# ALLIES TAKE LEAD IN TUNISIA

## WORKERS REPORT A TOTAL OF MORE THAN \$2,900 COLLECTED FOR THE RED CROSS WAR FUND

People Are Reminded That This Is Not The Regular Roll Call But A Very Special Drive For Red Cross War Funds

At a meeting of the workers for the Red Cross War Fund campaign, held Friday morning, a total of better than \$2,900 was reported as already collected for the drive. Reports from other committees who had not turned in their money indicated that Ranger is near the \$3,000 mark, \$1,500 short of the quota.

L. R. Pearson, chairman for the Ranger drive, stated this morning that many people have the idea that this drive is the regular Red Cross roll call and have made their contributions in line with the roll call policy of \$1.00 per person. He pointed out that this is not the regular drive but a very special one to raise funds for the Red Cross to carry on very special duties for our men in service and their families. These duties have been designated for the Red Cross by the United States government and millions of dollars will be required to do the work.

Ranger citizens are being asked to give more to this drive because of the necessity of the funds and because the Red Cross has more than tripled Ranger's quota over the 1942 quota. The quota for 1942 was \$1250 and this quota being sought now is \$4,500.

Fearson, and Dr. G. C. Boswell, chairman for the Red Cross in Ranger, both expressed their appreciation to the public for the response already given and to the workers who have given their time to the cause.

Dr. Boswell announced at the meeting that the community of Okra was the first in Eastland county to raise the quota and that they had done not only this but had contacted the Eastland County headquarters for more cards and tags with the intention of going over the quota.

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## Book Collection Still Attracts Many Visitors

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 5.—Transportation hazards to the contrary, travelers from 34 states and nine foreign countries have visited the University of Texas' Rare Book Collections, finest state university owned collection in the country, during the last three months.

Among the 310 visitors who signed the guest book during December, January and February, were one person each from Chile, Colombia, Peru, England, North Africa, Brazil, Puerto Rico, and Germany. Mexico was represented by twelve visitors.

"At least twenty visitors tour the library for every one who signs the guest book," librarians say, indicating an average of two thousand per month.

## A & M Inaugurates A New Course In Engineering

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 4.—The A. & M. College of Texas has inaugurated a four-year curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Management, according to announcement by Dean Gibb Gilchrist. The curriculum covers the same basic engineering subjects founded on the physical sciences included in all engineering curricula, and the first five semesters are identical with the Mechanical Engineering curriculum. During the sixth semester, the students begin the study of subjects which executives need and during the seventh and eighth semesters, subjects dealing with handling men, planning production, figuring costs, and finding simpler ways to produce goods are studied in detail. V. M. Fairies is head of the new department.

"This curriculum has been instituted largely because of the rapid industrialization of Texas and the Southwest," Dean Gilchrist explained. "While the opportunities in the industries of Texas will be emphasized, there is no doubt but that graduates will find employment in all parts of the Nation."

"Surveys have shown that some 75 per cent of all engineering graduates are sooner or later employed in fields other than their speciality in college. Many of these engineers no longer doing strictly engineering work have moved into executive positions where their background knowledge of engineering principles is invaluable, but where their pressing need is knowledge of the principles of management."

## Mutual Insurance Companies Get A Favorable Vote

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 2. (UP)—The Texas senate gave a favorable vote to extending the charters of statewide mutual insurance companies after a session in which the mutuals were described by some senators as a curb on costs of old line insurance and by others as a racket.

One senator called a charter for a mutual a "pirate's license." Opponents asserted that the bill lets mutuals come in the back door of the legislature in 1936 closed the front door to them by forbidding future charters.

Sen. Kyle Vick of Waco, bill author, said the statewide mutuals now operating are under the supervision of the state insurance department and that practices which led to former adverse legislation is not continued by the existing mutuals.

Sen. Houghton Brownlee of Austin lightened the discussion by inquiring blandly if the bill would bring parmutuels back to life.

## Machines' Profits Go To Buy Flowers For Ill, Bereaved

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 4. (UP)—Outside the house entrance and in the corridor behind the chamber are several soda water, cigaret and candy machines. During a legislative session intake of the machines jumps sharply, and all for a good cause.

