Hammond will speak on current issues: (1) freedom; (2) who shall speak for farmers; (3) will a part of the money to build highways be tractor gasoline taxes; (4) what will be the farm labor and machinery situation this year?

The meeting will be one step in launching a membership campaign in the 15 counties. Presently, of the 50,000 members in the Texas Farm Bureau, 7,600 are from this area.

## Irrigation and Soil Fertility Meeting Scheduled Feb. 13

An Irrigation and Soil Fertility meeting is being planned for Castro County Wednesday Feb. 13. This meeting will be held in the Carlisle Theatre in Dimmitt and will start at 9:30 a. m. and will end at approximately 4:00 p. m. A very informative program is being planned for all those interested persons that can attend.

Specialists that will appear on the program include A. H. Crain, pasture and ensilage specialist from A & M College at College Station, Mr. Robert Thurmond, irrigation specialist from Lubbock, Mr. Fred Dines, wheat specialist from Amarillo, and Mr. Don Jones from the Lubbock Experiment Station. Tentative subjects to be covered will include irrigated pastures and ensilage, irrigation methods and practices, cotton under irrigation, and soil conservation through use of legumes and irrigated pastures.

A number of irrigation and soil fertility meetings are being scheduled over this area and these specialists know the farmers and land owners problems so all persons interested in doing a better job of soil and water conservation in 1952 are urged to be present at this meeting.

This meeting is being sponsored by the Castro County Soil Conservation Service and the Extension Service.

## High Plains Citizens Requested to Help Finance Water District Battle

Citizens of Castro County and other Panhandle-Plains counties in the shallowwater irrigation belt, and especially in the established water districts, are being urged to contribute funds to fight a court action to destroy a water district embracing Martin County on the lower South Plains. Farmers are being requested to contribute on a \$5.00 per well basis.

Sponsors of the local movement point out that the Supreme Court of Arizona has recently ruled that all underground water belongs to the state, and that if the present water laws in Texas are held invalid there is danger of the same action in this state. Local concern stems from the fact that the Martin County Water Conservation District is set up under the same law that governs the local conservation district and that any threat to the legality of that district is a threat to all districts.

According to reports received here the cities of Big Spring and Odessa had purchased land in Martin County for the location of municipal water wells and when the farmers of the district voted proration of underground water the two cities took the case to court and are, or will, attempt to abolish the water district.

## General Yard Reminders For Month of February

February is the last month for planting shrubs and trees in most of Texas. Remember this. Plant shrubs for screening outbuildings, barns, work areas and for wind-breaks.

Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that the lawn should be leveled and fertilized. Make the grounds easy to mow by taking up scattered shrubs and flower beds. An unbroken lawn makes a good background against which all the landscape is seen. February also

is time to plant grass, continues Miss Hatfield. There are several grasses which may be used for Texas lawns. With the wide variety of soils and climate, no one grass is best adapted to all areas. Selection of the grass desired may be based on personal preference. Consult the local county extension agents for grasses best suited to particular areas.

Check the dusting and spraying equipment to see whether it is in working condition. If it is not repair or buy new ones. Learn where and when to use insect and disease controls such as sulphur, chlordane and nicotine sulphate (Black Leaf 40).

be considered his means of livelihood, his nose is his fortune. Everyone's nose might well be considered his fortune, however, and the interpretation that it is a means of getting food might fit in to the picture of health, with a nose in the middle. The original Greek word from which "proboscis" was taken means leading to pasture, painting a picture of a shepherd taking his flock into fields where they could eat and gain strength.

The nose can be well considered the shepherd of the body, and a good shepherd it is. The flock could be all those organs inside of you, each part of you that requires the food from the air that the nose pulls in to the body. So good is your shepherding nose, however, that your flock stays put, more or less, and the shepherd sees that the food gets where the flock is tethered.

What does the nose do about the food it picks up in the air? In the first place, it guards against impurities by thousands of little hairs, thick little hairs which try to catch and cleanse the impurities before they get started to the organs of the body. There are many impurities in the air, of course, and the nose has two scrub teams working hard all the time, one in each nostril, just a-scrubbing and a-washing to beat the band.

With so much action going on in the nose, the air is also heated so that the "flock" of organs that will receive nourishment from the air won't get a cold blast from the outside. The good shepherd takes care of everything.

Some things have no place among the flock that the nose guards. Take pepper, for instance. That is a fine fodder for the flock that the mouth feeds, the organs of digestion. But pepper does the respiratory flock, which is fed by the nose, no good; so when the nose gets hold of some pepper, it sends a signal down the line that a "wolf" is at the door, and the whole flock of respiratory organs gang up to shoo the wolf away—it comes out more "ker-shoo" than "shoo," however.

