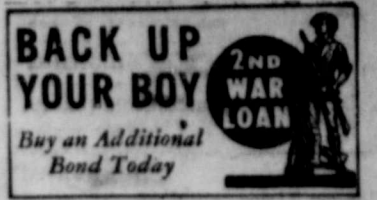

## Americans 10 Miles From Bizerte

### ANTWERP IS TARGET FOR RAF BOMBERS

Big American Planes Start Fires in City And Return Unharmed

LONDON, May 5 (Wednesday) (AP)—United States Flying Fortresses attacked German industrial targets in Antwerp late Tuesday and two minutes after the first bombs hit home funnels of flame and smoke leaped 2,000 feet above the Heligian city.

All Fortresses returned safely, the first time in ten raids that the United States 8th Air Force had not lost any of its heavy bombers.

The American heavyweights struck shortly after swift RAF Mosquito bombers had hammered an electric power station in the Hague without loss.

In the evening American-built medium Ventura bombers of the RAF, escorted by fighter planes, kept Axis Europe quaking with an assault on the rail yards at Abbeville, France.

Three enemy fighters were destroyed on that mission while one British fighter was lost.

Two RAF coastal command planes were lost from shipping reconnaissance operations during the day off the coast of Norway, where the Germans have been reported massing warships.

Air Ministry announced that RAF fighters destroyed nine enemy fighters and probably destroyed or damaged several others Tuesday in escort missions and in a sweep off the estuary of the Somme River. Four RAF fighters were lost.

LONDON—The biggest force of four-motored British bombers ever in action dropped nearly 1,500 tons of explosives on the German coal and steel center of Dortmund last night, a Royal Air Force spokesman announced today.

The Fortresses went out in medium formation superbly covered by fleets of American, British, and Allied fighters.

While the fighters smothered German Focke-Wulf fighter plane squadrons, the Fortresses hit the industrial targets in the second American bombing of Antwerp.

A bulletin issued early Wednesday by the British Air Ministry and United States Army, European theater of operations reported that the attack was made in clear weather and good bombing results were observed.

American bombers destroyed a number of enemy fighters and the final figure probably will be revealed in a few days when claims of all gunners have been checked carefully.

Three of the Allied fighters were lost, but they destroyed two enemy fighters during dog fights which raged around the forts.

The communiqué said the bombardiers aimed at important industrial targets. The targets were not identified, but it was recalled that in the last Antwerp raid, on April 5, when four heavy bombers were lost, the Zaria airplane and engine works was knocked out.

The Germans had announced late Tuesday that Antwerp was raided and claimed one bomber and one Spitfire fighter, both hit by anti-aircraft fire, crashed in the outskirts of the city.

The Berlin radio claimed German fighters formed a tight barrage around the bombers and that, although there were the usual dead and wounded among the civilian population, the German defenses succeeded in preventing a massacre similar to that in the raid of April 5.

The German-controlled Paris radio said it was made by a strong formation of bombers which caused great damage.

### SPECIAL DAYS SET TO ISSUE CANNING SUGAR

In order that the public may be better served with reference to securing sugar for canning, three days a week have been set aside for applicants to call at the Chamber of Commerce to make their requests.

Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays morning have been designated as days on which the sugar will be issued.

It was also pointed out that persons wishing to secure the extra sugar must have with them, when they apply, war Ration Book No. 1 and that the book must be registered in Eastland County before additional sugar can be granted.

Persons moving here from other counties should have their books registered in this county and transfers for this may be secured at the Chamber of Commerce.

Pleas Moore stated that there is a tremendous demand for the extra sugar and that he averages issuing 130 pounds per hour. Total pounds issued to date runs well into the thousands.

Persons wishing to secure sugar for canning are requested to note the schedule just announced and to make their requests on these days only, as the schedule will be strictly adhered to.

### Aviation Meet To Be Held At A & M May 6-8

COLLEGE STATION, May 5. (A&M)—Hailed as the outstanding meeting of its kind in the United States, a full program has been prepared for the Second Texas Aviation Conference to be held at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, May 6-8, according to Howard W. Barlow, head of the College Aeronautical Engineering Department.

These dates are in the week of May 3-8 which has been proclaimed as Texas Aviation Week by Governor Coke K. Stevenson.

Activities to be covered include the many phases of airplane manufacture, flight training, transport, personnel, procurement, public and press relations, research, Civil Air Patrol, manpower, and others concerning the air craft and air transport considered important.

