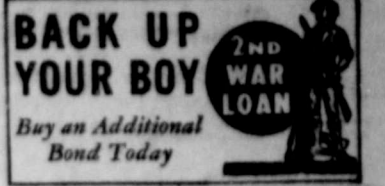

## GERMANS IN TUNISIA ASK ARMISTICE

### JAPANESE ARE REPULSED IN SOUTH PACIFIC

Three grounded enemy planes are destroyed by Catalinas at Jap base in New Guinea

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, in Australia, May 11.—Activity in the area North of Australia resulted Monday in skirmishes between Allied and Japanese war planes as Australian ground forces repulsed an enemy attack on Allied bases in the Mubo area of northeast New Guinea.

The heaviest Allied strike of the day was at Babo, Japanese base in Dutch New Guinea, where Catalinas destroyed three grounded enemy planes in bombing and strafing runs. Some twenty fires also were started around the dispersal bays.

Catalinas scored other hits on oil tanks on the water front and on their return flight they turned their machine guns on an enemy coastal vessel and on other Japanese positions ashore.

Two of nine Japanese fighters which attacked Millingimbi in the remote area east of Darwin were shot down. One of the Allied intercepting planes, a Spitfire, was lost.

The Japanese also attacked Milne Bay at the southeast tip of New Guinea. Their bombs fell in the bay causing no damage.

The attack against Dobo was made at night by medium bombers.

Two enemy float planes raided the Mappi Post area, but failed to do any damage.

Allied long-range fighters destroyed two enemy motor launches in the Serwaite River on Trangsan Island.

Heavy bombers, on reconnaissance, raided the enemy-occupied town of Saunlake in the Tambir Islands.

Three enemy fighters ineffectively attacked an Allied convoy off the coast and were driven away by the ships' anti-aircraft fire, one enemy plane being damaged.

The first attack of the war against Millingimbi was made Sunday by seven Japanese medium bombers. Damage then, too, was slight and casualties few.

In Kimbe Bay, New Britain, an Allied reconnaissance plane strafed enemy surface craft, while medium bombers attacked the airdrome at Cape Gloucester and others raided Finshafen.

### ED BEATTIE GIVES VERSION OF SURRENDER

Pelted with flowers and Amid joyous shouts British Enter prize city of Tunisian Battle

Beattie, United Press Staff Correspondent, Tunis, Via Carrier Pigeon to Allied Headquarters, May 10.—The greatest prize of the Tunisian campaign—the city of Tunis—fell to the British amid a strange battlefield scene in which the conquerors were pelted with more flowers than bullets and the joyful shouts of liberated residents drowned out the sporadic bark of guns.

The once-vaunted German army of Africa sneaked out of the capital a couple of hours ahead of the British. Some Nazis had growled empty threats at the residents and showed occasional signs of panic, the French said.

Thousands of Prisoners—Several thousands prisoners—many of whom rolled up in their own trucks to surrender—were behind the barbed wire of Allied prison cages shortly before midnight Friday and many more were coming in. A great amount of booty was seized.

Groups of German soldiers, some of whom said they purposely remained behind, surrendered to the British Derbyshire Yeomanry and armored units of the 11th Hussars, who had swung northward from the Eighth Army front after chasing the Nazis all the way from the Nile Valley. Some tried to surrender to correspondents.

Showered with Flowers—The French, including many Jews, welcomed the sun-browned, dusty British spearhead with red, yellow and blue wild flowers. Girls dashed from the curb to throw them into armored cars while British tanks were still cleaning out little knots of resistance a few blocks away.

Men and women, some sobbing and some singing the "Marseillaise," crowded the streets, over which hung a heavy pall of smoke caused by demolition of installations the enemy wrecked before withdrawing. Sometimes a half-hysterical girl would rush out to plant a kiss on the dirty cheek of a grinning tankman.

### FOUR YEAR OLD RANGER BUSINESS ONE OF BEST

### DEGAULLE GETS NEW PROPOSAL FROM GIRAUD

General suggests a partnership in leading the French Forces fighting with United Nations

ALGIERS, French North Africa, May 10.—It was disclosed Monday night that General Henri Giraud has suggested an arrangement to General Charles De Gaulle whereby the two would alternate as leaders of the French forces fighting with the United Nations.

Giraud made it clear, however, that he intended that this should be a temporary arrangement with all involved willing to turn over this power to a provisional government selected by the French people as soon as France has been freed.

The offer was embodied in an appendix to Giraud's reply to De Gaulle's proposals.

