The Shape Of Total War

It is possible to say with little exaggeration that Oliver Lyttleton's accounting of the British war effort is a non-fiction, 1942 "What Price Glory" or "Farewell to Arms."

We, on this side of the Atlantic, have heard and read soul-searing accounts of the horrors of war where bombs are bursting, machine guns spraying, incendiaries firing, bayonets splitting human bodies.

Piecemeal, bit by bit, we have been told something of the social and economic effects of total war in a democracy and of its even more scarifying effects in the totalitarian countries.

But Lyttleton, the Donald Nelson of Great Britain, has given us frankly, factually and without adornment, a picture of the complete readjustment that such war means to civilians.

Every man and woman is subject to draft to work or fight. They cannot take jobs at will and move on when they please. They are frozen at their machines.

Women work long hours—up to 55 a week—often at tasks that every man hates to think of having women do.

Boys and girls from 14 years up are almost universally engaged in war work on farms or in factories—not pin money, occasional tasks, but day-by-day drudgery that frees men for fighting and for even more onerous labors.

Not only has production of civilian goods been cut to the bone, but manufacturers have had to see the patronage they had laboriously acquired turned over to rivals, so their own factories might be used for war goods.

Food is rationed. Money doesn't count. Cabinet ministers and factory workers, millionaires and subsistence level laborers, each is entitled to the same amount.

Clothing is rationed. The rich can have better quality, to be sure, but for each woman, whatever her income or bank balance, there is one coat, one dress one pair of shoes, one nightgown, one set of undergarments, two pairs of hose and four handkerchiefs for this year.

After July 1 the ordinary civilian will get no gasoline at all.

Income taxes start at the \$450-a-year level, and climb fast to the almost completely confiscatory rate of 97 1/2 cents on the dollar.

This is the barest skeleton of what Mr. Lyttleton tells us of what total war means after the danger of death or maiming has been discounted.

We, too, are a party in this total war against Hitlerism. What are we civilians suffering that can be mentioned in the same breath as John Bull's troubles?

Labor Committees And War Boards Working Together

COLLEGE STATION — County USDA war boards should take the lead in working out solutions for farm labor shortage problems, the Texas USDA War Board informed the 254 county boards in Texas this week.

In a joint letter to county war boards and county victory councils, B. F. Vance, chairman of the state board and H. H. Williamson, chairman of the State Agricultural Victory Council, declared the "final responsibility for farm labor reports and planning shall rest with the County War Boards" County boards were instructed to make full use of farm labor sub-committees which have been making monthly surveys of the labor situation for the past year.

The letter suggested that the labor sub-committee serve as the county advisory committee to the county war boards and that membership on the committee include five farmer members and representatives of the U. S. Employment Service and the WPA.

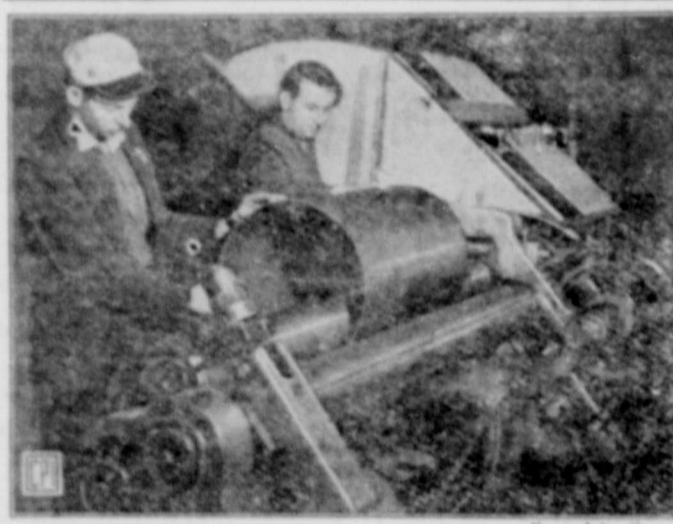
The County War Board and the Farm Labor Advisory Committee shall take the initiative and the leadership in the prosecution of farm labor planning and the execution of such plans as may be recommended," the agricultural officials said.

The county board must make monthly reports to the state board, combining information concerning the previously announced 12-point farm labor program and information about the labor situation which previously was reported by the labor sub-committee.