Participating agencies include schools and colleges, manufacturers, operators, engineers, civic groups and others. Also scheduled to be present are Major General Gerald C. Brant, commanding officer, Army Air Forces, Gulf Training Center, Ray J. Field; Lt. Col. Earle Johnson, Army Air Corps and commanding officer of the Civil Air Patrol, and Eugene Jeffrey, Army Air Corps Public Relations Department, Washington.

General Brant will be the principal speaker at the banquet the night of May 6.

### St. Rita's Students Present Special Program For Mothers

The younger students of St. Rita's school under the direction of Sister Evangelista, presented a special Mother's Day program, honoring their mothers, Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at St. Rita's Hall.

Individual invitations made by the students were sent to the mothers, and at the program each was presented with a program bearing her picture. Ushers for the occasion were Dena Pulley and Betsy Lou Kincaid.

During the afternoon the following program was presented: a playlet entitled "Troubles of Little Folks," presented by a group of girls and a skit "A Heart of Gold" by the entire class. The closing number was another skit "There's A Flag Flying High."

### TRAFFIC LAW VIOLATORS TO LOSE GASOLINE

R. E. Garner, Ranger representative on the Eastland County gasoline rationing board, stated this morning that the board is getting so many reports of traffic violations by Eastland county residents, traveling in other counties, that the board feels that the public should be reminded of penalties for such violations.

It was pointed out that gasoline rations can be taken from traffic violators for the first offense and for the second offense it is mandatory that the board take up all gasoline coupons. Regulations for gasoline rationing state very plainly that no matter where the traffic violation occurs, police checking the violation are to report the offense to the board in the county where the person lives. A record of the violations are kept and are checked each time supplemental gasoline is applied for.

The board made it clear, that this warning is being issued as a protection to motorists who wish to continue to operate their cars for the duration, and that when a second traffic offense is scored against a motorist, that the board will issue a report to the gasoline rationing board.

It was also explained that the board is now issuing supplemental gasoline for a period of one month instead of the three month period. This became necessary when it was discovered that motorists were not paying any heed to length of the period for which the gasoline must last, but were using it extravagantly and consequently running out of gas before the period expired. These persons would then appeal to the board for extra gas, believing that they were entitled to it simply because they had exhausted their supply that supplemental gas will be issued at the end of each month instead of the three months period. Persons now applying for additional gas will be given a supply to last until the 31st of May, at which time they may apply for another supply.

### Coast's 3-Day Marriage Law Under Attack

SACRAMENTO, (UP)—California's "gin marriage" law, requiring a three-day wait for marriage licenses, is threatened with death or modification by two bills now before the legislature.

One measure, which would abolish the law altogether, has been passed by the assembly and awaits Senate action. The other, recommended for passage by the assembly judiciary committee would allow superior judges to waive the law if either applicant is a member of the armed forces.

Proponents of voiding the laws point out that California now requires physical examinations and blood tests for the issuance of marriage licenses, which is an adequate delay to prevent hasty weddings. The three-day wait, passed back in the "flaming '20's to discourage anyone intoxicated from getting married, has become particularly discriminatory to members of the armed services with only limited leaves, it was said.

Further, gasoline rationing and travel restriction has made it difficult to journey into neighboring states to escape the California law.

### College Group Visits Class At Rising Star

Baskin reported that the group was cordially received and a number of students expressed particular interest in the college.

### Nazis Lose Heavily In New Offensive

MOSCOW—Soviet artillery wiped out nearly 1,600 enemy troops and destroyed four tanks and 21 guns in one sector alone today as the Russians pressed a new offensive northeast of the Black Sea, naval base of Novorossisk.

### Fliers In Pacific Harass Japanese

WASHINGTON—American fliers struck at three Japanese bases in the Central Solomon Islands and blasted Kiska in the Aleutians nine more times, the navy announced today.

### Allies within striking distance of Tebourba which is the last strong position before Tunis

The Tunisian battle line swayed dangerously to close to Bizerte and Tunis today. Setting the pace for Allied advances in Tunisia, the Americans drove to within 10 miles of Bizerte while another arm of the United States second army corps swung in only six miles from Tebourba, strong point in the outer defenses of Tunis.

### Farm Cash Income Takes Big Jump

AUSTIN, Tex. May 4.—Farm cash income in Texas took another leap upward in March, as total income rose to \$1 million dollars, a gain of 70 per cent over the same months of last year, Dr. F. A. Buechel, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research statistician has revealed.

During the first three months of 1943, agricultural income has amounted to 169 million dollars, a gain of 52 per cent over the 111 million received by farmers during the same period of 1942, Dr. Buechel reported.

