ALLIED BOMBERS HAMMER CONVOY

APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE APPROVES SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION FOR NAVY

Navy warned after testimony not to draw too heavily upon the manpower supply of the nation

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 3. (UP)—The House Appropriations Committee today approved a \$48,265,946,938 supplemental appropriation for the Navy, but cautioned against the armed services drawing too heavily upon the nation's manpower supply.

Rear Admiral Randall Jacobs, Chief of the Bureau of Navy Personnel, had testified before a subcommittee that the Navy expected to total 2,800,000 officers and enlisted men by June, 1944. Other testimony showed that as of Feb. 1, there were 16,700 officers and 1,159,600 enlisted men in the navy.

WASHINGTON—Some members of the democratic national committee today urged President Roosevelt to run for a fourth term if the war is still in progress in 1944.

WASHINGTON—The Senate Judiciary committee today voted 10 to 4 to report favorably a modified version of the McKeeler bill to require senate confirmation of virtually all Policy-Making officers in the federal government.

WASHINGTON—The house rules committee decided today that when the house acts on a bill to increase the legal debt limit from \$125,000,000,000 to \$210,000,000,000 it must vote simultaneously on a rider repealing President Roosevelt's order limiting salaries to \$25,000 net.

San Antonio Puts Wise Old Owl To Work as Policeman

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 2 (UP)—San Antonio birds are being given the bird-and-it's-all being done by a wise old owl.

Until recently a horde of noisy starlings had been figuratively thumping their beaks at the majesty of the law. The dignity of the municipal peace was being disturbed.

City fathers were in a predicament—and then, along came Fred Stark, director of the Brackenridge Park Zoo. Stark took the matter in hand, and now, with the aid of an owl, the city fathers are hoping to rid the city of the noisy, vagrant flock of birds.

The owl has been placed in the starling's favorite roosting tree. It's up to him.

Bill Reminds Senators Of A State Railroad

Bill to transfer land of the Rusk State Hospital to the state railroad for building purposes surprised Texas senators into remembrance that the state of Texas really owns a railroad.

Some of them inquired if the estate owned a railroad its route and what the state does with it. The railroad extends from Rusk to Palestine. It was built to serve the state iron foundry that was established in connection with a state prison once located at Rusk. Since 1929 it has been leased to the Texas and New Orleans Railroad, which is part of the Southern Pacific System. Under the agreement the company uses the tracks, sidings, station and other equipment of the line and pays the state one-half of the net railway operating income.

SWEETWATER, Tex. Mar. 2. (UP)—She may not have read anything about the shortage of dairy products, but a Jersey cow belonging to D. A. Green has decided to do something about it.

She has given birth to twin heifer calves.

JAP BASE IN BURMA HARD HIT IN RAID

NEW DELHI—A large formation of American Medium Bombers escorted by fighters made a heavy raid yesterday on Myitkyin, major Japanese base in northern Burma, causing "great damage" to barracks and military installations, a communication said today.

About 15 tons of bombs were dropped on Myitkyin, which the Japanese long have used as a key base of operations, and three out of four of the missiles hit in the target area, the announcement said.

I will take good care of everything I use—food, clothes, furnishings, equipment, machinery, buildings, livestock and the soil as well as the scarce articles such as rubber and metals.

I will buy carefully anything I must have and I will buy U. S. War Stamps and Bonds with all the money I can. I will work hard with all my family and neighbors and help people to be cheerful, to have courage and take part in all war activities." Planning, producing and conserving food is everyone's responsibility now.

Meeting of Hitler Mussolini Precedes Army Withdrawal

BERN, Switzerland, March 2 (UP)—Advices from Rome reported Tuesday that Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini met secretly last Wednesday on the Austro-Italian frontier and coincidentally Axis radio announcements disclosed the withdrawal for replacement of the Italian army on the Russian front.

The Rome advices said that at a frontier conference Hitler and Mussolini started the talks which were continued and concluded at Home by German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop.

It was reported that Hitler and Mussolini, talking on the frontier, discussed both the Russian and African situations.

