NEA Service Washington Correspondent GASOLINE rationing in the 17 Atlantic seaboard states has come so

close to breaking down in the last few weeks that it amounts to

tenths of the publishers.

An estimated 2.5 million gallons of gas a day have apparently been going into black market sales throughout this area, sold with bootlegged coupons, and the only thing which is saving the situation is the expiration of the present system of rationing on Dec. 1, with the imposition of new restrictions on Nov. 21. It is hoped these new restrictions, including the lower-ing of the basic A ration from four to three gallons in 16 eastern states, will plug the leaks.

Experience with gasoline rationing thus far has made it appear that the success of the rationing program in general is going to depend on the abil-ity of rationing officials to devise controls faster than the small percentage of cheap chiselers in the United States can devise ways to beat them. Estimates of the amount of gasoline which the

8.5 million civilian motor vehicles in this 17-state area should consume under existing rationing were placed originally at 460,000 barrels a day. Instead of that, consumption has been at the rate of 520,000 barrels a day. The difference, 60,000 barrels, figures out to the colossal leakage of 2.5 million gallons a day. War Necessity. 