Into a special fund goes a percentage commission from profits of the machines. This money is designated as the "flower fund." When legislators are ill or there is death in the family, money is taken from the fund to buy flowers as a message of sympathy from the house. A senate soft drink machine is similarly operated with profits going to a flower fund.

## President Roosevelt Completes Ten Years As Head Of Nation

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 5. (UP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday completed 10 years as President of the United States, determined that victory and the foundation of a stable peace be established before his term expires, Jan. 20, 1945.

As he completes a full decade in the Presidency—an office which no man in the United States had ever before held for more than eight years—there is much speculation as to whether or not he will seek an unprecedented fourth election. Already, Senator Joseph F. Guffey, Democrat, of Pennsylvania has suggested the advisability of having Roosevelt be a candidate for the 1945-1949 term to contribute his experience toward the shaping of the post war world.

By a coincidence, Roosevelt first entered the White House just as Adolf Hitler was rising to power in Germany. Hitler became Chancellor on Jan. 30, 1933, but in those days was overshadowed by the Fascist dictator, Benito Mussolini, then at the height of his career. Joseph Stalin in Russia and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek in China, now among the foremost leaders in the anti-Axis front, were then already firmly entrenched.

German and Italian aggressive intentions had not yet appeared, but Japan already was fully embarked on its adventure of carrying up China.

Roosevelt's role in history cannot possibly be objectively evaluated until some years go by, but his energetic leadership in many fields including a great war and his lengthy stay in office assures him a place among the famous.

Funeral services for Jacob L. Beckner, who died here Thursday, were conducted Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Killingsworth Funeral Home with Rev. H. B. Johnson in charge of the services. Interment was in the Evergreen Cemetery.

The deceased, who had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. C. Y. Brown for the past 18 years, was born in Gainesville, April 22, 1876 and was a member of the Missionary Church at Stephenville. Surviving besides the daughter, is a brother-in-law, A. Briles of Stephenville and a grandson, James V. Brown of Ranger.

## World War No. II Introduces Idioms To Our Language

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 5.—World War II has brought more new idioms to the English language than any other similar period, a University of Texas English authority believes.

Dr. E. B. Atwood, assistant professor of English, points out that most of the new expressions concern political ideology or methods of warfare, citing such words as "Fascism," "gestapo," "Black-out," "Panzer," "blitzkrieg," and "fifth column."

Up to now, the bulk of these new expressions have stemmed from the German language, he adds, but predicts that now the tide of war is swung in favor of the Allies, we may look for an onrush of new words from the Russian and from the languages of other Allied nations.

## LIONS CLUB TO ASSIST IN BOOK DRIVE

At next week's meeting no member will be admitted to the luncheon unless he presents a "book or a buck." Joe N. Graham, president of the club, stated that being absent from the meeting will not excuse members from contributing to the campaign.

Graham also stated that the public is invited to assist in the drive and that anyone desiring to give books may leave them at the Lions luncheon room in the Paramount Hotel.

It was also announced at the meeting that on March 18 the club will sponsor a moving picture on social security. The film will be shown at the Arden Theatre at 12:45 o'clock, will last only 20 minutes, and will show what the social security tax is, how it works and where the money goes. Graham said that the film is being sent out by the Social Security office in Abilene.

## March Checks To Aged Persons Number 183,367

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 5.—The State Department of Public Welfare announced today that it will begin mailing March checks within a few days to 183,367 aged persons on the Old Age Assistance rolls. Funds now available will make it necessary to cut each check \$2 below the authorized grant, the Department stated. The rolls made a net increase of five cases due to the fact that the department's field workers are now devoting their time to the annual re-investigation of cases. During February 10,981 increases in grants were authorized to become effective this month. Reinvestigations resulted in 805 denials and reduction of grants in 1,321 cases. One thousand and eighty-five recipients were removed from the rolls because of death. New applications approved for grants and old people reinstated on the rolls totaled 1,895.

