CLEVEN out of every 12 cases of sabotage reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation turns out to be not direct sabotage, but the results of carelessness, industrial accidents, or even petty revenge

of a workman against his boss-not an attempt to wreck the war effort. While FBI authorities caution that this large percentage of false alarms should in no way couse plant guards and of ers to relax vigilance against saboteurs, some of the cases of pseudo-sabotage have their curious quirks.

For instance, there was the case of the jani'or in a large eastern plant engaged in the manufac-ture of highly confidential instruments. In the wastepaper basket of the drafting room, this janitor found what appeared to be a delayed action

It was a bundle of matches bound with achesive tape. One match, partly burned, extended from the bundle. It was obvious that, the one match was intended to ignite the other matches, thus

starting a really not fire. The FBI was called in and, duris the investigation, it was discovered that the under sides of the metal stools used by draftsmen were blackened and contained traces of the adhesive tape. Finally one of the draftsmen explained and confessed. It was a common gag in this drafting room to fasten these match bundles to seats of the stools, then ignite the lead match and walk away. The sudden flaring of the matches gave the victim a realistic hot seat and everybody laughed. This in a room where invaluable tracings and blueprints were kept, any of which would

TWENTY-THREE planes in an aircraft plant were apparently sabo-Tiese bits of glass, which would have chewed through the rubber tube connections, were extracted in the crime laboratory of the FBI headquarters in Washington, and on examination it was found that all the pieces nad curved surfaces, the glass being of a special heat-

Investigation was then directed to all possible sources of such glas in this plant. It centered finally on a "flow meter" used in testion the brakes. On opening the chamber of the meter, the missing piece of the glass test valve were discovered and the cause of the accident explained. During a night shift, one of the valves had broken ar-

If that looks like a contradiction and an impossibility, maybe a liftle explanation will clear up this most curiou of all crazy situations in this cockeyed world. Normally, every country wants U. S. dollars and if it has anything to sell, it will peddle for as many dollars as it can get. But that situation no longer What these countries like Spain and Portugal, Turkey, Sweden, Switzerland, North Africa and the Argentine want more than dollars are goods

with which to stock the shelves of their own stores, goods which they can sell to their own people. The result is that an old-fashioned barter—an exchange of U. S. kerosene and gasoline for whatever the neutral nations may have an excess of is a lot more welcome than U. S. cash on the barrel head. This is the situation which agents of the U.S. Edson Commercial Corporation, doing preemptive buying all over the world, are meeting up with increas-

lagly. This U. S. Commercial Corporation, a government-owned sidiary company operating with Reconstruction Finance Corporation money under State Department and Board of Economic Warfare blessing and directive, has as its principal job the buying up of things that Germany also wants. But more and more frequently now, it is not the amount of money Germany or the U. S. offers that decides which country will get the goods, but what in place of money is offered for exchange.

DERHAPS the most valuable commodity which the U. S. can offer is petroleum. The United States hasn't any too much to spare, as you may have heard, but Germany hasn't any to spare and countries like Spain and Portugal and North Africa haven't any at all. To get the metals and other war materials moving to port where they can be shipped to the United States, it becomes necessary to feed few low-grade petroleum products into these countriesfor lamps and stoves, gasoline to keep trucks moving, oil to keep transportation rolling.

But here creeps in an element of danger. If more than just esough U. S. petroleum is exported to these countries, some of it may leak to Germany. Here the agents of the U.S. Commercial Corporation supplies are consumed and that there will be no re-exports to the axis. An important diplomatic factor in all this is to fortify Spanish and Portuguese resolve and ability to remain neutral—a condition just as important to the United Nations as it is to the two countries

 $\Lambda^{\rm LL}$ sorts of safeguards have been thought up to prevent re-export. Instead of shipping in needed drugs like atabrine in bulk, the tablets are packaged in doses to permit widest possible distribution. If any leaks to the axis, it will be only in one or two-pill lots. There is an over-all check on exports right in the United States.
