## LEGION SPONSOR FOR SYSTEM OF DECORATIONS

Local Legion Post Behind Move For Systematic Decorating for Dimmitt.

Thru the efforts of Thomas F. Bice, commander, and Cecil Montgomery, adjutant of the local American Legion Post, with the cooperation of T. C. Edmondson, of the Edmondson Flag and Specialty Co., of Dallas, Dimmitt will observe May 30, Memorial Day, and all other such occasions, with fitting decorations.

Wednesday orders for 24 flags and poles were taken, thru the Legion, and four extras ordered for future sale. The poles are 12 feet long, and the flags 4x6 feet. They will be placed in front of practically every business house in town, and are expected here by Saturday. Mr. Edmondson will return Friday to supervise the digging of holes and placing of housing in front of all concerns who ordered the equipment.

## Plainview Count Gives 8,834, Not Including Suburbs

According to census figures released by District Supervisor Unger, Plainview has a population of 8,834, on April 1, 1930.

The increase since 1920, when government's figures showed 3,939, was 121 per cent on the city of Plainview proper.

According to the Herald at Plainview, including the suburbs which are not in the corporate limits, that city's population will easily exceed 10,000, which is the figure accepted by the Board of City Development there, the leading civic organization.

## THREE BUS LINES PROPOSED THRU CASTRO COUNTY

Railroad Commission in Lubbock Next Monday Will Consider Lines Thru Here.

The Railroad Commission of Texas, composed of former governor Pat M. Neff as chairman and Lon A. Smith and C. V. Cerrill, commissioners, will meet at Lubbock on next Monday, May 26, at which time among other business, will consider the applications for bus line permits proposed to run thru Dimmitt. The following applications are on file with the commission, for such permits as affect this city:

W. E. Watson, bus line to run from Hereford to Farwell, via Silverton, Tulia, and Dimmitt.

W. C. Byrd, bus line to run from Hereford to Silverton, via Dimmitt and Tulia.

L. Kennedy and others, bus line running from Bovina to Silverton, via Dimmitt and Tulia. Stalcup & Webb, of Dimmitt, a motor truck freight line from Dimmitt to Plainview, via Nazareth and Hart.

The temporary certificate of Ben H. Winningham, who is operating thereunder a truck line from Amarillo to Muleshoe via Canyon, Hereford and Dimmitt, will be up for hearing for a permanent certificate.

The commission has notified all mayors, county judges and others interested on the above routes, that they will be heard, favoring or protesting any of the applications.

## City Waterworks Enjoys Splendid Consumption

According to Bert Huckabee, city secretary, the municipal water system is now serving a total of 110 customers, with 20 additional to be connected at an early date to lines already in. In addition to this, 20 more consumers will be connected on proposed extensions of the present system.

Attention is called by Mr. Huckabee, that due to the depth of all city mains, a freeze will not be encountered, in the coldest of weather, on the municipal service lines. All consumers have been urged by the city to place their extensions at least inches underground, which is recommended as a safe depth against freezes.

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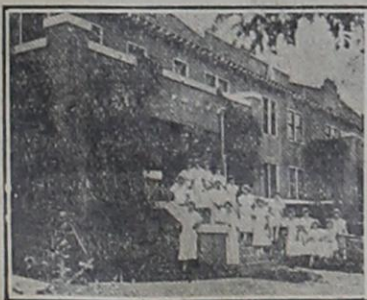

The new brick, being built by E. A. Sutton, for Charles Wilson and Ernest Medkief, south of the new high school, will be one of the prettiest homes in the city when completed next month. It will be finished in white stucco, with dark red brick trimming, and will be modern thru-out, in every respect.

**Elevators Under Construction**  
Three new elevators, with a combined capacity of over 50,000 bushels, are moving along nicely and will be finished in time for the coming harvest.

The Castro County Grain Co.'s new plant will be completed at an early date.

The Texas Wheat Growers' Association elevator has foundation completed, and frame work is being erected this week. Practically all material for this structure is now on the ground.

The C. W. Boothe elevator, recently started, is ready for the frame work this week and will be rushed to completion.

The acquisition of these new buildings will add greatly to the "skyline" of Dimmitt, which is becoming the talk of all persons passing thru the city.

**Commercial Structures**  
The Cox & Thompson store building, west of the court house has been completed, fixtures installed and the firm is ready for business.

The new brick filling station, complete last week by E. A. Sutton for the Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co., is ready for business, under the management of Bill Webb and Hez Wright, both Dimmitt boys, and well known over this section.

Early in June the new pump house and fire station will be turned over to the city, work on which was started last week.

The wholesale tanks and station of the Magnolia Petroleum Company will soon be ready to be turned over to the newly appointed local agent, Cleve Tate, of the firm of Tat & Easter, pioneer filling station operators of Dimmitt.

