(By M. U. May County Agent) Castro county fast is developing into a dairying county as much interest is being taken by farmers in improving their dairy stock. Last year there were only five registered and purebred Jersey bulls in Castro county, but now there are some 3 registered and purebred bulls in the county.

Only last January 15 head of registered Jersey cows and heifrs were bought by S. W. Lilley, Rayford Davis, and Pete Coke to make the county's first introduction of registered dairy cattle. Plans now are leing made by several other farmers to purchase more registered attle.

At the present time, Farm Se-curities clients have 5 registered Jersey cows, and eight registered and purebred buls. These farmers are doing much to increase milk production, which is so badly needed for national defense. 

for sugar in sweetening fruits. preparing cinnamon toast, candied vegetables, salads, dressings, baked hams, baked apples, custards, puddings, pies, and frozen desserts. It may also be used in quick breads, cakes, and confections, but its special characteristics must be allowed for in these call for one-fifth less liquid in a cake or quick-bread recipe where honey is used instead of sugar. Experiments show that the liquid difference between the water content of the honey and the dry reduced by one-fourth.

In making honey cakes and quick breads, mix the honey with the liquid used, and bake at the lowest temperature possible for the given product. This prevents loss or change of flavor of the honey and also prevents too rapid browning.

HONEY COOKIES One-half cup butter. One egg beaten, One-half cup honey, Two cups sifted flour, Two teaspoons baking powder, One-half teaspoon salt,

One cup finely chopped nuts. Cream the butter and add the ugar gradually. Mix the egg and oney and add with the sifted dry ingredients and nuts to the the desired size and wrap in heavy waxed paper. Whip firm, cut into thin slices with a sharp knife. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, from 10 to 15

HONEY DROP COOKIES One-half cup butter,

One egg, beaten, Three-fourths cup honey, Two tablespoons milk, Two cups sifted flour,

Two teaspoons baking powder, One-half teaspoon salt, One cup chopped nuts, One cup chopped dates, or other

dried fruit, One-half cup chopped candied

Cream the butter. Mix the beaten egg, honey and milk. Add the nuts and fruits to the sifted dry ingredients and add alternately with the liquid to the butter. Drop by teaspoosful on a greased baking sheet and bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, for about 10 minutes.
