The Sea Otter

The best information available indicates that the Navy was justified in its coldness toward the proposed Sea Otter type of emergency cargo ship.

This does not mean that such miniature carriers as were conceived by Commander Bryan and Warren Noble cannot be built and operated successfully. Probably they can. Nor is the reputedly high money cost of constructing and using such craft a matter of prime importance.

Rather, judging from results, the apparently irremo able objections simmer down to these:

Working day and night, Sundays and holidays, an efficient shipyard required 83 days to complete Sea Otter II after deducting a full week for an unusual weather disturbance. Liberty Ships are being turned out regularly in from 60 to 80 days. A Liberty Ship will carry 10,000 tons, a Sea

A 10,000-ton Liberty Ship average cost is \$1,500,000. The Sea Otter II cost about \$50,000 before installing certain equipment which would have been required for com pletion. This \$500 per cargo ton would have been less in mass production, but could hardly be expected to come down to the \$150-per-ton cost achieved on Liberty Ships.

The Sea Otter's automobile engines would use \$4.20 worth of gasoline per cargo ton delivered in Europe. The Liberty Ship uses 48 cents worth of fuel per cargo ton on the same run.

In order that the crew members might sleep and rest between tours of duty, the Sea Otter would require a crew of 22 officers and sailors, or roughly one for every 50 tons of cargo carried. Relief For Local Rationing Boards Is Being Sought

DALLAS - Following on the neels of Price Administrator Leon Henderson's promise to help overburdened local county rationing boards, Southyest region OPA of ficials have gone into action on several fronts to get relief to the boards.

Instructions have gone out to state OPA offices in Texas, Oklahome, Louisiana, Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas from Max L. McCullough, region OP Aadministrator, to provide adequate office person nel. Space and equipment problems of local boards also are get ting immediate action,

The Price Administrator, praising the fine work which the boards had done with the equipment at hand, foresaw expanded duties for the local groups, particularly with the price control program.

Local administration of the general maximum price regulation will be an added job for the boards. They will help distribute explanatory material on price control, and generally serve as an information center for the program.

The local boards will receive by July 1, 1842, lists of the maximum prices on cost-of-living commodities from all retail merchants in their territory. Instructions con cerning this phase of the program have gone out from the region OPA office to the state offices.