Gen. Vittorio Ambrosio, chief of the Italian General Staff, and Lt. Gen. Warlimont, acting chief of the directional staff at Hitler's headquarters, attended the frontier conference, informants understood.

On Hitler's orders, Ribbentrop, continued to Rome in Mussolini's special armored train.

It was reported that Mussolini had renewed a guarantee not to conclude a separate peace.

Texas Engineers In Nicaragua Aren't Bothered

PALESTINE, Tex., March 2 (UP)—Texans in Nicaragua—and there is quite a band of them there—are not worrying about tire and gasoline rationing.

Bill Alderman of Childress and Dallas is one of a band of Texas engineers assigned to the Pan-American Highway project.

According to Alderman, when any of the Lone Star states in Nicaragua drive under a shed and say "Fill 'er up," they simply mean they want a bundle of cane fodder for the oxen that are pulling their bull-cart.

The bull cart, he says gets the Texas engineers most places fastest with the most through the jungle quagmire of the Nicaraguan tropics.

Consumption Of Power Indicates Business Trends

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 2.—The machinery of Texas industry was still rolling in January, figures on consumption of electric power just released by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research indicate.

Consumption of power by industrial users was up 9.6 per cent over the level set in January, 1942, and consumption by all other classes of users—commercial and residential—was also on the upgrade. Industrial consumption in January, however, was 6.3 per cent below that of December.

ARCHBISHOP GERKEN DIES IN SANTA FE

SANTA FE, N. M., Mar. 2.—Rudolph A. Gerken, Roman Catholic archbishop of the Santa Fe archdiocese and a farmer priest the Abilene and Ranger, Texas parishes, died Tuesday afternoon in St. Vincent's Hospital here a few hours after he had suffered a stroke.

Archbishop Gerken, who would have been 55 years old next Sunday, came here in 1933 from Amarillo where he was bishop of that diocese.

As representative of the Catholic Church in a wide area of the Southwest range country, Archbishop Gerken was one of the youngest archbishops in the Nation at the time of his appointment and governed one of the oldest dioceses in the United States. He was the seventh archbishop of the diocese, which embraces Colorado, Arizona, Northern Texas and New Mexico.

At the time of his installation as archbishop, a special train carried the 30 archbishops and bishops and 200 priests to Santa Fe where the ceremonies were held in the historic St. Francis Cathedral. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, apostolic delegate to the United States and highest representative of the Pope in America, presented the elevation commission from Pope Pius XI.

During his seven years as bishop of the Amarillo diocese, he established five new schools, one college, 15 new churches, one convent, three hospitals and raised the number of priests in 72 West Texas counties from 25 to 40. At the time of his elevation to archbishop he was president of Price Memorial College.

The archbishop went to Amarillo from Ranger. Born in Dyer, Iowa, he came to Texas at the age of 21. After teaching in public schools for three years, he studied further and went to Abilene in 1917, where he organized a Mexican mission, built a church, and later a school.

Sent to Ranger in 1920 to take charge of St. Rita's parish, the new priest immediately began work on a church, a school and a parochial house.

In 1942, Archbishop Gerken was made dean of the Colorado River Deanery and consultant of the Dallas diocese. From his parish in the Oil Belt he went to Amarillo and then to Santa Fe.

Ranger friends of Archbishop Gerken and members of his parish stated today that it was during his stay here that St. Rita's School and parochial house were built.

He was one of the most active priests ever sent to St. Rita's and many who were members of his church still reside in Ranger.

Names of Notaries Public To Be In Print To June 1

For the benefit of those in the county who are Notaries Public, County Clerk R. V. Galloway states that the names of all persons now holding commissions as Notaries will be submitted to the Secretary of State for re-appointment in time for them to qualify before June 1st, the date of the expiration of the present commissions. Galloway states that everyone will be notified in time for their appointments to be continued.

All persons not now holding a Notary Commission that wish their names submitted, are asked to notify Clerk Galloway in the near future in order that their names might be submitted with the ones who wish their commissions renewed.

