ALLIES MAKE SLIGHT GAIN IN TUNISIA

ALLIED PLANES CONTINUE TO BATTER JAPANESE BASES IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC WAR ZONE

2,000 pounders are used in two hour pre-dawn raid on Rabaul as planes weather intense anti-aircraft fire

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, March 26, (Friday) (UP)—Allied planes, battering the big Japanese base at Rabaul, New Britain, in another heavy raid Thursday started large fires and set off heavy explosions, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported Friday.

For the second time in three days the big Allied planes battered the chief Japanese base in this theater, dropping 2,000-pound blockbusters on the enemy installations.

The attack lasted two hours—thirty minutes longer than the smashing raid of last Tuesday. As the Allied planes dropped their devastating load of explosives, smoke and flames billowed 3,000 feet in the air from the waterfront areas.

"In a two-hour pre-dawn attack" the United Nations headquarters noon communiqué said, "our heavy units struck the town area with bombs ranging as high as 2,000 pounds. Large fires and heavy explosions were seen along the northern shore of the harbor. Flaming rage six hours later.

"Intense anti-aircraft fire and searchlight opposition was encountered but no attempt was made at interception. Six hours later, one of our reconnaissance planes over the area observed smoke and flame from waterfront fires rising to 3,000 feet."

Rabaul was rocked before dawn Tuesday, when three waves of American Flying Fortresses showered fifty-four tons of bombs on 250 Japanese aircraft trapped on Lakunai, Vunaganau and Rapopo airfields, so effectively that a substantial proportion of the planes were believed put out of action permanently.

Friday's communiqué reported Allied raids on six places, including three in New Britain, two in New Guinea and the former Dutch naval base of Ambon, southwest of New Guinea.

Heavy bombers scored direct hits with 500-pound bombs on an 8,000-ton and a 6,000-ton Japanese vessel at Amon. Large fires were started in the wharf and building areas of the town, the communiqué said.

Besides battering Rabaul, Allied planes made a three-hour night attack on the Ubihi area of New Britain, described briefly by the communiqué as a harassing attack. Off-bombed Gasmata, the important enemy air base on New Britain's south shore, was raided by a heavy bomber that scored direct hits on the wharf and adjacent structures there.

Attack planes returned at dawn to raid Salamaua, one of the remaining major resistance points on the New Guinea's north coast. They bombed buildings and enemy supply installations.

Heavy planes twice raided a Japanese airbase at Lae, the other major Japanese stronghold on New Guinea's north coast.

At Dyke Ackland Bay, south of Buna, on the north coast of New Guinea, Allied fighters intercepted an enemy medium bomber on reconnaissance and shot it down.

Nation's Stars Entered For The K. of C. Meeting

By DENNIS DALTON United Press Staff Correspondent CLEVELAND, March 19. (UP)—With many of the nation's crack sprinters and routers on the program, the third annual Knights of Columbus track meet here March 26 shipped up today as an assault upon several world records.

Gilbert Dodds, bespectacled Boston divinity student, is among the stellar track athletes who will compete at the meet, during which two world records were broken and a third tied last year.

Dodds, former Ashlan, O., college student, will match strides with such renowned milers as Earl Mitchell of Indiana, Bob Wright of Ohio State and Tom Quinn, former national junior 5,000-meter champion.

Charley Beetham, former Ohio State runner from Cadiz, O., is among the entrants in the 1,000-yard event, which also has been entered by Paul Kendall, former Indiana star, and Dave Matthews of Michigan.

Two men who last year established new indoor records at the 45-yard high and low hurdle event—Bob Wright of Ohio State and Charles (Whitey) Hlad, former Michigan Normal ace—will be out to break their own marks.

Wright, strapping 200-pound senior from Huntington, W. Va., covered the high hurdles in 5.4 seconds in last year's finals, after Hlad had established the same mark in one of the semi-final heats in low hurdles. In the final, Wright skipped the distance in 5.1 seconds.

The previous records were 5.6 for the high, held by Fred Wolcott of Rice, and 5.4 for the low, set by Allan Tolmich, former Wayne University star.

Six Flee Spain As A Plot Fails

NEW YORK, March 25 (UP).—Six high Spanish officers, including two Generals, have been interned in Portugal after escaping by plane from Spain, where they were threatened with arrest when a plot was uncovered against Generalissimo Francisco Franco, advisers from European sources said Thursday.

It was reported the plot was concerned with the question of restoring the monarchy in Spain. The officers arrived in Portugal March 14, advisers said, in two Spanish military planes from Seville, in southwestern Spain. One made a crash landing, and the passengers were injured slightly.

The six were held by Portuguese authorities at hotels and were permitted no outside communication. The officers were said to be trying to reach Great Britain or North Africa, but it was believed the Portuguese authorities insisted that they go to South America.

