County will continue dispatching through 2004

The county will continue with the dispatch service out of the sheriff's department as it has in the past. On Monday at their meeting, commissioners were told that they had until Nov. 1 to notify the City of Dimmitt if the county was not going to abide by the current contract where the city contributes \$15,000 a year toward paying Sheriff's Department Dispatches. Between 6 p.m. and 7 a.m., all calls made to the Dimmitt Police Department are automatically switched to the Sheriff's Department, which dispatches city officers.

The city and county have been wrangling over city-

county projects for several months, with several commissioners wanting the city to pay more for dispatching.

However, as Judge Bill Sava pointed out, "The citizens of Dimmitt already pay county taxes; if they had to pay more city taxes to pay more for dispatches, it would be like double dipping.'

But, Sava said that commissioners this year will do some studies and have a better idea of what they want to do with the dispatching service before next November rolls around. The city council and count commissioners met recently and talked about several city-county agreements, but nothing was decided.

Commissioners said that since that meeting, letters have been sent to the city asking about the dispatcher and other issues. Also on Monday, Commissioner Larry Gonzales said that the city is reneging on its promise to pay its share of more than \$7,000 for work done by the county on Cemetery Road.

Mayor Wayne Collins said he's received nothing since that meeting.

"I met with Larry and told him that we weren't going to pay anything until we renegotiate all the contracts with the county, Collins said. "We have a long-standing agreement that we pay a portion of dispatcher cost, but the issue comes Continued on Page 16

When Acker graduated from Nazareth High School he joined the Armed Forces. After that, he attended Amarillo College, where he was trained in nuclear medicine technology.



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Forum-**Changes in driving laws**

The changes range from a new point system for Texas drivers to suspending a driver license of anyone under 21 who is convicted of the manufacture, delivery, possession, transportation or use of an abusable volatile chemical.

Driver Responsibility Law House Bill 3588 of the 78th Texas Legislature establishes the Driver Responsibility Law with a point system that assigns points to moving violations classified as Class C misdemeanors and applies surcharges to offenders based on the type of offense and the time period in which the citation was received.

For each conviction, the Texas Department of Public Safety will assign points to a person's license as follows: two point sfor a moving violation conviction in Texas or that of another state; points will not be assigned for speeding less than 10 percent over the posted limit or seat belt convictions; three points for a moving violation conviction in Texas or another state that resulted in a vehicle crash.

Points remain on the driver record for three years. Additionally, a conviction that became final before Sept. 1, 2003, does not apply to the assessment of points.

This program does not replace other administrative suspension, revocations or

Driver surcharges Each year, DPS will assess a surcharge on the license of a driver who has accumulated six points or more during the preceding three-year period. The driver must pay \$100 surcharge for the first six points and \$25 for each additional point. Annual surcharges for

certain convictions

Drivers who receive a conviction for DWI or a DWI-related offense, failure to maintain financial responsibility or driving while license invalid will pay an annual surcharge of three years.

* A first-time DWI results in a \$1,000 surcharge, ; paid annually for three years.

* A second-time DWI results in a \$1,500 surcharge, paid annually for three years. The charges are cumulative.

For example, a driver could pay \$1,000 as a result a first DWI and an additional \$1,500 for a second DWI, paying \$2,500 annually.

* A conviction for driving while license is invalid or failure to maintain financial responsibility results in a surcharge of \$250, paid annually for three years. * A driver who is convicted of driving without a valid license receives a \$100 per year surcharge for three years.

The surcharge assessed for this program is in addition to administrative actions.

Driver notification of surcharge and license revocation

DPS will notify the offending driver of the assessment of a surcharge via first-class mail. The notice will state that the surcharge must be paid. Drivers who do not pay their surcharge within 30 days after the notice is sent will have their driving privileges revoked. The license will remain revoked until the person pays all surcharges and related costs, such as service/collection fees.