EVERY CANADIAN IS FIGHTING



THE power and precision with which the rubber bonds a steel plate into a perfect circle to make a depth charge reflects the spirit of Canada's war program. It will be shared by both ends, water-prowded and filled with high explosives, to be loaded aboard a ship of the Royal Canadian Navy engaged in ridding the Atlantic waters of Nazi submarines. With the growing need for manpower in the armed services, war industries and agriculture, Canada's new selective service legislation is directing workers in "non-essential" categories into war work as enrollment and restrictions on civilian goods make an increasing number of workers available. In the next year 200,000 volunteers will be drafted into the armed services, thousands will be called up for compulsory military service and 100,000 men and women must be found for war industries. Recognizing the need for maintaining farm production, the government has granted indefinite postponement of military service for agricultural workers. They may enlist as volunteers in the armed forces but must not accept non-agricultural work without special permission. Training center and placement services have been established to introduce more women into war industry and transportation may be arranged to an area where women workers are required. Men fit for military service between 17 and 45 years are barred from accepting employment in a long list of restricted occupations which include almost every civilian job not connected with war work. Every Canadian is affected in some measure by the regulations.

Without that performance, the mile and a half Belmont Stakes would have been considered a walkaway for Almah. Speaking of Marshall Lilley prompts the old-timer to tell you that attention, competence in treatment and well-planned training goes with the good horse.

LIFE of a race horse cannot be called gay. He leads the life of a monk in a sanctuary. Not once is he allowed to breathe the free air, except when properly conducted. Rationed food, water, everything.

He obtains exercise as his handler ordains. He displays his skill at the command of his master. He can't make any suggestions such as: "I feel right today. Let's go out and beat that guy." A horse must not be confused with a machine. He has no chance to be more than his trainer makes him.

That is why the good trainer knows his horse as he does his son... so well that he can speak to him in the first person.

Billions Are Likely to Give Way to Trillions With Mars Operating the Adding Machine

IF you're still sitting up nights trying to think of a good name for this war, you might consider calling it "The Trillion-Dollar War." Spawning gibberish in terms of billions of dollars has become common during the defense era. But before this fracas is over, someone may speak of a trillion dollars as the cost and be talking sense.

After all, a trillion dollars is only 1000 billions. Total U. S. appropriations have already reached \$190 billion and undoubtedly will be \$200 billion before you can say "Where a you going on your vacation, dearie—if you get a vacation?"

Two hundred billion dollars is a fifth of a trillion dollars, and when you consider that anybody's and everybody's money is good in this kind of a spending spree, it doesn't take much arithmetic to multiply \$200 billion by five and get \$1000 billion.

No one really knows what the war is costing now. The statistics for 1941 are already an obsolete as to be ancient history. A guess would be that military expenditures in 1941 ran close to \$100 billion. There you are again. A 10-year war even at that piker's pace of spending would give you a trillion-dollar expense account.

Best estimates on war expenditures in 1941 run something like this: United States... \$35 billion Great Britain... 25 " Russia... 10 " Germany... 8 " France (including occupation)... 9 " Japan... 6 " Italy... 4.5 "

There's \$95.5 billion a year for you, and it omits the expenditures of Canada, China, Netherlands, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Finland and others.

JUST how obsolete those figures are is indicated by the U. S. expenditures. While this country spent \$35 billion in 1941, the estimate for fiscal year 1943 is \$77 billion and it may go higher. The sky is apparently the limit in this slip-happy lease-land.

Lower standards of living, lower wage scales, lower costs of materials and the depreciated currencies of other countries are also reflected in those figures. Soviet Russia, for instance, with an army and a military machine and a war effort far vaster than anything in this country, gets by with a budget of from a third to a seventh as big, in dollar exchange equivalent. In the Soviet, too, all the profit has been wrung out of war costs.