TEST BLANKS AVAILABLE AT HIGH SCHOOL

Application blanks for the qualifying tests on Friday, April 2, for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Training Program are now available at room 12 in Ranger Junior College and High School, H. L. Baskin announced today.

Properly filled out, these applications will admit qualified high school seniors or recent graduates to the tests. Each applicant may indicate on his blank whether he prefers the Army, or the Navy, which includes the Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

From those who successfully complete the tests candidates for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Training Program will be selected to attend colleges under contract to the respective services. Students selected for the Army Program must undergo further screening during thirteen weeks of basic military training before they are finally qualified for college attendance. Students chosen for the Navy Program, after selection by the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, will be detailed directly to college.

Students who attend college under either of the programs will be under military discipline on active duty in uniform with pay. All expenses, including tuition, food, housing, books and uniforms will be paid by the Army or the Navy.

Church Going Is Regular With U. of T. Students

AUSTIN, Texas, March 19.—If the people of every community in the United States went to church as faithfully as University of Texas students do, the churches of the nation wouldn't hold them—there'd be between forty and seventy million members in the congregations every Sunday, estimates Dr. J. C. Reddick, chairman of the University faculty committee on student religious activities.

Dr. Reddick said student attendance at churches ranges from 2,500 to 4,500 each Sunday, or 35 to 55 per cent of the student body. Up to 80 per cent of the students attend churches occasionally. Sunday school attendance runs about 1,000, and approximately 800 regularly participate in student planned evening programs.

Collection Of Fats, Greases Shows Increase

AUSTIN, Texas, March 26.—Collection of fats and greases in Texas increased by 35,493 pounds in January over the preceding month, Mr. George B. Butler, Executive Secretary of the Texas Salvage Commission, advised Gov. Coke R. Stevenson today. The total collection in January was 239,649 pounds. Officials of the Texas Salvage Commission pointed out that this was not a bad report for Texas, considering the meat shortage existing in many counties, but that it was still only about 34 percent of the amount expected of this State.

OFFENSIVE ON MARETH LINE DEVELOPING DESPITE STRONG RESISTANCE FROM ROMMEL

Americans pushing to sea as airfield at Mezzouna is pounded by American Long toms, the 155-millimeter rifles

LONDON, England, (UP)—Radio Algiers said today that the British Eighth Army was developing its offensive against the Mareth Line despite stiff opposition and that American forces in South-Central Tunisia were pushing toward the sea.

Field dispatches said the troops of Lt. Gen. George S. Patton Jr. were fanning out on both sides of the highway a few miles short of Mezzouna, whose airfield already has been pounded by American Long Toms, the 155-millimeter rifles.

Seventy-five miles to the southwest in the Mareth Line, Axis artillery was dueling with British Eighth Army guns in an apparent stalemate after German troops had wiped out a large part of early British penetrations of an offensive begun last Saturday night.

The Vichy radio quoted Berlin reports late Thursday night admitting an Axis retreat at an unspecified point, saying the Germans were then attacked by British forces "coming from the desert." This announcement may refer to the El Hamma sector, thirty miles northwest of the Wadi Ziznan, where one British column has outflanked the lower end of the Mareth line.

DAVIS GIVEN AUTHORITY IN NEW POSITION

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UP)—Chester C. Davis, head of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in the early days of the New Deal and now president of the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis emerged today as apparently undisputed administrator of the nation's food supplies subject only to authority of president Roosevelt himself.

Mr. Roosevelt told a press conference that Davis would have control over all farm product prices from the soil to retail markets, in cooperation with the office of price administration.

From other sources however, it was learned that Davis had insisted as a condition to taking over the new job that he have final word on farm and food price ceilings, and that OPA accept his recommendations and carry them out.

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Kiska Target For American Planes

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UP)—Army heavy and medium bombers slashed at Kiska in the Aleutians four times on Wednesday, the navy announced today. Beyond saying that his were scored in the target area, the navy provided no other details. All our planes returned to their base.

Judge Lindsey Dies Today At 73

LOS ANGELES, (UP)—Judge Ben H. Lindsey, advocate of companionate marriage and "father" of the modern juvenile court, died today. He was 73.

Chinese Will Be Taught At Tech

LUBBOCK, Tex. Mar. 23.—Registration for an introductory course in Chinese has started at Texas Technological College under the direction of Dr. Ling, Research Fellow in Child Development.

Enrollment for the course will continue through March 25. This class meets twice each week in the evenings and will extend over a six-weeks period.

French Reports Say Americans Arrested By Nazi

BERN Switzerland, (UP)—Reports from France said today that German authorities had arrested all able-bodied American and British men living in the former unoccupied zone and deported them, apparently to Germany.
