"We've got to lick the Ger-mans in Germany, and the Japs in Japan to achieve a final victory," Ickes told a meeting of the industry committee on solid ruers. "Defense won't do the job. This is war."



DON'T ASK FOR TIRE UNTIL YOU NEED IT!

Users of restricted automobile In Castro and contiguous coun- and truck tires are asked by Castro county authorities not to ask for new tires unless they absolutely need them.

Here is what could, and might happen if users made application before they intend to buy

A user might make application and be granted the privilege of buying one or more tires, have his tires ready for delivery and then, simply because he doesn't need them in a hurry,lose his right to complete the purchase— In such a case, Castro county would lose the tires from its quota.

Naturally, members of the rationing board say, there are more applications on file than there are tires to be granted.

Castro county never can regain tires annlied for and not bought within 30 days.

Porter, according to Rosborough, is that it is small in size. It is, however, excellent for juice, preserves, salads, canning whole, and high in quality for eating out of hand or for table use.

"It may not be popular with people who want tomatces that will produce two and a half to four inch slices," the horticulturist pointed out, "but if they plant the Porter they can have tomatoes when all other varieties have failed." The variety not only succeeds in seasons when no other tomatoes fruit, but also yields over a much longer period, he said.

Rosborough recommended that the usual varieties of tomatces be planted but that in every case the Porter be included.
