April 1 Deadline For Securing the Transport Rations

COLLEGE STATION Feb. 3-The deadline date for obtaining been-stepped up to April 1, the Texas USDA War Board was ad-The first of five units to be vised by the Office of Defense Transportation this week.

The extended date will benefit many Texas farmers who have not applied for Certificates of War Necessity or who have been unable to operate with gasoline ob-

Temporary transport rations in no way relieve farmers of appeal ing for corrected Certificates of applying for Certificates immed iately, B. F. Vance, chairman of the board, said in pointing out that all temporary rations would be discontinued March 31.

He added that farmers who do not have final Certificates by the closing date will be unable to operate their trucks.

Vance said the ODT order affects farm truck operators as

News From Washington

GAS rationing for farm truck operators is gradually being cleared up, but it will probably be March 31, end of the first quarter of 1943, before all the headaches are cured.

This has easily been the biggest pain above the neck for all concerned—farmers, Office of Defense Transportation, OPA rationing boards, the farm bloc and the Department of Agriculture County War Boards which had to cushion the above the second property of th

the shock. First came the requirement that all truck operators had to get a Certificate of War Necessity, accompanied by a rather formidable questionnaire and a 24,000-word set of instructions. Of the million and a half farmers who operate trucks, at least half filled out the applications

Naturally, when the Detroit truck headquarters of the Office of Defense Transportation tried to Issue a gasoline allowance for a form incorrectly filled in, a lot of mistakes were made and a lot of infustices handed out. Some farmers got authorization to operate their trucks less than 1000 miles a year when 5000 miles of trucking were required to move crops to market after harvest-

ing, with no allowance for hauling on the farm.

Rations of that kind obviously did not make sense, so provision had to be made for filing appeals and granting temporary gasoline rations to keep the farms in operation. ODT and OPA officials now think they have this appeal business under control. No farm operator will have to shut down for lack of a truck and every farmer will get as much gasoline, as many tires as he needs—as long as thore

TO achieve this happy ending to a sad story, ODT and OPA have had to revise their procedure considerably. In the first place the farm operator's own estimate of the gasoline he needs for truck

operation is now accepted without question if it is reasonable.

To clear up the appeals, ODT's field force has been sent out into the country to help farmers fill out their applications for Certificates of War Necessity and appeals for increases on previous allowances
Furthermore, authority to help get this farm truck gasoline crisis
removed has been delegated to transportation committees of the 300t
County War Boards—set up by the Department of Agriculture—
one board for each county in the entire U. S.

As soon as a 18 m truck operator has filed his application or appeal he can be issued a card certifying that the application or the appeal has been filed. These cards aren't yet distributed generally, but ODT hopes to have them around by the end of January, which was the original deadline for filing appeals and getting the farm truck gasoline rationing system in operation. Truck operators who have their Certificate to Was decessity with adequate gasoline allowances networkly don't need a card.

AS soon at a farm truck operator has his card, he can take it to he local Ration Board. The card will be authority for the Ration Board to issue the truck operator a "Temporary Transport Gasoline Ration." This temporary ration will be in the form of a "T" book.

ODT believes now that it can get all these Certificates of War Necessity issued and have all appeals granted before March 31, end of the first quarter and approximately before extensive farm operations get under way in all but the more southern states.

Beginning April 1, everything will be on a regular three-months ration allowance under the Certificate of War Necessity program setup originally as the new famous ODT Order No. 21 of Sept. 9.

War Efforts Are

Reflected In

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 2 (UP)-Efforts to meet requirements of the war program were reflected generally in business and industry throughout the Eleventh Federal Reserve District during 1942 and the early part of 1948, according to the current issue of the Monthly Business Review of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dal-

Cotton production, though below estimates issued earlier in the season, was considerably greater than in 1941.

Stocks of crude petroleum-in the district increased throughout the period and on Jan. 2, 1942, were 23 per cent greater than on Jan. 8, 1942.

Prices of most Texas Farm products increased during 1942, with meat and dairy products experiencing uniformly large in-

Department store sales rose to new highs, while inventories have been falling off since July.

The cotton crop had the highest single value of any crop produced in the state. The value of lint cotton was \$275,500,000 as compared with \$215,072,000 in 1941. The cottonseed was valued at \$61,116,000 as compared with \$55,838,000 for 1941,

On the petroleum front, limita-tions in the use of scarce matercompletions in the distrist. Drilling activity in the last quarter was about 50 per cent below the level of the first quarter of the year. Druing 1942, 5,968 wells were completed as compared with 11,534 in 1941.