Under the scheme, two big jobs were suggested for the temporary setup—president of a French council and president of a committee charged with executing the council's orders.

Giraud suggested that DeGaulle and himself take turns at both jobs, switching from time to time.

We would sign orders jointly.—"We will fulfill in turn the role of the presidency of the meetings of the committee and of the council," Giraud said.

NAVY REPORTS SINKING SUB DURING MARCH

Surfaced sub sighted by Plane when eight miles away; crewmen seen Sunning on the deck

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The destruction of a Nazi submarine in West Indian waters during March was reported Monday by the Navy.

The attack was carried out by a plane piloted by Lieut. (jg) John Edwin Dryden Jr., Kansas City, Mo., who sighted the submarine from eight miles away.

So completely was the enemy surprised, the Navy reported, that two crew members were caught basking on deck. After a 100 round machine gun burst from 300 yards, one German never rose and the other, heading for the sub's gun, threw up his hands and pitched forward on the deck.

Four depth charges dropped from an altitude of less than 100 feet by Lieut. (jg) Stetson C. Beal, Lisbon Falls, Maine, the center section went under first, then the bow and stern rose into the air and sank.

The Navy said a large oil slick spread over the waters and emerging from the wreckage of the submarine were eleven members of submarine crew, who swam or clung to debris floating about the huge oil slick.

"Cruising low over the struggling men," the Navy continued, "crew members of the Catalina dropped life rafts, along with emergency rations tied to life jackets. Six of the eleven Germans were seen to lose their grip on fragments of wreckage and slip beneath the oily waters.

Other others were seen perched on a raft. They waved frantically for the plane to land, but rough seas prevented a rescue effort."

The Navy said the plane cruised the area for an hour and thirty minutes before dwindling gasoline supplies forced a return to its base.

No survivors have been announced as rescued to date," the Navy said.

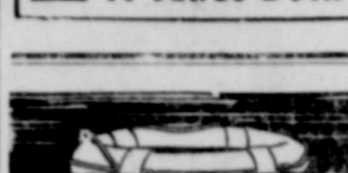

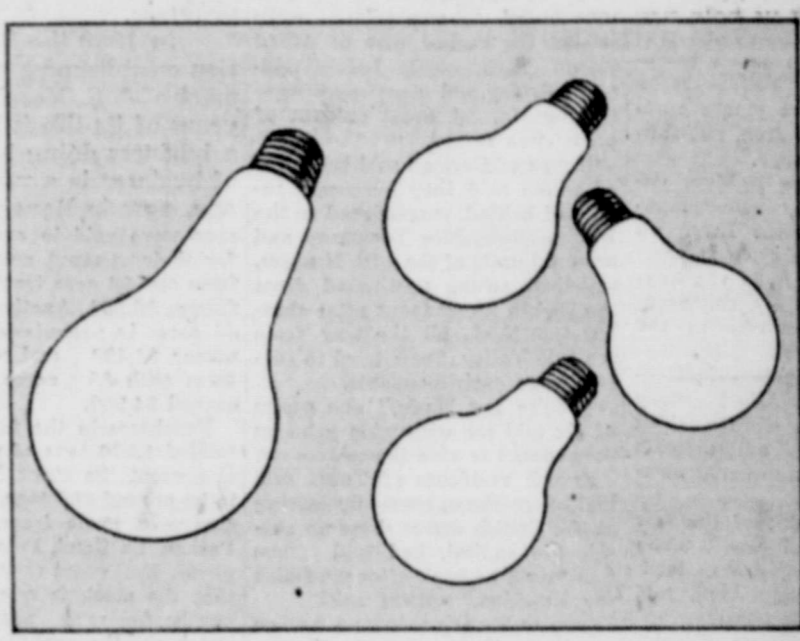

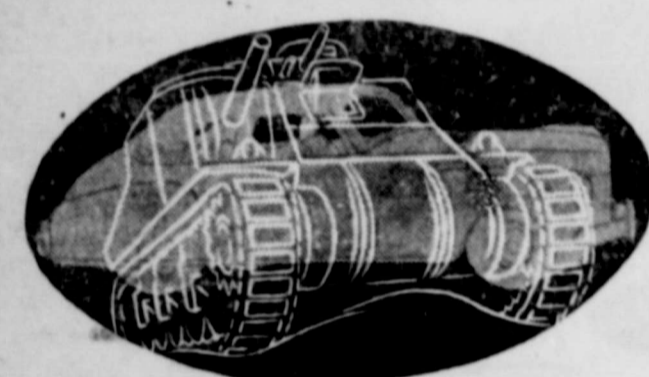
