Goodby to Passivity

There is no general agreement with the new name, War Bonds, which has been given to the government's promises to repay billions of dollars borrowed to finance the defense of Democracy. Some preferred the World War I title, Liberty Bonds. Others argued for reviving Victory Bond as a cognomen.

But the bitterest enders are glad that at last we have discarded the misnomer, Defense Bonds, a termic fifth columnist which was doing more damage than a dozen Fritz Kuhns.

Technically, perhaps, and very fundamentally, we really are fighting a defensive war. That is, we aren't an aggressor nation. We aren't trying to seize another people's territory or trade. We aren't attempting to force our ideology, our form of government, our system of economics upon the rest of the world. We are merely refusing to permit Germany, Italy, and Japan to Nazify the world, including us, by force.

We are defending democracy, but we know now that we can not preserve human rights by defensive methods. Having been forced to fight for what we treasure, we intend to take the offensive and to pursue it to the complete destruction of axis aggression.

It was high time that we got rid of the stultifying passivity suggested by "defense." It expresses too well the spirit of letting the other fellow set the pace, pick his spots, name the game and make the rules. Wars are not won in that way.

Late, but not too late, the pacific American people have begun to adopt a belligerent attitude toward this war. The new name for the government's bonds is a concrete expression of that new spirit. War Bonds. That means Fight.

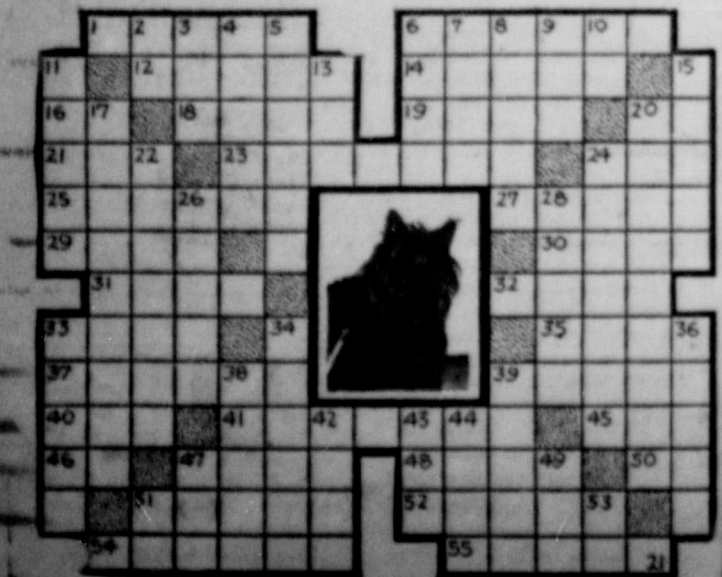
We are not yet in position to make Germany, Japan and Italy suffer at home what our allies in Europe and Asia have been forced to endure. We do not yet have the materiel with which to undertake those ventures, nor as yet have we been able to move what we do have to the places where it is most needed.

But almost every day sees another bottleneck broken through, and the machinery of production and transport speeded up. Even in the news of disaster there are bright spots. The toll we take of raiding Japs and Nazis proves our defenses in the fighting areas are being strengthened. Our counter blows gradually become more frequent, more daring and more effective.

We aren't on Easy Street yet. We haven't even turned the corner. But we shall turn it the day that, by sweat and tears, we reach that point at which we can attack enemy-held territory for keeps. And the discarding of the passive name "Defense Bonds" is a real step in the right direction.

HIGGINS BEGINS ASSEMBLY LINE SHIP PROGRAM

 NEW ORLEANS, La.—Affable Andy Higgins, the South's miracle industrialist, has started work on a \$32,000,000 shipyard scheduled to produce 200 Liberty ships before the end of 1942.

A ruddy-faced, plain-talking Irishman, Higgins already was becoming a legendary figure as a boat-building dynamo when he returned from Washington with a \$700,000,000 contract calling for almost a ship every two days, beginning in September.

Tentative plans are for 300 more ships in 1944. Assembly line principles never before applied to shipbuilding will be used to turn out vessels faster than formerly was believed possible.

The size of the contract was hard to realize until it was revealed that the influx of workers in a few months is expected to increase the half-million population of this old river town by one-third.

Workers already have begun clearing land for the 1,200-acre yards to be known as the Liberty Plant division of Higgins Industries, Inc. Also slated for immediate construction as part of the project is a seven-mile long ship canal which eventually will become a link in a new deep-water outlet to the sea.

New methods to be employed, details of which are still secret, will utilize mass prefabrication. Huge gantry cranes with 50-ton capacities will work in pairs on each side of the assembly line swinging whole sections into place.

Not only major construction, but complete outfitting will proceed as ships move along what

Higgins calls the "flow line," thus enabling a time-saving of weeks in construction of ships.

Special schools will be established to train men in the production of the 10,500-ton freighters. At peak production the plant will employ 40,000 to 50,000 men.