During the five year base period of 1928-1932, average cash income during March was approximately 18 million dollars, Dr. Buechel pointed out. The index figure for March, 1943, was thus 342.2—a gain of 242.3 per cent over the average for the base period.

Nearly one-third of the state's farm income during March was received in the Texas Panhandle, Dr. Buechel said. Increased marketings and higher prices of livestock—cattle, calves, hogs and sheep—were responsible for this gain in income.

Two other major crops which showed a favorable year to year comparison were milk—income was up 40 per cent during March from the same month of last year—and fruits and vegetables, which brought in twice as much income as in 1942.

### Juanita Barr To Get A New Trial

AUSTIN—Juanita Barr, convicted of the pistol-slaying of dancer Blanche Woodall and sentenced to four years imprisonment, was awarded a new trial today. The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals granted defense attorneys Pleas for a rehearing and ordered a new trial.

### Shipments Of Eggs, Poultry Off

AUSTIN, Tex. May 4.—Shipments of poultry and eggs from Texas stations during March were far below those of March of last year. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has revealed.

Only five carloads of chickens and one car of turkeys were shipped in March in comparison with 131-2 of chickens and 41-2 of turkeys during the same month of 1942.

The shell-egg equivalent of all types of eggs shipped—shell, frozen and dried—during March was 715 cars as compared with 1,805 in March of last year, the Bureau reported.

WASHINGTON, (UP)—Reporters and spectators were cleared from the House Military Affairs committee room today in order that John P. Monroe, master of Washington's big red house on R Street might name "high new dealers" who allegedly told him he was going to be "sneaky."

### Census Figures Reveal Aliens Fast Dwindling

PHILADELPHIA, (UP)—The alien population of the United States is dwindling rapidly, an examination of census figures by the federal immigration and naturalization service has disclosed.

At the request of Leroy E. Snyder, assistant to the president of Canned Newspapers, the service examined census figures for 1940, 1930 and 1920 and dis-

covered that the 1940 relation of aliens to the total population in 1940 was approximately 3 per cent, whereas it had been 5.1 in 1930 and 7.1 in 1920.

The figures confirmed Snyder's suggestion to Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization Earl G. Harrison that "the decrease in immigration since the new laws became effective, plus the recent rapid increase of naturalization, would show some startling changes in the percentages of alien population."

Jerre Mangione, special assistant to Commissioner Harrison replied:

"There is no doubt about it; the alien population is rapidly dwindling.

"Especially significant in this connection is the fact that the median age of aliens is 48 years while that of native-born and naturalized citizens is 28 years. While our total population has increased from 106,000,000 citizens in 1920 to approximately 132,000,000 in 1940, the alien population decreased in the same period from more than 7,000,000 to less than 5,000,000. Inasmuch as approximately 250,000 aliens are being naturalized every year and since immigration

has virtually stopped, the non-citizen population is obviously on the wane."

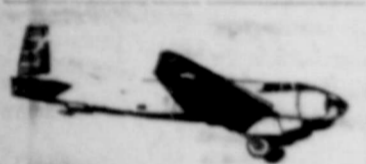

The Young School P. T. A. met Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at Young School for the final meeting of this school year.

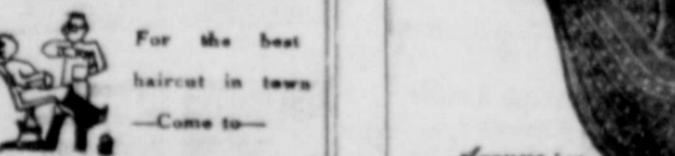

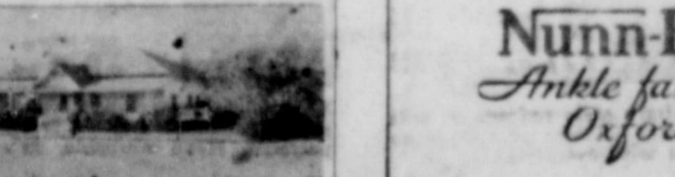

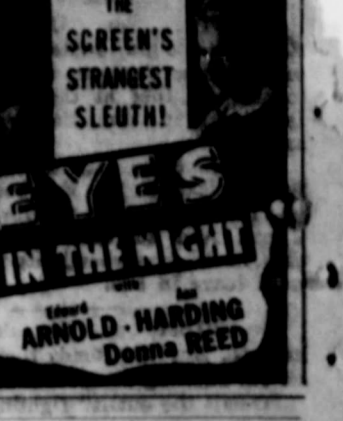