When the appointments have been received from the Secretary of State, all will be mailed a letter of instructions as to how to qualify, fees, etc.

Valley Products Said to be Plenty For Dehydration

WESLACO, Tex. Mar. 2. (UP)—W. H. Friend, superintendent of the Valley Experiment Station, says winter and spring carrots, together with sweet potatoes, could easily furnish the raw materials for the year-round operation of a vegetable dehydration plant in the Valley.

Friend says yields of 300 to 500 bushels of carrots suitable for dehydration could be grown in the area. These yields are from three to five times the yields of carrots grown for the fresh markets. Carrots grown for dehydration would be permitted to grow larger than they ordinarily are when picked for sale to the housewife.

CHIEF MURPHY WARNS ABOUT STREET LIGHTS

Chief of Police George Murphy stated today that the city as well as schools have been put to expense and inconvenience by a group of boys who have been making sport of shooting out street lights and window lights at night.

The chief stated that the names of the trouble makers have been learned and persons witnessing the destruction have made themselves known to the police. Chief Murphy stated that the city can only secure a limited number of the lights each year and that the allotment will be cut for the coming year, and for this and other reasons the department intends to see that the destruction of public property is stopped. Aside from the destruction caused by the Chief pointed to the fact that when street lights are cut out in this manner that sections of the town are left in darkness. The Chief stated that he is giving fair warning to the boys causing this trouble and they will have to take the consequences if they do not stop.

The Chief also issued a warning to kite flyers, urging them to go to areas where there are no electrical wires to fly kites and should a kite become entangled with an electrical wire leave it alone and not try to untangle it. The electrical company has also issued warnings about kites becoming entangled with dangerous electrical wires.

American Subs Sink Cargo Ships In Far Pacific

WASHINGTON, March 3. (UP)—American submarines have sunk five more Japanese supply ships and damaged two others in their intensified battle of attrition against the enemy's supply lines, the Navy reported Tuesday.

Three medium-sized cargo vessels, one medium sized tanker and a small schooner were blasted to the bottom. A medium-sized transport and a medium-sized tanker were damaged.

The latest thrusts by the under seas raiders were revealed a few hours after the Navy reported that American dive bombers, continuing their devastating attacks against Munda in the Central Solomons, started more fires on that Jap airfield. The attack, carried out Monday, was the eighth raid against Munda since November and was accomplished without loss of an American plane.

Precise location of the latest sinkings was not revealed. The communiqué simply said they occurred in the Pacific and Far East area, which would mean anywhere from Japan's home waters to the Solomons.

Submarines now have accounted for more than 40 per cent of the 310 Japanese warships and auxiliaries definitely listed as sunk since Pearl Harbor. Their latest successes raised the score of submarines alone to 133 ships sunk, twenty-three probably sunk and thirty-five damaged—a total toll of 191 vessels.

Gandhi Breaks His Fast With Orange Juice

POONA, India.—Wizened, bearded Mohandas K. Gandhi, spiritual leader of tens of millions of Indian nationalists, drank a glass of orange juice diluted with water at 9 a. m. today, ending his 21-day fast in protest against imprisonment.

Newcomers Are Innocently Violating Law

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 2. (UP)—Many people who have come to Texas from other states because of military camps or war industries are violating the motor vehicle registration law, innocently, State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer pointed out recently.

The 1942 Texas license plates do not have to be renewed until April 1, but 1942 plates issued in other states expire here on the same date they would expire if the car had been kept in the home state. Mississippi and South Carolina licenses have not been usable since Oct. 31, 1942; Alabama's since Nov. 15, 1942; those of Arizona, Arkansas, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oregon, Washington and Wisconsin since Dec. 31, 1943; Colorado since Jan. 15, 1944; Georgia, Illinois and Kansas, Feb. 1; California, Feb. 4 and Louisiana, Feb. 5.

1,000 Bombs Dropped On Kiska By U. S.

WASHINGTON The Navy announced today that 1,000 bombs were rained on Kiska and 19 Japanese planes destroyed in 9 previously reported American air raids during February.