Driving force behind the company, Andrew Jackson Higgins, Sr. was formerly a lumber importer and exporter who began building his own tugs and barges, became interested in motor boat construction and gave up the lumber business to concentrate on his sideline.

His first military boat was the Eureka landing boat and before censorship covered his activities

Probably his biggest asset is the loyalty of his men. When he returned from Washington several hundred workers were on hand with a brass band to meet him and they bore banners proclaiming: "No Strikes, No Stoppages, No Lockouts."

An A. F. of L. spokesman said that laborers would work any hours, in any weather and for any pay with Andy Higgins. He also manufactured motor torpedo boats.

Higgins is a square built man of medium height with equal command of the king's English and the language of the longshoreman. He has a reputation for producing what he promises.

Who Will Run For Place In U. S. Senate Is Still Chief Political Topic In Austin

 AUSTIN.—Dan Moody should win the race for the U. S. Senate in the first primary if all the people vote for him who come around to the capitol press room with a "don't quote me" statement that Dan has told them he will be a candidate.

But the former governor tells newspapermen that if he decides to make the race he will do his best to notify everybody. "Somebody ought to run," says Moody.

Whether that somebody will be Moody or Former Gov. James V. Allred, now federal district judge, remains the chief pre-campaign topic.

The Alfred candidacy is being urged on the theory that the Houston judge can carry South Texas against Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel. Senator O'Daniel carried nearly every county in that section over Rep. Lyndon Johnson, one observer asserted, and if South Texas can be taken away from O'Daniel, he will be defeated.

O'Daniel supporters spoof at the idea that anyone can beat "Grandpappy" as they call him since the arrival of Molly O'Daniel Wrather Jr. It is part of their psychology to create the impression that O'Daniel is unbeatable, but they ignore the fact that he would have been forced into a run-off if his first election to the Senate had been a party affair rather than a special election.

Newspaper at Hallettsville and Cuero already have urged All-

red's candidacy, it is reported. The South Texas vote is being considered also in the state's most popular race—for lieutenant governor. Failure of Sen. Fred Maritz of Ganado to enter this contest leaves Virgil Arnold of Houston, a former state representative, the only South Texas candidate so far.

This race is picked by many as probably one that will be closest this summer. Others eye the race between Treasurer Jesse James and Gordon Smith, son of politically wise Len A. Smith, as the "hot" race. Gray-locked Larry Mills of Dallas is reported to be planning to make his race for treasurer bare-headed—a reminder that both the other men are of military age.

The race for state commissioner of agriculture may also develop into a lively one, capitol observers believe. Commissioner J. E. McDonald's friendliness to Republican party farm measures while he was Democratic nominee two years ago still rankles with some of the farm sections, a North Texas senator said on a visit to Austin.

Gov. Coke Stevenson appeared still to have clear sailing and the possibility of getting the Democratic nomination without an opponent. There were rumors that Harry Hines of Wichita Falls and Frank Scofield, internal revenue collector for the southern district of Texas, might be candidates. Scofield and Stevenson are both cattlemen and although Scofield is said to have a desire to become governor, it is not likely that he will run against Stevenson, his

friends say. Hines has been remarkably quiet since his former race for governor but got into print at Austin recently with a suggestion that a short snappy campaign is the type that will win 1942 races.

Senographers And Typists Wanted In National Capital

The U. S. Government needs 1,000 women stenographers and typists for immediate employment in the various defense agencies in Washington, D. C. It was announced today by Max Ohr, Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Post Office, Racer.

The rate of pay for these positions is \$120 a month and opportunities for advancement are considered excellent. Applicants will be given tests to determine their qualifications immediately, but at their convenience.

Ohr states that the Defense Housing Registry assures appointees of reasonable living accommodations in Washington within 35 to 45 minutes transportation time from the various government offices. Single room rates range in price from \$20 to \$30 a month and double rooms from \$30 to \$40. Room with board ranges from \$40 to \$50. 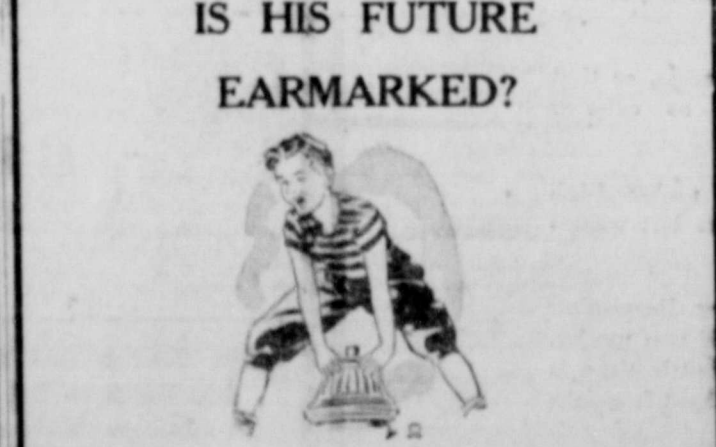