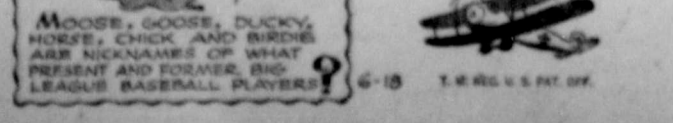

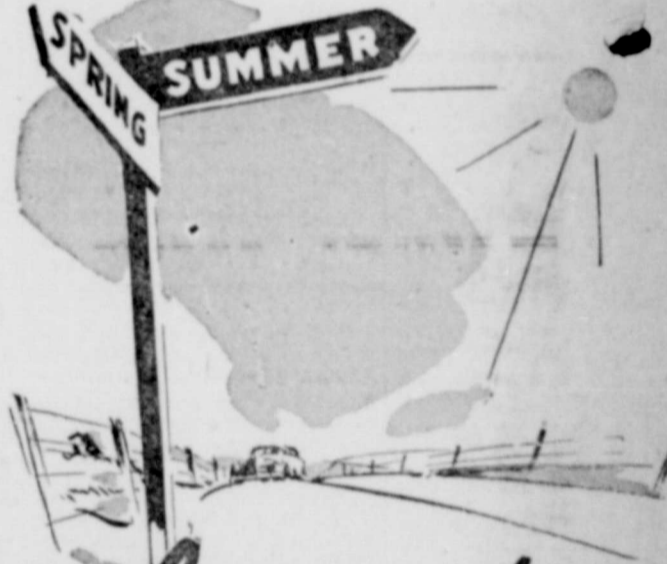

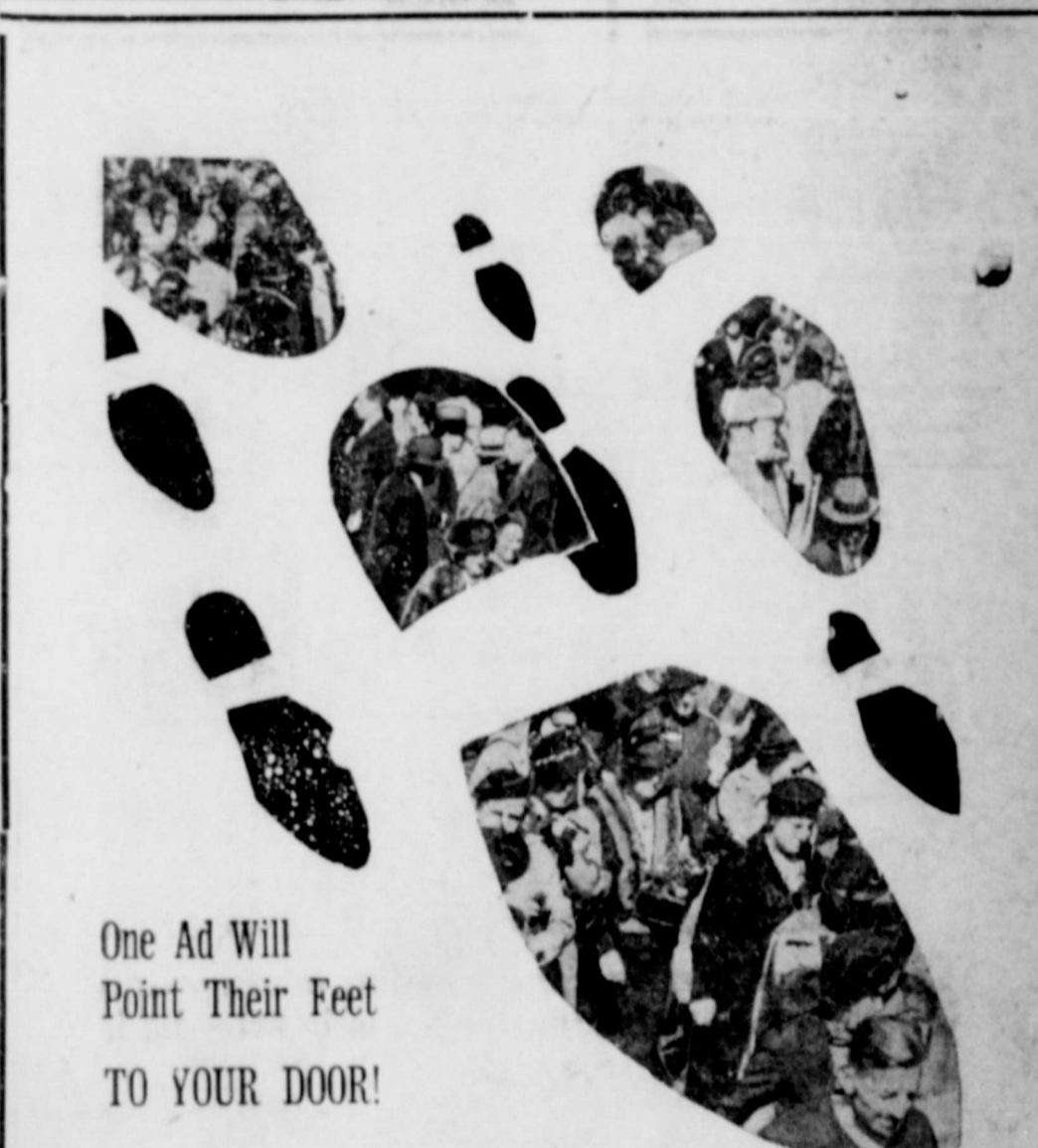
