Drouth Is Broken By Rain, Snow And Sleet In Panhandle-Plains

Rain, which began falling Sunday morning, followed by snow and sleet as a cold wave moved into the Panhandle and brought new hope to wheat farmers who were about to despair of a crop due to the continued dry weather. Combined moisture from the three-day fall amounted to 1.20 inches according to the guage at the Hays Implement Company. Although the mercury hovered around zero during the first part of the week very little damage resulted to livestock according to reports.

Snow and sleet, which began thawing Wednesday is saturating the soil and gives promise of an excellent wheat crop.





I have been reading strange and wonderful things about the affects of altitude and cold on rifles, things that made me wonder why I never have similar experiences. Actually, most of the strange behavior of the rifle is caused by the shooter violating some principle that every rifle shooter should know.

Here are practically all the precautions you should take to insure that your hunting rifle will always deliver shot well into game, at least when you aim and squeeze the trigger properly. These suggestions are from Col. Townsend Whelen, noted arms and ammunition authority.

Don't take it for granted that your rifle, as it comes from the factory or gunsmith, is correctly sighted for you, for the ammunition you use, and for the distance you want.

If you have your rifle sighted in for you by a friend who is a good shot, always verify this sighting yourself. He may not aim and hold the rifle as you do.

If you change ammunition, verify the sight adjustment with the new load. Two makes of cartridges, both with the same weight bullet and same advertised velocity, may and may not shoot to the same center of impact.

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


Fertilizer Shortage Is Predicted Here

Fertilizer that fixed for county purposes. will be hard to get in view of the big demand, and the cost of it when it can be had will be at these funds in advance for bond least as high as it was last year. funding purposes, which would In a few cases, it may run slightly higher.

Nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash will be available, says R. L. King, County Agent. But he goes on to say that even though fertilizers may be available, the demand this coming year is expected to be the greatest in all history. And this is especially true of the nitrogen fertilizers.

King points out that the commercial manufacturers can produce and supply only a certain amount each month. So the manufacturers has to spread his production out over a twelve-month period. He puts out some this month, some next month, and some the following month. Here King wants to point out that if a factory doesn't put out any nitrogen fertilizer one month, it cannot manufacture two months' supply the next month, In other words, allocations will not carry over from one month to the next. Right now the fertilizer factories say that the fertilizer isn't moving out of their plants. They're all stocked up. It's for this very reason the fertilizer production is going pretty slow right now, King says.

All this adds up to another fertilizer shortage again this spring unless the dealers and the farmers themselves do something to brighten the picture. Here's what they can do, he says. Everybody that plans to use fertilizer this spring should order part of his estimated needs right now.

If the farmers and dealers will start the ball rolling, the manufacturers will be able to move the fertilizer out of their factories. (Continued from page 1.)