Blind assistance rolls made a net increase of 53 during February. The total now on the rolls is 4,233. Aid to dependent children cases on the rolls made a net increase of 85 families, or a net increase of 137 children, bringing the total number of families receiving assistance under this program up to 11,960. The average grant in all three programs increased in March the average grant for Old Age Assistance recipients is \$21.92, but with a \$3 cut aged recipients will receive an average payment of only \$18.92. Blind recipients will receive checks averaging \$23.50, and Aid to Dependent Children checks will average \$21.59.

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## Representatives Disapprove Vote To Kill Tax Bills

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 5. (UP)—Texas representatives today showed disapproval to vote of a House Committee to kill six tax bills and sent the bills back to the committee for reconsideration.

Two other bills which the committee killed were not discussed by the house. They were to hike franchise taxes and to lower ad valorem taxes from seven to two cents for confederate veterans and widows.

## BRITISH TAKE SED JENANE AS FRENCH IN SOUTH SIEZED TWO TOWNS BEING HELD BY GERMANS

Allied Planes Pound Axis Positions In Tunisia While In Russia The Reds Continue To Take Towns After Town

LONDON, Eng. Mar. 5. (UP)—Allied forces reported victories at both ends of the Tunisian front today. British tanks and troops hurling the Germans out of Sed Jenane in the north while the French seized Mides and pushed into Nefta in the south.

A Nazi unit forced its way into Sed Jenane, road junction 12 miles south of Cape Serrat, only to be driven out in brisk street fighting. As the French troops pushed along the edge of the Chott Djerid in lower Tunisia, the British Eighth Army probed at the Mareth line in preparation for a full-scale assault.

Allied planes pounded ceaselessly at Axis positions in Tunisia, striking at the communication lines from the north, they sank four ships and damaged others.

The Red Army, capitalizing on the capture of Rbeiv, was driving swiftly westward. The occupation of 53 more towns and villages west and southwest of the stronghold 130 miles northwest of Moscow was reported, along with gains in all key sectors of the 900-mile front.

The Germans reported heavy Soviet attacks in the area of Staraya Russa, key fortress below Lake Ilmen, indicating that Marshal Timoshenko was hitting hard in that area.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 5. (UP)—American fliers again attacked four Japanese air bases in the Solomons and the enemy countered with an ineffectual raid on Guadalcanal, the navy announced today.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 5. (UP)—Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles said today that the great majority of Americans and British in the Shanghai area have been interned by the Japanese.

ELEVEN out of every 12 cases of sabotage reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation turns out to be not direct sabotage, but the results of carelessness, industrial accidents, or even petty revenge of a workman against his boss...

For instance, there was the case of the janitor in a large eastern plant engaged in the manufacture of highly confidential instruments...

It was a bundle of matches bound with adhesive tape. One match, partly burned, extended from the bundle. It was obvious that the one match was intended to ignite the other matches...

Twenty-three planes in an aircraft plant were apparently sabotaged by placing glass in the fluid of the hydraulic brake system. These bits of glass, which would have chewed through the rubber tube connections...

Investigation was then directed to all possible sources of such glass in this plant. It centered finally on a "flow meter" used in testing the brakes...

The operator had neglected to remove the broken glass and had merely inserted a new valve and gone on about his business...

When he was finally tracked down and identified as the individual who had tampered with the plane, he gave as his reason and in a signed confession declared that his sole motive was to see whether the FBI could solve a sabotage case...

AUSTIN, Tex. Mar. 4. (UP)—When the senate committee on elections had before it the bill for a secret ballot, advocates of the secret ballot explained in detail how the number is placed on the ballot with a perforated line below the number so the number can be torn off when the ballot is voted.

Among the attendants grouped near the committee to add their word for the bill were noted some persons who are suspected of having bolted party nominees.

Democratic primary ballots carry a pledge at the top which reads: "I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

A waggish senator suggested that in view of the propensity displayed in the past for Democrats to bolt, it might be well to have the pledge printed above the perforation so that it can be torn off with the number.

Commented another prominent legislator after the house and senate committees had reported favorably on the secret ballot: "I'm in favor of the secret ballot because now our wives will not know how we vote on the liquor issue."
