On numerous occasions lately we have heard the charge of "conflict of interest" leveled against various public officials, on the national level. Apparently state officials are immune to the charge.

A story in Tuesday afternoon's Amarillo paper reveals a glaring example of conflict of interest Texas style. The story was written by Jim W. Walker, oil editor of the Amarillo paper and 42nd Year - No. 35 had to do with the 23rd annual meeting of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners

As would be expected the speakers on the convention program advocated price increases for crude oil and natural gas at the well head, and also plugged for retention of present oil industry tax benefits and proposed an increase in the depletion allowance. This is what you would expect at a meeting of industry officials and representatives. It is their responsibility to lock after the interests of the oil industry, and that they were doing as was to be ex-

Here comes the conflict of interest angle that developed at the meeting; it was the election of W. J. Murray, Jr., of Austin as president of TIPRO for the coming year. Murray is a former member of the Texas Railroad Commission, a three member board that is supposed to look af ter the interests of the people of that state as opposed to the monopolistic practices of the oil industry and other vested interests. The last person you would expect to be elected to an administrative would be a former member of the Texas Railread Commission if he had performed his duties well as a commissioner.



Although Dimmitt Wheat Growers' corn milling plant won't go into production until sometime next year, customers already are asking for its entire output.

THIS WAS the highlight announcement made to a crowd of 700 at the cooperative's annual meeting Saturday evening by Aaron Isaacs and Jim Harsh, president and vice-president of Dimmitt Management Co., which will operate the mill.

The annual meeting was held in the plant's fabrication shop, where more than half a million dollars' worth of steel sheets are being nolded into tanks and cones for the huge mill. Members of the cooperative got a first-hand look at the tough, complex machinery being used to fabricate the plant. Former resident





BUY ONLY fresh fruits and vegetables needed. Never buy more than you can properly refrigerate and use without waste.

Even under ideal storage conditions most fresh fruits and vegetables retain top quality only for a few days. Always sort vegetables before storing. Discard or use at once any bruised or soft ones; do not store them with the sound, firm ones.



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



The things necessary are (1) a desire to fly; (2) a good instructor - mine is Brice Dowell; (3) self-assurance - which a good instructor builds;

and (4) an airplane, of course which in my case is furnished by Tidwell Flying Service.

I want you to start with me on my first lesson. The first time up, Brice just ried to get me familiar with the irplane by making a preflight check, leaning about the controls and how they effect the flight of

he aircraft, etc.

A preflight inspection consists of walking around the outside of the airplane to make sure everything is allright (checking the oil, gas, tires, flaps and ailerons). WE GOT into the airplane and I learned how to start it and how to

taxi to the end of the runway. My

instructor took off and got us well into the air, then turned it over to me! I did a few shallow tuns to get the feel of the plane. My instructor then landed and I taxied back to the parking ramp. After parking

the plane, we started my "log The next day, I took my second esson. I did the preflight check, started the airplane, taxied to the end of the runway, and followed through on the controls as my in-

structor took off. THIS TIME I had the controls almost immediately after we got in the air. I learned how to do land maneuvers, such as S-turns over a road and rectangular patterns around a section of land. We also tried to maintain a constant heading - trying to fly straight over a straight road. I didn't do that very well. THEN we did a few STALLS.




