farms four miles east of Nazareth is now using a system of irrigation which has possibilities on a great number of farms in this This system which Mr. Birken-

feld is using is that of pumping water from a lake and using it to irrigate his grain sorghum crop. Mr. Birkenfeld states that he is able to obtain some very economical irrigation by using this method since no great expence is involved in furnishing the necessary equipment, and operating costs are less than in conventional pumping from irrigation wells.

Mr. Birkenfeld is using a centriffugal pump with a suction pipe in the lake. This pump is run by a belt on his farm tractor. By using approximately one hundred and fifty feet of steel pipe and seven hundred feet of canvas pipe, he is able to pump around eight hundred gallons of water per minute into his irrigation ditch out of which he waters from fifteen to twenty acres of grain sorghums.

Not all of the lakes in our area are located so that the lake water can be pumped out and used economically, but there are several whose location makes it very practicable to use them for irrigation, as on Mr. Birkenfeld's

Mr. Birkenfeld received technical assistance from the Dimmitt office of the Soil Conservation Service in the design and layout of his irrigation system.

BUDDY CALHOUN

By Ted Kesting

The literature of sporting dogs holds no subject more fascinating than that of scent. No man is sure of himself on this topic.

I have just gotten a copy of Youatt on the Dog, published in 1852. Since this book is rare and perhaps few of you will have seen it, I think it's worth while to quote parts of the chapter on TULIA. scent.

". . . M. Majendie instituted some curious experiments on the sence of smelling, and he was led to believe that it depended more on the olfactory nerve . . . The simple fact, however, is that there are two species of nerves here concerned—those of common and peculiar sensation. The olfactory nerve is the nerve of smelling, the fifth pair that of common sensation. They are to a certain degree necessary to each other.

"Mr. Daniel, in his work on the chase, very properly observes that the scent most favorable to the hound is when the effluvium, constantly perspired from the game as it runs, is kept by the gravity of the air at the height of his breast. It is then neither above his reach nor does he need to stoop for it.'

"When the leaves begin to fall the scent does not lie well in the cover. It frequently alters materially in the same day. When the ground is hard and the air dry, there will seldom be much scent. The scent rarely lies with a north or east wind. A southerly wind without rain is the best. Sudden storms are sure to destroy the scent. A fine sunshiney day is not good; but a warm day without sun is always a good one . . In a hard rain, if the air is mild, the scent will sometimes be very good. A wet night often produces the best chases.

"But after all, we have much to learn concerning scent. An experienced sportsman will never presume to make sure of scent. Yet it is certain that hounds can distinguish not only the scent of the hare from that of the fox, but that of the hare or the fox they are persuing from that of hair a dozen others that may be started during a chase."

Pointers and setters of course, are not properly trailing dogs. They are supposed to seek for and 'take' body scent of feathered game out of the air. One theory on body scent as explained by Horace Lytle, authority on sporting dogs, is that it floats out cone shaped through the air.

A dog first picks up a faint trace of body scent way out and works back into it toward the small end of the cone, stopping to point when the scent becomes so





Once seeing the patients of this hospital it is hard to get them off the mind, especially knowing that adequate personel and equipment could restore many of the patients to their home and society, but as it is many will remain there for the rest of

Of course some cases would never be cured, but many of our most competent citizens are confined there for the duration of their lives because of a nervious breakdown or other mental disorder. It's just plain bad business under the present conditions. It must be changed.