Gaining economic momentum By KAY B. HUTCHISON



"The good economic news keeps coming," read a recent headline in the Wall Street Journal. That positive statement is a welcome shift amidst challenging economic times. But our efforts to strengthen the economy are far from over, and the jobs picture has not yet brightened enough. In May, Congress passed a \$350 billion jobs and economic growth package to put Americans back to work and stimulate

fall, reports from Wall Street toMain Street have reflected an improved economy. Retail sales showed a 12.1 percent annualized increase over the summer, meaning we Americans are spending the extra money in their paychecks from the tax relief we passed earlier this year. Another important economic indicator signaling a strengthening economy isthe rise in new housing starts. Orders of manufactured goods continue to increase and shipments of durable goods increased this summer. The Labor Department recently reported that employers created 57,000 jobs in September - the first increase in eight months. And jobless claims are at their lowest point this year. All of this has led to stronger economic growth.

CREATING JOBS

But we need to do more. The economic growth has not yet translated into the broad job creation we would like to see. Fortunately there are a number of items on Congress' agenda that will help put more Americans back to work. The Senate is working to enact additional legislation to create and retain jobs and further accelerate economic growth. Two other items of critical importance are class action litigation reform and a bill to rein in runaway asbestos lawsuits. Class action reform will help victims receive their just financial due while

Rowland completed 13 of 27 passes for 143 yards with one interception. On defense, he had two tackles, two interceptions and two





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

Halloween safety tips

The happy ending to a child's Halloween trick-ortreat neighborhood foray usually is gobbling up as many treats as allowed by the resident grown-up.

The other successful conclusion to the Oct. 31 ritual, according to Texas Department of Health (TDH) safety experts, is the safe return of all participants.

TDH offers these safety tips for children:

* Look left, right and left again for cars and trucks before crossing the street. Walk on sidewalks. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.

* Don't cut across lawns or go through backyards, parks and alleys.

cross the street from between parked cars; go to a corner. * Never accept rides from only soft, flexible knives, strangers or take treats from someone who's in a car or truck.

* Use a flashlight and be sure it has fresh batteries.

*Always wear light-colored costumes and put reflective strips on them. Be sure so you will not trip.

* Wear comfortable shoes that fit. High heels or big or obstacles such as ladders,

floppy shoes are not safe for walking.

* Use face paint rather than a mask or hood that covers your eyes.

* Stay away from lighted candles, matches and open fires.

* Be careful around animals. Even pets you know may be scared by costumes and loud or strange noises.

* Trick-or-treat only at houses where you know the people and then only if the porch light is on.

* Don't eat any treats until they are checked by an adult.

TDH offers these safety suggestions for adults:

Look for a "flame resistant" label on costumes, masks, beards and wigs. Use * Don't hide behind cars or fire-resistant materials when making costumes.

> * Be sure children carry swords or other props.

Accompany trick-or-* treaters under 12. * Set a time for older

children to be home. Know the route they will take.

* Never let a child go trickor-treating alone. Be sure at costumes are short enough least two buddies go together.

* Remove breakable items

tools and toys from your yard.

Keep jack-o''-lanterns * and lighted candles away from areas where costumes or paper decorations might touch the flame.

TDH offers this safety information for motorists: * Slow down in residential neighborhoods.

* Watch for children in the street or on medians and curbs. Be especially aware that children may cross the street in the middle of the block.

* Enter and exit driveways slowly and carefully.

* If you are driving children around for trickor-treating, be sure they get in and out of the car on the curb side of the car, away from traffic.

* Do not wear a Halloween mask while driving.

Parents need to remind children about safety dos and don''ts every year.

Parents still need to check all treats.

Look at the wrapping carefully, and throw away anything that looks suspicious.

Inspect fruit for any punctures or holes. Wash fruit carefully and cut open before eating.

The man brushed off the reaction as ignorance, but the smirks began to get to him. He looked one of the rude men square in the eye, placed his hand beneath the ribbon and asked, quizzically, "This?" With that the men all began to laugh out loud. The man he addressed said, as he fought back laughter, "Hey, sorry man, but we were just commenting on how pretty your pink ribbon looks against your blue jacket!"

