THESE concessions have to be considered in the light of two things.

First that they are conditioned upon acceptance of a nine-point program which, sound and enlightened for the most part, is economically unworkable in at least one detail. The union demands both price control and wage increases. That won't work.

Second, the fact that the whole problem of overtime pay is one of cost, we can produce under the present day scales. The men will work Sundays, holidays and nights at a price. So it isn't a matter of production primarily. The trouble is that even this rich nation is going to be hard-pressed by the size of the bill we are contracting in order to supply the entire anti-axis world with food and weapons. The relatively small income waived by these men whose normal shift includes Sundays, or an occasional holiday, doesn't scratch the surface of the real problem.

Give credit to the U. A. W. for a fine gesture. But let's look this gift horse in the mouth and see if he will prove worth his keep after we get him in the barn—if we do.

To satisfy President Roosevelt's war production program, we must divert so much capacity to military purposes that the remaining plant and materials will not be able to make more than \$56 billions worth of civilian supplies.

BUT in the coming fiscal year, civilians will have at least \$110 billions with which to buy such goods.

Therefore we start with the picture of civilians at an auction, all anxious to buy the commodities offered for sale, and each with more money than he can spend.

If you've ever been at an auction where everybody had relatively plenty of money, and was enthusiastic about the items offered, you don't need to be told what will happen.

Unless the setup is modified by some type of controls, prices will skyrocket as each of us tries to outbid the others for the commodities on sale.

This tendency will be exaggerated by the fact that much of the new money is in the hands of men and women who haven't been prosperous for so long that they have no ideas of saving.

The quantity of civilian goods available will be just about that of 1933, at the depth of the depression. The quantity of money, seeking to pay for such goods, will be about double what was available in 1933.

This unbalanced economy hasn't yet reached its culmination, both because employment and payrolls have not attained their peaks and because the shutoff of most civilian dispensables has not become established.

NEVERTHELESS, price inflation already has made strides. The cost of living generally has risen close to 15 per cent since the war began. The cost of food has gone up almost 20 per cent in a year. Numerous individual table items—important ones, too—have risen from 25 to as much as 65 per cent in a year.

### Secretary Of The Senate, Who Looks More Like Senator Than Senators Do Had Rather Have His Job Than FDR's

AUSTIN, Tex., (UP)—Genial Bob Barker, who has seen history made at the Texas capitol for 41 years, had rather be secretary of the state Senate than president of the United States.

Bob has been Senate secretary long enough to know whether he likes the job. He has held it continuously since 1917, and in all probability will keep it as long as he wants it. From 1903 to 1917 he was chief clerk of the Texas House of Representatives and for two years before that he worked for the state comptroller.

Does Barker ever have a thought of turning to some other work?

"No sir," he said emphatically. "I'd rather be secretary of the Senate than president of the United States."

Almost 68, Barker looks much

younger and his appearance is as much a part of the capitol as the red granite dome itself. He is heavy (250 pounds) and jolly—"Father Falstaff" he has been called. His long-cut hair, grey on top and silver at the fringes, is the envy of would-be statesmen that dignified fellow doing the

While the Senate is in session, visitors frequently ask: "Who is speaking?" It is Bob Barker, and he looks more like a senator than most senators. Maybe it's because he has been around them so long. Barker serves as reader for the Senate, as well as confidante and errand boy for its members. When a senator has a problem, he usually asks Barker's advice.

Barker has observed, and been part of, the operation of government long enough to find out its flaws; and he still is convinced

that the present representative, constitutional form of administration is the best.

It isn't perfect, he admits, but it does the most good for the most people.

"Lots of times people who don't know make some statement about everybody in politics being a crook," said Barker. "They just don't know. The Legislature is made up of average Texans, representing a good cross section of the people. And the people who vote to send them to Austin know whether their members are all right."

Barker said that the Legislature, as any other group of people, sometimes gets a bad member. "But the other members find it out soon enough and they know how to handle these fellows," he remarked.

"Do you think the quality of Legislatures is getting better?" he was asked.

"Well, it certainly isn't deteriorating any, he said. "I think you can safely say that the Legislature is keeping up with the times."

Barker said that if his personal

views were to prevail, he might make one change in Texas government. He would make the governor and other state officials elective for four instead of two years.

"The way it is now," he commented, "a fellow gets elected one year, takes office the second year, and the third year he has to run again. Makes it so he is running all the time."

Barker has served with John Nance Garner, who became vice-president of the United States, and numerous others who became nationally famous. Pat M. Neff, now president of Baylor University, was speaker of the House when Barker first became its chief clerk.

He ranks Neff and Coke Stevenson, the present governor, as the two chief executives best fitted for the job. Both served apprenticeships in the legislature, studied constantly, and have ability to apply their knowledge.

Bob's stock of stories about Texas political figures is almost inexhaustible, and most of the yarns concern legislators' experiences.

The secretary is known for his wit, mostly of an off-hand sort. He was in Dallas recently for the grand opera performances, and he came home praising the excellence of the "Barber of Pflugerville." Pflugerville is a tiny Travis county town totally unrelated to Seville, Spain, where the opera's setting is laid.

Persons who know Barker may not believe it but Barker once was a jockey. One tale is that his horse won a race, but was disqualified because Barker wasn't carrying enough weight. The metal was lost from Barker's saddle on the track.

Barker retains his interest in sports, including horse racing, but his greatest joy is fishing.

Few men in Texas have as many personal friends as Barker. They call him variously "Bob," "Mister Bob," or "Uncle Bob." He ran for public office once, for state comptroller in 1913, where his now-vindicated anti-prohibition views contributed to his defeat.

There are 31 members of the Senate, so Barker is known as the "32nd senator." When anybody

inquires about the business of the Senate, the usual advice is "ask Bob."

An oil portrait of the secretary hangs in the Senate, the only employe so honored. It was dedicated last year, along with the portrait of the late Mrs. Coke Stevenson.

In acknowledging the honor, Barker said simply: "Evil things come quickly, but good things come slowly. This is the greatest thing that has come to me in all the years of my life."

Barker is so much a fixture in the Senate that it is hardly necessary for him to run for re-election to his job every two years. Once he wrote to a senator about the coming new term of the legislature.

"Bob advised me that he is a holdover," said the senator.

A holdover member, of course, does not have to run again.

The secretary lives in Austin with his wife, a well-known Texas clubwoman. But they still call Fort Worth their home and own a

residence there.

Dr. Bob Barker Jr., of Fort Worth, is their son and Mrs. L. B. Jones of Austin is their daughter.