It was estimated that the bombs dropped on the enemy's Aleutian base during February totaled at least 500,000 pounds. At the same time, the navy reported another bombing raid—the 81st on Munda—Japan's central Solomons air base.

Roark Believes Liquor Monopoly Will Solve Debt

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 2.—A way to raise money without a tax has been proposed.

Rep. W. W. Roark of Temple believes that his bill providing for a state liquor monopoly holds the solution to paying off the state deficit, paying higher old age pensions and raising the salaries of school teachers. He estimates that the treasury would receive about \$55,000,000 annually from liquor sales in state-owned and operated stores.

Roark says that 12 states now have liquor monopolies, and that legislatures in 12 other states are considering such laws.

The Roark bill provides that persons pay \$12 a year for a permit to buy liquor. He plans to amend this provision of the measure, reducing the permit charge of \$6 with \$5 going to the county where the permit is issued and \$1 going to the city.

ALLIED PLANES BRAVE FOUL WEATHER TO SINK TWO AND DAMAGE TWO OF JAP CONVOY

Convoy first sighted off New Britain by Allied planes which were unable to strike at first because of bad weather

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, March 3, (Wednesday)—Allied warplanes braving foul weather have smashed and battered a strong Japanese convoy thrusting toward New Guinea, sinking two transports and damaging at least two other ships, and scattering the rest of a column of fourteen vessels over a wide area. Allied Headquarters announced Wednesday.

This was the convoy that had been sighted first off New Britain Island, protected by the weather as it drove through the seas apparently to reinforce the Japanese forces in the Lae area of New Guinea.

But despite rain and clouds, Allied planes blasted the sea column Tuesday in the Bismarck Sea, downing thirteen out of forty Japanese fighter planes that fought in its protection, and wrecking heavy damages with direct hits on at least four transport vessels, the noon communiqué said.

Its destination was believed to be Lae, a Jap base on the Huon Gulf now being slowly approached from the south by Allied ground conquerors of the Papuan Peninsula.

"The battle continues," the communiqué said.

In addition to the ships sunk, warships were dealt damages from bombs which came close to their mark.

The convoy was attacked in the Bismarck Sea. Allied planes defying the continued bad weather to lose their deadly bombs.

"Despite adverse weather conditions of rain, haze and thick clouds our heavy bombers with fighter escort repeatedly struck at the convoy previously reported north of Cape Gloucester in a series of coordinated attacks," the communiqué reported.

"Crippling blows delivered from low altitude work pressed home in the face of heavy anti-aircraft fire and constant interception by enemy fighters.

"A 10,000-ton transport received five direct hits with 1,000-pound bombs and was left enveloped in smoke, later reported to be sinking. An 8,000-ton transport, hit amidships, burst into flames and split in two, sinking within two minutes.

"A direct hit was scored on the bow of a 5,000-ton transport and a fourth vessel of medium size was severely damaged near the bow, with flames pouring from the forward hatch.

"Other hits or near hits were scored against warships and cargo ships, results of which have so far been impossible to assess. Thirty to forty enemy fighters acting as a convoy cover attacked our formations with cessation but ineffectually.

"Thirteen enemy planes were shot out of action. Remnants of the convoy are now scattered and dispersed over a wide area of the sea northeast of Finschhafen, apparently trying to reach their destination at Lae. Our losses are light. The battle continues."

From a standpoint of numbers of planes, the Japs made one of their heaviest raids of the war on Darwin, Australia, sending fifteen against a single airdrome.

But the communiqué reported that intercepting Allied fighters shot down six of the invaders and that damage was slight. It was a daylight raid, occurring at noon Tuesday.

Air Field Named For Lieutenant Killed In Alaska

GAINESVILLE, Tex. Mar. 3. (UP)—A Gainesville man who gave his life for his country while on military duty in Alaska, has been honored by the Army in the naming of Gainesville's new air field.

The base has been named Woodruff Field, in memory of 1st Lieut. Dennis H. Woodruff, a graduate of Texas A. & M. College, who was killed in a plane crash at Ft. Richards, Alaska, last April 24.

