

#### **High Points Of Rationing Are** Listed By OPA

The following sumary of rationing has been prepared by the OPA and released for study as another deadline on stamps approaches:

Sugar-Stamp No, 12 in Book No. 1 good for five pounds from March 16 until midnight May 31 1943. Stamp No. 13 valid for five pounds from June 1 until midnight August, 15.

Coffee-Stamp No. 23 in Book No. 1 (for those 14 or older on the date the book was issued) good for 1 pound from April 26 until midnight, May 30. Shoes-Stamp No. 17 in Book No. 1 good for 1 pair of shoes

through June 15. Meat, Edible Fats and (including butter), cheeses, canned Fish-Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week, Red Stamps, E.F,G,H, and J expire

May 31. Processed Foods-Blue G.H. and J stamps (48 points) valid Legion and as a member of from April 24 through May 31. Mileage Rationing

Gasoline-Value of each coupon in A. B and C books is 4 gallons. Eight A-6 coupons become valid

Tire Inspection-All "A" holders must have second official tire inspection by Sept. 30, 1943. Subsequent inspection for A book holders will be once every six months. "B" book holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, 1943. "C" book holders must have second official tire inspection by May 31, 1943. Next official tire inspection for "T" book holders must made within 60 days of last inspection or within, 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

Tires-If official tire inspector recommends a tire replacement, apply to local ration board or the tire ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all the basis of tire inspection and county quotas available with most essential mileage to come first. Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

Defrost Your Electric



#### Pick ONE DAY in the Week for Defrosting

The layer of frost that forms on the freezing unit of your electric refrigerator actually acts like a blanket. for it keeps the cold from reaching food that you want kept fresh and wholesome. This frost layer also harbors food odors, and should be removed when it becomes about 1/4 inch thick, about the thickness of a pencil.

Pick one day in the week to defrost your refrigerator. A freezing unit free from a heavy layer of frost makes ice cubes faster and maintains a lower chilling temperature in the food compartment. Consult your retrigerator instruction book for a recommended method of detrosting or try the quick method explained below if you are storing frozen foods.

#### \*HOW TO DEFROST YOUR REFRIGERATOR QUICKLY



Turn the control switch to "off" and remove everything from freeze compartment. Wrap any frozen loods with several thicknesses of paper and put them on a refrigerator shelf. They won't thaw out in the short time required to complete the defrosting.