There are several oven-like jobs adjoining the nose, back inside the face. These are the sinuses, which might be considered the depository for real stubborn impurities that the normal scrubbing doesn't clean up enough for the flock. They are also lined with sticky hairs but since they are enclosed within the body they could provide a little more heat for the impurities and maybe "get" a few more bugs than the normal nasal channel could catch. Maybe they could be considered to do a scalding job after the air has already been washed.

The hard palate, the arched top of your mouth, is the floor of the nasal cavity. From the nose, the air goes through the nasal cavity with all its sinuses, they hit a downward dip called the pharynx, which is the throat.

The pharynx may be pictured as something like a lighthouse. The dome of the pharynx is jammed up against the bottom of the skull, the bone that encloses the brain. The dome is right at the beginning of the downward dip from the nasal cavity, called the nasopharynx, the spot noted for the growth of adenoids. Since that light in the dome of the lighthouse hits the air as it passes but has no connection with the food that goes through the mouth, it may be considered as the electric eye that tells the air food it's supposed to head off for the forward track down the way, going down the windpipe or trachea instead of taking the backward track, the gullet or esophagus, which is the route of food from the mouth.

Anyway, however, it knows what to do, the air swishes past the mouth opening (there by the tonsils) and takes out for the epiglottis, that trapdoor that flaps over the windpipe. This epiglottis does not open for solid foods under normal conditions though it seems that kernels of beans and corn often have a way of getting off the back track and going into the front track, the trachea, where they don't belong, and causing much consternation.

From the epiglottis, the air skids down the mostly lined larynx, past the voice box, splitting off into various branches at the bronchial tubes and finally landing up in the lungs.

Sheep scabies, Psoroptes Communis Ovis, has been determined the cause of quarantine of all Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards, according to representatives of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, and authorized by Gov. Allan Shivers. The infectious and

contagious disease has caused sale of infected sheep through livestock sales, causing the spread of the sheep menace. The Livestock Sanitary Commission has felt the imperative need to adopt the following regulations governing the removal of sheep from the quarantined sales rings:

1. "No sheep shall be moved interstate therefrom (except for immediate slaughter purposes) without first having been dipped one time in a wettable Benzene Hexachloride solution containing a gamma isomer concentration of not less than 0.06 per cent, under the supervision of a representative of the Commission or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry and accompanied by written permit or certificate, issued by a representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry.

2. "At the time of dipping, all sheep shall be counted and paint branded for the purpose of identification and shall be held apart, in non-infectious pens from sheep that have not been dipped.

3. "It is further provided that sheep shall be removed within ten days following the date of dipping.

4. "Sheep sold for immediate slaughter purposes, and consigned directly to slaughtering establishments, maintaining Federal or Municipal post mortem veterinary inspection, shall be exempt from this regulation.

5. "It shall be the duty of the owners, operators or managers of Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards to provide necessary dipping vats and pens, together with dipping fluid and materials for dipping said sheep, and to provide sufficient help in order that sheep required to be dipped under this regulation, may be dipped in a manner calculated to eradicate infection or exposure as the case may be.

6. "It is also provided that owners, operators or managers of Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards are to clean and refill vats when deemed necessary by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or its authorized representatives, provided however, that no dipping solution shall be used which has been mixed and in the vat more than ten days."

**Chickenpox Increases During Winter and Spring Months**

Chickenpox cases are most numerous in winter and spring says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Ordinarily, people do not consider it a serious disease. But probably the most serious factor is that light cases of smallpox and the symptoms of chickenpox are similar. Only a physician can tell the difference. At the first sign of skin eruptions, you should put the patient in bed and call the family doctor.  
As in any other illness, chickenpox lowers body resistance to other disease germs. Thus, complica-

tions such as pneumonia, inflammation of the kidneys, erysipelas, and gangrene of the skin may occur, resulting in a serious illness.  
Chickenpox is highly contagious. It usually develops two to three weeks after exposure. After one attack, the patient is immune to the disease. Although chickenpox occurs most frequently among children less than fifteen years of age, adults, too, can get the disease if they did not have it when they were children.  
The chickenpox germ gains entrance to the body through the mouth and nose. Skin eruptions of a sick person contain the germs. The disease spreads rapidly through families and schools, as

an infected person can spread his germs widely by careless coughing, using a common drinking cup, towel, or washcloth. For his own welfare and to protect others the patient should stay in bed and apart from susceptible members of the household until all danger of spreading the disease is passed.  
Control of chickenpox is important because the disease is so highly infectious that it attacks large numbers of children. This interferes greatly with school attendance. The control of chickenpox and all other communicable diseases depends upon the cooperation of parents with their family physicians, and school and health authorities.
