home animals must be checked out of the barns by noon on Saturday.

23. Each club will be responsible for cleaning their pen. If pens are not cleaned a fine of \$200 will be levied. Check will be held until fine is paid. All pens must be cleaned by 6 p.m. Sunday.

24. No change in the pattern of highlighting of any animal by painting or dyeing in all three barns will be allowed (water only).

25. No adults in show ring during show or classification. 26. Exhibitors ineligible to participate at the Castro County Junior Livestock

Show due to the NO PASS AND NO PLAY rule cannot have another or others exhibit the animal or animals in question. II. CLASSIFYING

Lambs will be weighed and classified at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday in the show ring. Steers will be weighed upon arrival at the show and classed by height and weight. Steer classes will be determined by the Superintendent. Hogs will be classified by owner. Any animal not classified at the proper time must wait until last to be classified. Hog weights must be turned in by 4 p.m. Judging Schedule

Lambs: 9 a.m., Friday Goats: Immediately following lambs Steers: Immediately following goats Friday Barrows: Following Steers Friday III. STEER DEPARTMENT

1. Only steers and heifers are eligible to show 2. All calves in the show must weigh at least 900 pounds, however, 1,350 pounds is the top pay weight.

4. If there is not enough of any one class to be placed in a separate class, they will be classed with another class.

IV. LAMB DEPARTMENT 1. Both wethers and Ewe lambs are eligible to show.

2. There will be a possibility of four breeds only, definitions of breeds are as

a. Fine Wool-This breed shall include only purebred grade Rambouillet or

Delaine or a cross between these two breeds.

b. Fine Wool Cross-This class will include lambs sired by Suffolk, Hampshire,

Corriedale, or Columbia rams and out of fine wool ewes. Lambs that carry more than 50% medium wool breeding will go into the medium wool. The decision will be left to classifiers.

c. Medium Wool class-This class shall include only purebred or grade Hampshire, Suffolk, Corriedale, and Columbia or other medium wool cross. d. Southdowns-This class is only for purebred Southdowns or lambs that

exhibit predominant Southdown characteristics. 3. Weight classes: Breed of lambs will be divided at supervisors discretion. There will not be a top weight but the maximum pay weight will be 130 lbs. 4. Lambs will be classified in show ring according to breed before weigh-in. A classifying judge will assist the Superintendent in placing the animals in the

proper class. Classifier's decision will be final. 5. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show. Lambs wool should be uniform length no more than 1/4 inch in length.

7. Where four animals are not available to make weight classes, then light-

weights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class. Placings—Ribbons

Grand champion-Banner Reserve grand champion—Banner

#### V. SWINE DEPARTMENT 1. Only barrows are eligible to show.

2. Top pay weight will be 260 pounds. There is no minimum weight.

3. A weigh back may be done on any barrow at the discreation of the Dimmitt Young Farmers. A 10 pound variance up or down will be allowed from write-in weight. Any barrow not meeting the weight will be disqualified. 4. No feeding in aisles. All feed will be dumped outside, on south side of barn.

5. It takes five head to make breed. Those not making a breed will be shown in the crosses. There will be eight breeds of barrows as follows: a. Berkshires

b. Chester Whites/Other Pure Breeds

c. Durocs d. Hampshires

e. Spots f. Poland Chinas

g. Yorkshires h. Crosses

5. Weight Classes: Breeds of barrows will be divided by weight at the discretion

of the Superintendent. 6. At judges discretion, any obvious violation of classification will result in

disqualification of animal in question. 7. First and second place barrows from each class will compete for Champion

and Reserve Champion of the breed.

8. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

9. Where five animals are not available to make weight classes, then lightweights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.

Barrows will be sold at weigh-in weights.

11. No floor.