Rationed Food Commodities

SUGAR—Stamp No. 11 in Book No. 1 good for 3 pounds until midnight, March 15, 1943.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 25 in Book No. 1 (for those for 1 pound until midnight March 21, 1943.)

MEAT—Voluntary share-the-meat program sets limit at 2 1/2 pounds per person per week. Meat will be rationed under the "point system" after Book No. 2 is distributed.

PHILADELPHIA—Increase in the cost of living that hits the civilian tight where he lives has raised its ugly head to increase the cost of military living in its most important phase of subsistence, food and clothing.

Indication of the extent to which these inflationary tendencies have hit the Army was revealed here by Maj.-Gen. C. L. Cobbin, chief of procurement in the Quartermasters' Department and acting quartermaster general, during a special press inspection of the Philadelphia quartermaster depot.

Two simple and easily understandable examples, cost of the Army ration and cost of Army pants, were given to illustrate the degree to which the cost of the war is being stepped up by price rises.

A year ago, the basic Army field ration was costing 43 cents per man per day. This represented quantity buying. Today that cost has risen to 35 cents per day for man, an increase of approximately 30 per cent.

Translate those figures into the cost of feeding an Army of four and a half million men on U. S. soil, and you can see what the increase means. It means that the Army is spending today approximately \$2,475,000 per day for food, and of that amount the increase due to higher food prices is \$555,000 a day or \$213,000,000 a year.

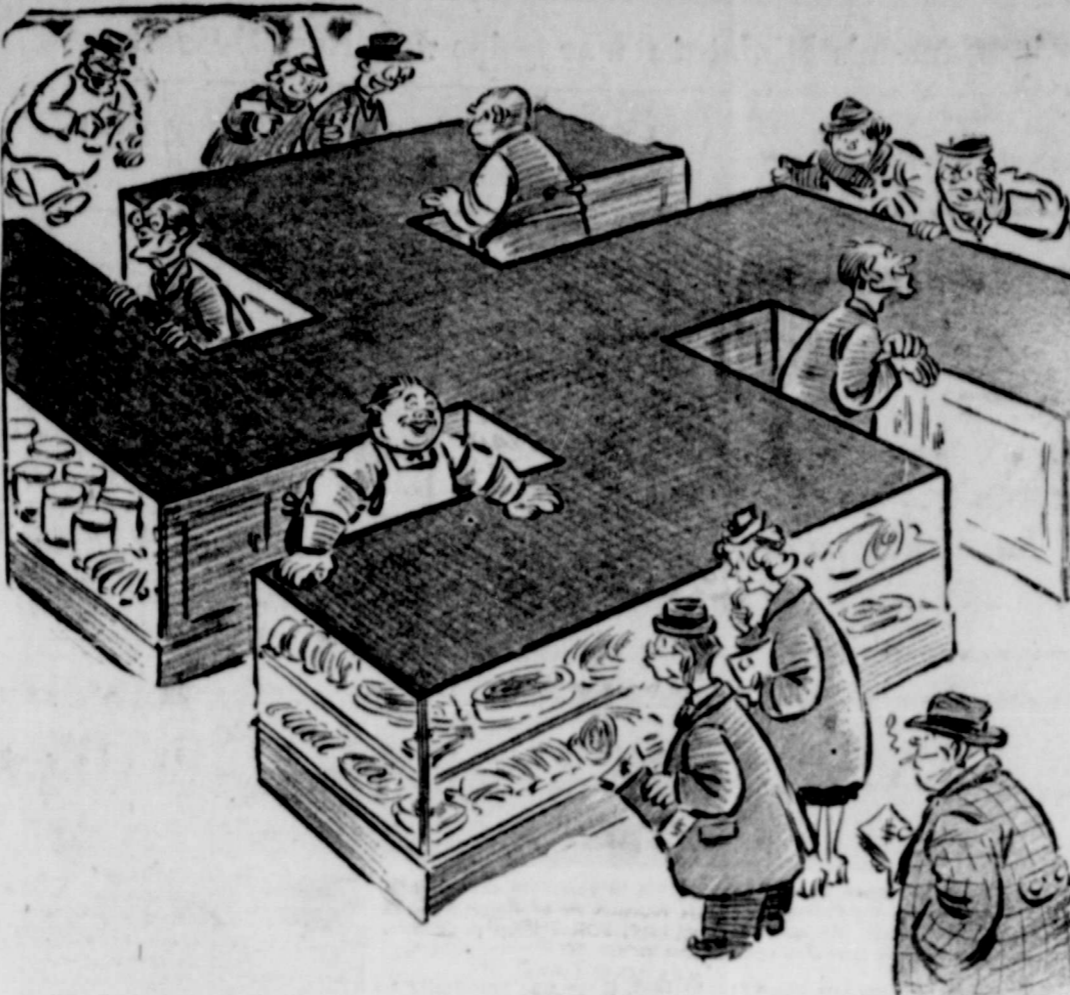
NOW take the case of the Army pants. The Philadelphia Q. M. depot recently had occasion to let contracts for five and a half million pairs of wool pants. The quartermasters run a pilot uniform plant and testing laboratory of their own here at Philadelphia, and though it employs over 5000 workers, it produces a pair, less materials and without profit, in 1 per cent of what it takes to clothe this modern armed force for service in ever-climate from Iceland to the jungles of Guadalcanal.

