State Employment Being Put Under Civil Service Rule

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)-Employment in Texas state departments gradually is being brought under civil service. Texas cannot have strict civil service because of a provision of the state constitution that persons cannot be given empleyment continuing beyond the term of the appointing officer.

A modified system known as the merit system is in use. It requires applicants for certain pos itions to qualify by taking tests and the appointments are made from a eligible list—just as a done. Wer civil service.

Three agencies now must selec. their employes from a merit sys cem list. Other departments are privileged to do so.

The three required to use the merit system are the Unemployment Compensation Commission the Employment Service and the Public Welfare Department.

Altogether there are about 3 500 employes who hold jobs under the merit system. About 2,000 of these retained jobs they held prior Services under the new allowance wick pillow, and used a pink candle and allotment act. about 1,500 have been selected as hew employes from merit lists.





There is little chance of an obectionable book getting into the Texas schools, After a publisher is found for the book, he submits copies of it to each member of a state textbook committee which made up of teachers.

This committee reads all books that many are considered suitable. These foiur then go before the state board of education, which considers both the books and their cost, and makes the awards.

Even after that the book can be censored. A revision committee goes over it again and the pub lishers must agree to make whatever changes ordered by the rev

BEAUFORD JESTER HAS CONSTRUCTIVE PROGRAM TO HELP WIN THE WAR

"Proper Regulation of Transportation and Oil Production are Essential to Our War Efforts"

ELECT A WAR VETERAN AS YOUR WARTIME RAILROAD COMMISSIONER ON AUG. 22, 1942

1. The first and primary duties of my service as Railroad Commissioner wiff be to expedite the war efforts in Texas in every way and in any way possible. The production of oil and the regulation of transportation are as important to the war progtram as the production of guns, tanks and ships. The greatest oil producing state in the union must put in full petraleum resources to work as the government demands.

2. When America is victorious and peace comes again, private industry, which developed both oil production and the transportation system in Texas, must again take charge. This post war adjustment must be carefully planned in advance so that hese two great industries, which render such a tremendous tax revenue to the state, shall not be alowed to disintegrate through any post war depression or let down. We must plan to return the men to these industries, who have gone to the firing ines, to their positions as wage earners. There must be carefully planned post war economy for these industries we must guard against economic col-

3. After the war the oil industry of Texas should not be regulated by the Federal Government. Such regulation rightly belongs to the State of Texas through its duly elected Railroad Commission. In this emergency the oil interests of 48 states are pooled to win the war. After the war the long established Democratic doctrine of states rights should prevail.

4. Realizing that after the war aviation will come into its own, the Railroad Commission should so plan for its rapid expansion that all parts Texas will be provided with airmail, air express freght and passenger service. 

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
