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Scrappy Does It

When the nation's steel mills were facing slowdowns for lack of scrap, the War Production Board called on the newspapers to conduct an all-out drive to supply the deficiency.

They did. Whirlwind drives, in which the papers turned news and editorial columns into promotional organs for the salvaging of scrap, brought six million tons of iron, steel and other strategic metals to the country's junk yards.

This paper is proud of its part in this spectacularly successful war effort, and proud to belong to a business which gave of itself so universally, so intensively, and so effectively. But that is only in passing.

The significance of the scrap drive's success is that once again it has been proved that the way to get results is to concentrate, hammer and tongs, for a limited period, rather than to amble along rather half-heartedly day after day.

There had been previous appeals for scrap. They failed, in the grand sense, because they were humdrum, uninspiring. The newspapers' fast, hard-hitting drive, conducted at a tempo that could be maintained only for a limited time, did the job.

Canada has demonstrated the same principle in its Victory Loan drives, of which three of three weeks' duration have been staged since the middle of 1941.

There have been two drives of the casual sort previously. These sold, together, a half billion dollars worth of war bonds, equivalent—on the basis of relative national wealth—to seven billions in the United States.

Then the new National War Finance Committee took over and ballyhooed the three Victory Bond drives—with every device of modern promotional science.

In three recent weeks such a "blitz" disposed of a billion dollars worth of victory bonds, equivalent to about \$14,000,000,000 of sales in the United States.

If, since the middle of 1940, we had done as well as Canada, we would have sold \$40,000,000,000 worth.

Some believe that Americans have gone intellectual since 1918—that we have risen above our emotions—that we discount appeals to the heart, and are ruled solely by our heads. These are opposed to parades, bands, theatrical stunts, minute-men orators everywhere to drum up enthusiasm.

Perhaps they're right. But their method did not get in the scrap, and the newspapers' blitz succeeded. Their method has not sold enough bonds, and the Canadians blitz has. Perhaps they're wrong.

It won't be long till people can stand out in the snow in bathing suits in order to get their picture in the paper.

Individual Goodness Sets Example For All of Society, Bible Teaches

Text: Matthew 5:13-16; Mark 12:13-17; I Peter 2:13-17

The various titles of this lesson are interesting. The topic for intermediate students is "How the Church Serves," and for young people and adults "The Church's Ministry to the Community, the State, the World." But best of all is the main title, "The Value of the Church to the Social Order."

The passages chosen are significant. First of all is that portion of the Sermon on the Mount in which Jesus speaks of the salt of the earth, and likens them to a lamp set on a stand so that it shines for all. This is the individual and personal aspect of the value of the Church to the social order. It lays stress upon the saints, and there cannot be a good society or a good social order where there are not good individual citizens.

As someone once put it, "You cannot build a marble palace out of mud bricks." A Christian citizen who is practicing his religion inevitably influences those around him. His good character and his good works are a constant invitation to others to follow his example, and he becomes as a leavening power in the community. In these days when there is so much stress upon their action we are in great danger of underestimating the primary importance and the primary power, for social action and betterment, of the good individual.

The second passage tells of the effect of the enemies of Jesus to entrap Him by raising the question of whether the invaded people of Palestine should pay tribute to Caesar. The words of Jesus, "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's," have been commonly made the Christian basis of loyalty to the state. But it ought to be pointed out that Jesus uses these words to trap those who had in the country in the Jubilee—Griggs and Bezzans. Eddie Murphy was a remarkable end and, as mammoth as was the Boston College line, the Crusaders forward wall outweighed it.

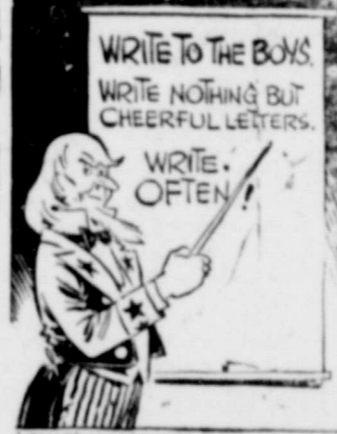

New Enlistment Plan Of The Navy Now Clarified

NEW ORLEANS — Navy spokesmen in the Eighth Naval District today clarified the effect of the President's order, issued December 5th, as it affects Navy recruiting.

District today clarified the effect of the President's order, issued December 5th, as it affects Navy recruiting. Voluntary enlistment by men between the ages of 18 and 37 (inclusive) has been stopped; except that those who had made bona fide applications for

enlistment on or before December 5th will be accepted up to and including December 15th, 1942. Commander A. R. Mack, U. S. N. (Ret.) Navy Recruiting Inspector of the Southern Division, further stated that enlistments of men aged 17 and of men from 38 to 50 are still being accepted.

Enlistments of officer candidates between the ages of 18 and 37 (inclusive) in Classes V-1, V-5, V-7 and V-11 have also been stopped, according to Commander E. D. Walbridge, U. S. N. (Ret.), in charge of the Office of Naval Officer Procurement for the Eighth Naval District. Those already enrolled in these classes, however, will not be affected. The V-1 class is for men enrolled in accredited colleges who are permitted to continue in college for a prescribed period at their own expense.

Commander Walbridge said that any civilian college student who had made a bona fide application to enlist in any of the above classes on or before December 5th will be accepted through December 15th, 1942. He added that any civilian college student who had elected the Navy and made application to the Armed Service Representative in their college will be considered as having made bona fide applications for enlistment in one of these classes.

Although it is no longer possible for men 18 to 37 (inclusive) to enroll in the classes specifically named above, the enrollment of naval officers is not otherwise affected by the President's executive order, and offices of Naval Officer Procurement will continue to receive all applications for commissions. Class V-9 for officer WAVES and V-10 for enlisted WAVES are likewise unaffected by the executive order. The same is true, for enlistments of women in the SPARS.