Running this Philadelphia factory enables the QMC to know what costs of clothing manufacture are, and to check up on methods of garment making, testing and inspection. A checkup showed that these pants could be manufactured in Philadelphia at a cost of 31 cents a pair, less materials and without profit.

Invitations were sent out for bids on parts of this order. Knowing labor conditions and other varying manufacturing costs all over the country, it was estimated that these pants could be contracted for a price ranging from a low of 74 cents a pair to a high of 80 cents.

BUT because of the requirements now put on the quartermaster general's office to spread the work to as many small plants as possible, to let contracts in areas in which there is surplus labor, because of all these complex war conditions the Army finally got its pants at an average cost of 85 cents a pair.

Contracts placed in the New York area were let for prices as high as one dollar a pair, though the QMC had estimated that the ceiling price for making these pants should not be higher than 91 cents a pair. The conditions applying to purchases of pants apply to other items which the quartermasters must buy. But the effect of these increase on the total is inescapable. Every 10 per cent the cost of this equipment goes up represents an increase in the cost of war of \$150 million.

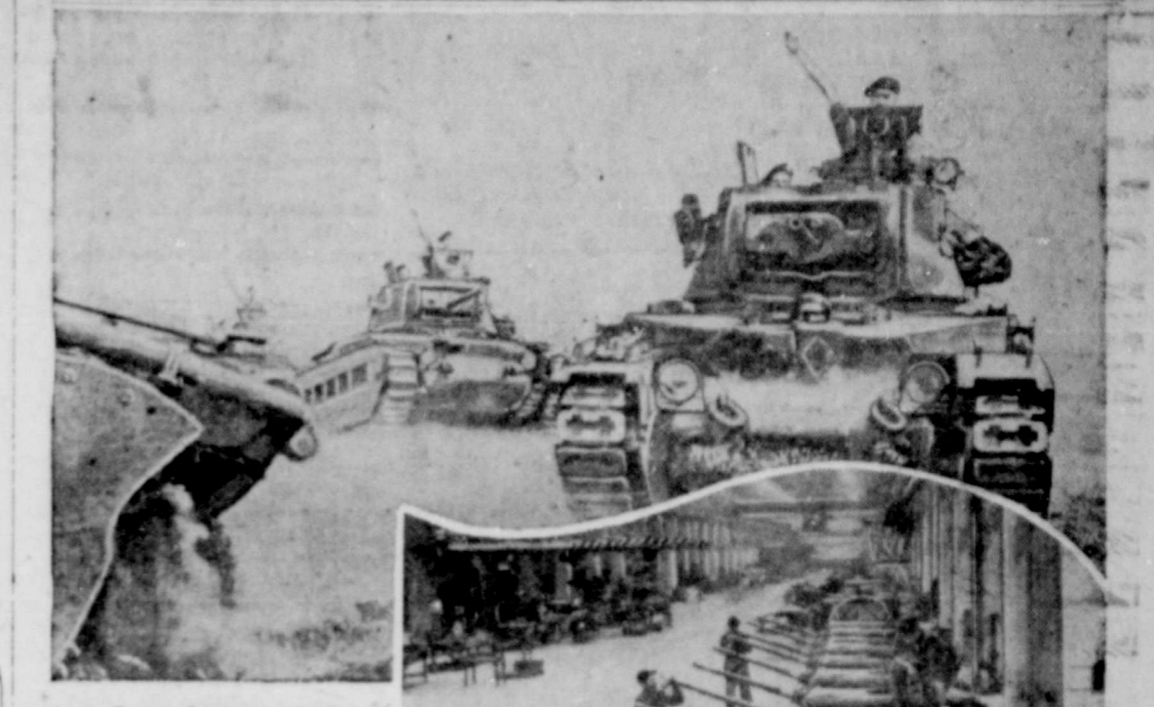
People of Thrifty Find They Are Citizens of Fry