The middle aged man calmly motioned for the joker to come over to his table, and invited him to sit down. As uncomfortable as he was, the guy obliged, not really sure why. In a soft voice, the middle aged man said, "I wear this ribbon to bring awareness about breast cancer. I wear it in my mother's honor." "Oh, sorry dude. She died of breast cancer?" "No she didn't. She's alive and well. But her breasts nourished me as an infant, and were a soft resting place for my head when I was scared or lonely as a little boy. I'm very grateful for my mother's breasts and her health." "Umm," the stranger replied, "yeah."

"And I wear this ribbon to honor my wife," the middle aged man went on. "And she's okay too?", the other guy asked. Oh, yes she's fine. Her breasts have been a great source of loving pleasure for both of us and with them she nurtured and nourished our beautiful daughter 23 years ago. Breast cancer is the common cancer among American women...

Symptoms that should not be ignored:

- A thickening or lump on the breast or under the arm
- A change in the breast's size or shape
- Nipple discharge and scaly, dimpled or puckered skin on the breast.
- A mass or lump, which may feel as small as a pea.
- Redness of the skin on the breast or nipple.
- · Marble-like hardened area under the skin.

These changes may be found when performing monthly breast self-exams. By performing breast self-exams, you can become familiar with the normal monthly changes in your breasts. These tests should be performed at the same time each month, three to five days after your menstrual cycle.

What is breast cancer?

Cells in the body normally divide (reproduce) only when new cells are needed. Sometimes, cells in a part of the body grow and divide out of control, which creates a mass of tissue called a tumor. If the cells that are growing out of control are normal cells, the tumor is

What causes breast cancer?

We do not know what causes breast cancer, although we do know that certain risk factors may put you at higher risk of developing it. Such as, a person's age, genetic factors, personal health history and diet all contribute to breast cancer risk.

How is breast cancer diagnosed?

During your regular physical examination your doctor will take a careful personal and family history and perform a breast-examination and possibly one or more other tests.

Mammography

• Ultrasonography Based on the results of these tests, your doctor may or may not request a biopsy to get a sample of the breast mass cells or tissue. After the sample is removed it is sent for testing. Laboratory tests, such as hormone receptor tests (estrogen and progesterone) can show whether the hormones help the cancer to grow. If the test results show that hormones help the cancer grow (a positive test) the cancer is likely to respond to hormonal treatment. Therapy deprives the cancer of the estrogen hormone.

called benign (not cancerous.) If however, the cells that are growing out of control are abnormal and


don't function like the body's normal cells, the tumor is called malignant (cancerous.)

How can I protect myself from breast cancer?

Follow these three steps for early detection:

- 1. Get a mammogram.
- Examine your breasts each month after age 20. You will become familiar with the contours and feel of your breasts and will be more alert to changes.
- 3. Have your breast examined by a healthcare
- provider at least once every three years after age 20, and every year after age 40.
 Clinical breast exams can detect lumps that may not be detected by mammogram.

up periodically over what is the city's fair share on these

sorts of things. "We're willing to talk about these things at any time. We don't want to talk

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about the dispatcher exclusively. We want to talk about the fire departments, the landfill, the things that are city-owned and that county residents use.

pay county taxes and this is one of the only services the county provides for the city."

In other action, the commissioners decided to get more information about indigent burials after Foskey-Lilley-McGill told them they're going to increase costs of indigent burial from \$600 to \$800 and instead of charging the county \$200 for opening and closing a grave, that cost will be \$345, a total of \$1,145. Immediate cremation would cost the county \$600.

"We're going to do some checking," Sava said.

"We'll check with funeral homes in the area and see what they're charging; we want to make sure what other cities are charged, because \$1,145 from about \$800 is a pretty good increase."

Sava said at least one surrounding county has gone to the option of immediate cremation.
