British Airline Makes 400th Atlantic Trip

LONDON, (UP)—Despite sub zero temperature, 60-mile-an-hour head winds and dangerous icing in the winter, crews of the British Overseas Airways Corp. have completed more than 400 North Atlantic plane crossings in the past 18 months, pointing the way to safe and regular year-round trans-Atlantic air service after the war.

The flights, made both east-west and west-east from Montreal to the United Kingdom, take an average of 17 hours. However, a new Newfoundland-Britain record of six hours

and 12 minutes was recently set by Capt. G. R. Buxton, O.B.E., 56-year-old pilot who has made 44 ocean crossings. Buxton maintained an average groundspeed of 300 mph in climbing eight minutes from the old record, set only a few days previous.

The 3,000 miles between Montreal and the United Kingdom is now often a non-stop flight. Earlier, Newfoundland was regularly used as an intermediate base.