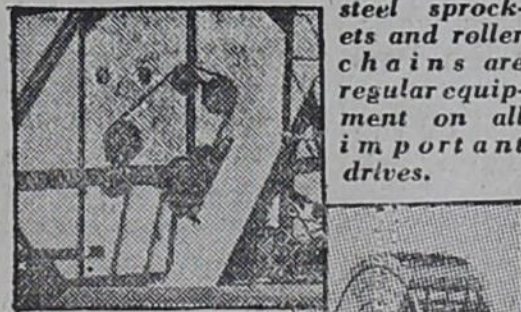

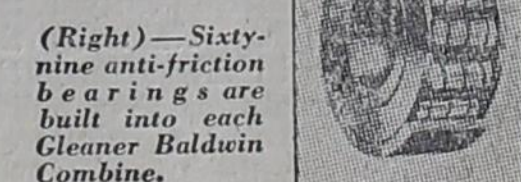

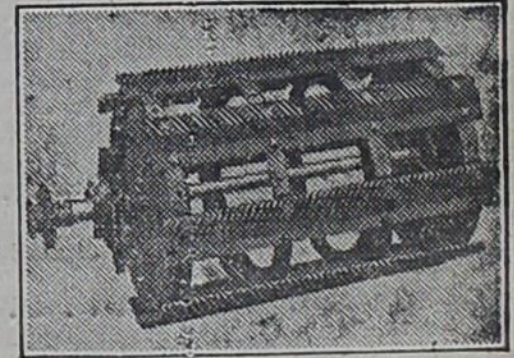
(Left) — Cut steel sprockets and roller chains are regular equipment on all important drives.

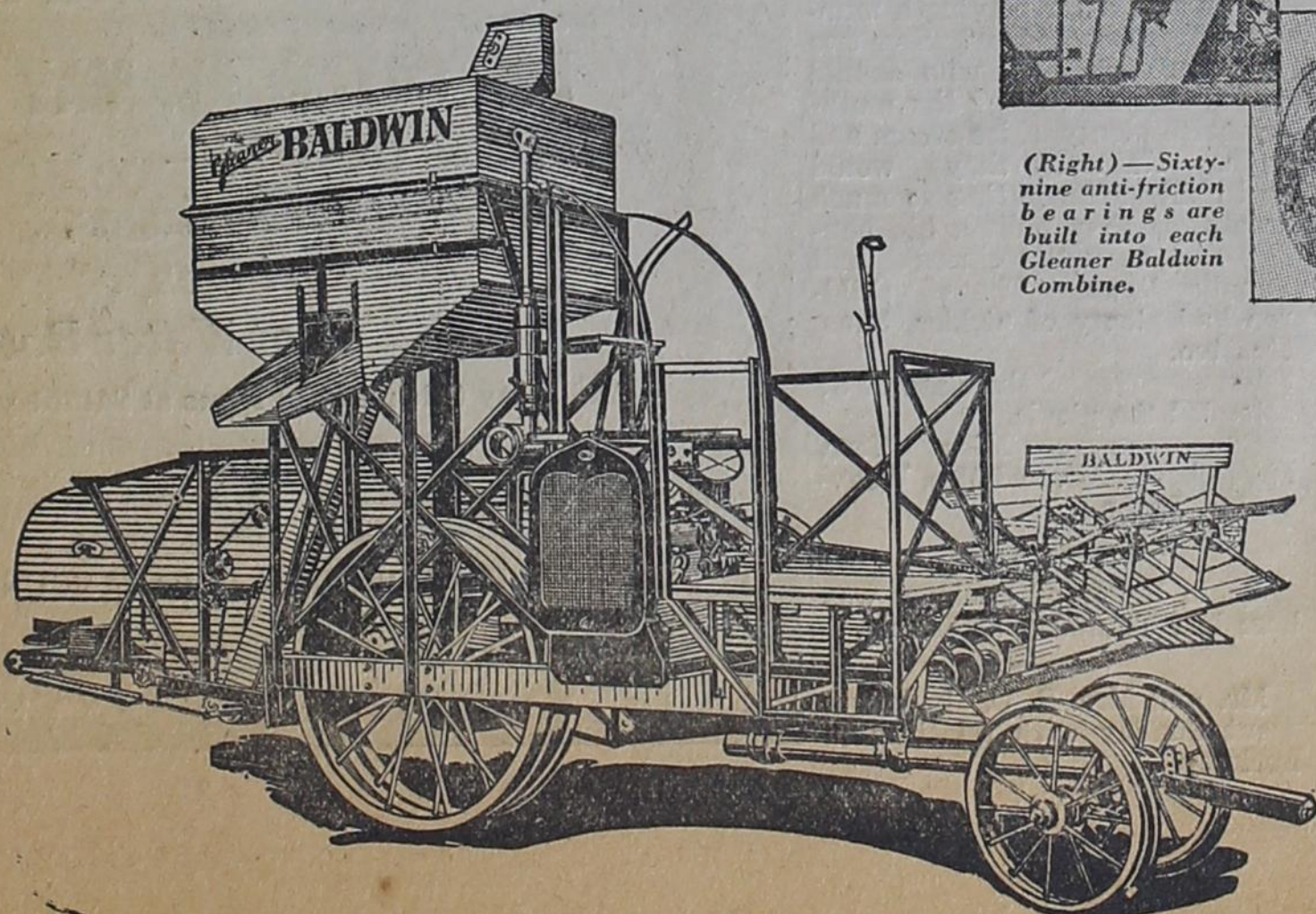