Canada's Tanks Roll Off Production Line And Into Battle



These heavy infantry tanks of a bilingual battalion from Quebec are part of the Canadian Army Tank Brigade, photographed during intensive manoeuvres in England. The outfit has been built into a powerful, effective striking force which will make its strength felt on some allied offensive front soon.

Part of the production line in the Ram tank factory, second largest arsenal for tank production in the world, heavily armed with machine guns and cannon, the Ram is powered with a Wright Whirlwind engine, a versatile war machine.

ONE of the first of the United Nations to take up arms against Axis aggression, Canada, after three years of war, finds her industries fully mobilized, peak production being expected early in 1943. Although her peace-time industrial facilities are small compared to the manufacturing might of the United States, the Dominion nevertheless has become one of the main weapon-producing countries on the side of democracy. Canada constitutes the main source of supply of motorized equipment for the British Empire. It has turned out thousands of fighting vehicles every week and has delivered more than 200,000 motorized units since the start of the war.

In addition to a large output of Bren gun carriers, in service in every theatre of war, Canada is producing two types of tanks. One is the British Valentine, a rugged infantry tank which has been sent to Russia in large numbers. It is produced by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in its Montreal Angus shops. The Soviets regard it highly. The other is the Ram, a cruiser tank designed by Canada's famed tank man, Major General F. F. Worthington. A crack medium tank, Canada's Ram is said to have contributed largely to new British and American designs for cruiser land ships, indicative of the progress accomplished in Canada in the production of war equipment is the fact that in 1942 Canada is turning out 10 tanks and armoured fighting vehicles for every unit it produced in 1941.

Canada's Miniature War Ships Jolt Nazi U-Boats



The Navy relies upon Canadian shipyards to complete enough submarines to make up flotilla numbers. Production of Fairmiles has been stepped up to the point that deliveries now keep pace with training of 12-man crews to operate them. BIG brothers of Canada's speedy torpedo boats are the Fairmiles, fast patrol vessels which are carrying disaster to Nazi subs. Dozens of these swift craft are being built by famed Canadian fishing boat builders who in peacetime turned out graceful fishing vessels and sleek schooners like the Blue Nose. More than 100 feet in length, the Fairmile subchasers are manned by 12-man crews. They are of wood construction and cost in the neighborhood of \$125,000. In 1920, there was practically no shipbuilding industry to speak of in Canada, but now the Dominion employs many thousands of men in boat construction. In addition to Fairmiles, cargo ships, corvettes and minesweepers are being turned out in large numbers, as well as an infinite variety of small craft such as crash boats, tenders, rescue launches. Tribal class destroyers too are being built in Canada and cargo vessels are being launched at the rate of two a week.

