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So Many Spokesmen

Reverting to the subject of loose talk in high places, it should be remarked that Draft Director Hershey, in his confusing conflict about the calling of fathers, is not the only offender. He is not even the worst, unless because the military draft is so necessarily heart-wracking a matter.

The radio nad newspaper accounts are filled with confusion created by half-baked statements from those who should be careful what they say. This has nothing to do with the privilege conceded to almost everybody to express opinions. It refers to statements of alleged fact to opinions by persons so highly placed that in time of war censirship their expressed ideas are the closest the public can get to the facts.

The controversy over the rubber situation was a prime illustration. That is about washed up, but the spieling of conflicting "facts" goes on apace.

In adjoining columns the newspapers quote the head of the War Labor Board tha that wages must be kept up so that the standard of living may be maintained, and quote the head of OPA that the standard of living must be reduced to its lowest point in modern times.

A news magazine of wide circulation ventures to warn the British Empire at length and with apparent authority what all America is thinking, and then has to explain that it didn't mean what its words seemed to say,

An aviation expert declares flatly that our war planes are almost scandalously bad, and another asserts just as assuredly that they are the best in the world.

The Army says a flying fortress sank a specific enemy ship, and a Naval aviation hero in an officially approved interview says the Army's land-vased planes never sank anything.

An admiral writes two artilces for a national magazine to prove that military avation should not be made an independent arm, and reserve Army officer is forbidden to express his counter opinion.

Wendell Willkie, on a trip around the world on which he is acting as messenger for the President says that what his agent thinks isn't worth reading.

We do not suggest that these and other offenders be muzzled. We think they should not. Free speech is one of the things for which we are fighting.

All we ask is that men whose words command public attention exercise the minimum of discretion required of the cubblest of newspaper reporters, and finding out the facts before they start talking.

If the full story of the war could be told now, you might be able to read not only the official communiques of the Army and Navy but also an occasional economic communique, telling how the forces armed more with dollars than with bullets, sent into all sorts of inaccessible places to get out

will improve your cooking by following these scientific hints for
better use of your gas stove.
Keep top burners brushed clean
with a stiff brush. Flame should
be clear blue for efficiency. If not,
call a service man.
Use large pans over large burn-

call a service man.

Use large pans over large burners and small pans over small burners. The idea that cooking can be speeded by rapid boiling is wrong; water boils at 212 deg. F., and a simmer flame will maintain gentle boiling, cook the food just as quickly and cook it properly to retain nutrients, and at the same time save half the gas needed for rapid boiling.

rapid boiling. Heat water for cooking vegeta-Heat water for cookin, vegetables in the same pot you will cook the vegetables in. Use only just the amount of water you will need. Always use a cover. Use as little water as possible. It not only takes less gas to heat, but saves waste of minerals and vitamins in the food.

Turn on top flame only when you are ready to put utensil on it. Turn flame off the minute you are through with it. Do not walk across the kitchen to get a pan while the top burner is on—it is just a uscless waste of fuel. Get in the habit of saving every second of flame.



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
