



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

It was pointed out that a severe penalty can be dealt out to those who keep pigs within the city limits, and also penalties are pro vided where other livestock, including mitch cows and horses are a sanitary condition.

The city office is calling atten tion to the livestock ordinance concerning hogs, and has issued a warning to people keeping other livestock, who let it run loose on the city streets, either at night or by day. Such livestock, when caught, will be put in the city pound and a fee of \$1 charged for its release, plus the feeding charges.

E. T. Eubank, city secretary, in making the announcement, also stated that city dog licenses would be received by April I, and that all dogs running loose in the city after that date will be caught and killed, unless licensed, according to the city ordinance, which requires vaccination of all does