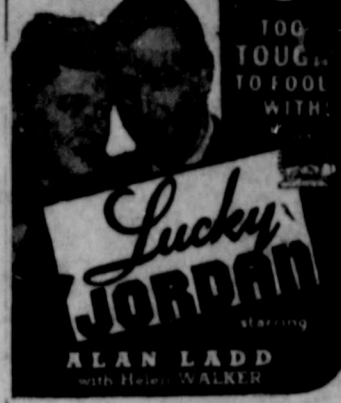

Sees Trading In Of Houses Like Car After War

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Henry G. Guthmann, professor of finance at Northwestern University, predicts that after the war you may be able to trade in your house for a later model, just as you did your car. He bases his prediction on the fact that prefabricated houses, whose construction has been stimulated during the war, also are demountable. "A householder," he said, "wishing a more up-to-date dwelling could turn in his old house on a new model and enjoy the latter on the home site upon which he had lavished landscaping care and around which the homes of his friends were located." Consequently, Guthmann said neighbors would lose their identity. "A badly located house could always be moved to a more satisfactory location." Guthmann believes increased "veins," but in most cases it is necessary to drill test wells. Samples of material drawn up by the drill bit tell the geologist whether to dig on or elsewhere. Samples of water which may be found are taken for chemical analysis, and then a pump test is made to determine the correct number and size of wells. The influx of trainees to North Carolina also has put a strain on civilian and municipal water systems near military camps. An eastern city recently began to get salt in its water. Tests showed that instead of drawing water from wells, the city was getting water from a nearby tidal river. The solution was simple. New wells were sunk approximately a mile from the river and the salt taste disappeared.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2 (UP)—Manpower needs in 1943 exceed the current supply by 2,376,000 persons, according to a table presented to a senate appropriations committee by war manpower commission chairman Paul V. McNutt.

That figure corresponds roughly to the 2,250,000-man deficiency forecast earlier this week by war production Board chairman Donald M. Nelson. McNutt told the subcommittee recently that altogether 65,655,000 persons would be needed this year for the following purposes:

Texas Officials Learn They Have Page Ad in Paper

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 2. (UP)—Texas newspapermen were startled this week by a report from Washington that Gov. Coke R. Stevenson and Lieut. Gov. John Lee Smith had taken a page ad in two Washington newspapers to ask why the government still permits strikes.

Inquiry developed that the advertisement, headed "Texas Speaks", was sponsored by "patriotic Texans from every part of the state." Under branching longhorns, the governor and lieutenant governor were pictured. Standing back of them was a throng of men and women.

Quotations from Stevenson and Smith's inaugural messages started the reading matter. Then, on their

own, the ad sponsors made the inquiry about strikes, slowdowns and absentee periods in war industry. A final section read:

"We have heard much about social gains.

"We believe that the American system itself (constitutional government, bill of rights, democracy) is the greatest 'social gain' the world has ever seen.

"We ask every official this point blank question:

"Have you been faithful to your oath of office, to support and defend the constitution of the United States?"

"It would be a fruitless thing—a disastrous thing—while fighting the war abroad, to lose it at home.

"For the sake of our men in uniform—for the sake of our selves and our children—we are determined to preserve the American system against all enemies, foreign and domestic."

"Ship after ship was again and again hit with heavy blows from low altitude," the communiqué said. "The enemy air coverage became weaker and weaker and his forces more scattered and dispersed, and finally its remnants isolated and bewildered, were gradually annihilated by our successive air formations as we sent them into combat."

The Allied losses in the decisive engagement were exceptionally light. One bomber and three fighters were shot down. A number of other planes were damaged, but were able to return to their base.

"Our decisive success cannot fail to have the most important results on the enemy's tactical plans," the communiqué said.

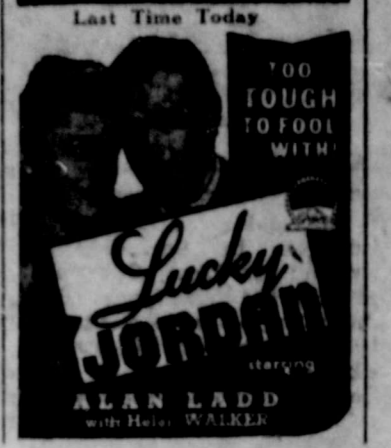
