## State Health Officer Explains Heart Disease

Austin, Feb. 8. What do you know about your heart? Do you know that the three major kinds of heart disease are: Rheumatic heart disease, high blood pressure, and coronary heart disease?

One of childhood's most dangerous foes is rheumatic fever, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. A child is most likely to develop rheumatic fever when he is less than 10 years of age. However, the disease is not confined to children. "In World War II, about 40,000 men in the American forces developed attacks of rheumatic fever." This disease may damage the heart valves and muscle. Any child who has rheumatic fever should have the best of medical care, plenty of rest, a special diet, and be free from anxiety or worry. Just because a person has rheumatic fever, is no sign he will have rheumatic heart trouble. But it's important to keep in close check with the family physician.

Coronary heart disease strikes those from middle age groups and up, more than other forms of heart trouble. And, it strikes men more often than women. Moderation in daily living is very important, for if a person worries too much, works too hard, exercises too frequently and hard, and eats too much his heart is overworked. Yes, one of the best checks against overburdening the heart is moderation in all things—and plenty of rest.

High blood pressure is another important cause of death. Naturally, the heart has to work harder to pump blood, when blood pressure is high. An overworked heart needs the care of a physician.

Sometimes symptoms of heart trouble aren't so noticeable; that is why a regular physical examination is so important.

Heart disease caused by syphilis, congenital heart disease, and heart trouble resulting from an overactive thyroid gland, are a few other forms of heart disease. Stop and think about it for a moment. Do you give your heart enough rest?

## Farm Cash Income Now Lower Than In 1949

Austin, Texas, Feb. 7. Farm cash income in Texas totaled \$1,622,553,000 in 1950, sliding 13 per cent from \$1,860,722,000 in 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Farmers in the Black and Grand Prairies had the largest dollar income in 1950—\$255,280,000. Southern High Plains with \$245,461,000 and Red Bed Plains with \$219,545,000 ranked second and third.

All crop-reporting districts, except three, reported yearly declines in farm cash income in 1950. Increases were in Edwards Plateau, 22 per cent; Trans-Pecos, 13 per cent; and Coastal Prairies, 3 per cent.

**THE LAW AND YOU**

DO YOU KNOW that if you loan a man your car to go a short distance for a few minutes, and instead he goes to California, or some other long distance, that he may not be guilty of theft?

Theft is the unlawful taking of the property of another, and asserting ownership over it. If you allow a man to use your car, he may have violated your confidence in him by exceeding the limits of the authority you gave him, but his taking was not thus unlawful. Then, if the person who borrowed your car, always declared the same to be a borrowed car, and he in no way asserted a claim to the car, he would not be guilty of theft. Of course, if the car was taken without your knowledge or consent, another situation entirely exists, or if the person exceeding the authority given him, asserts that he is the owner of the car, or attempts to sell the car or mortgage, or exercise other acts of alleged ownership over the car, then he may be punished for theft.

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### U. S. Marine Corps Opens New Officers Candidate Course

The Marine Corps announced Sunday, January 28th its first Officer Candidate Course since World War II, whereby college graduates with no military experience may become officers.

Qualified graduates, or seniors in accredited colleges who will receive a baccalaureate degree this spring, other than in medicine, dentistry, or theology, and who will be less than 27 years of age on July 1, may write to the Commandant of the Marine Corps, Headquarters U. S. Marines Corps, Washington 25, D. C. for information.

Accepted candidates will be enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve and sent to an intensive 10 week training course at Parris Island, S. C. this spring and summer. Successful graduates will be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve and sent to the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Virginia for a comprehensive five months basic officers' course.

Candidates who fail to qualify for a commission will be given the option of discharge from the Marine Corps Reserve or assignment to active duty in enlisted status.

A limited number of graduates of this Officer Candidate Course may be offered commissions as career Marines.

### How To Launder A Sweater

Laundering a sweater is an art that any girl can acquire, says Dorothy Dixon, Sherman county Home Demonstration Agent.

She recommends collecting all the material needed to wash a sweater before starting the job. This includes a dish pan, mild soap flakes, a towel, a large piece of paper, a pencil, and lukewarm water.

Miss Dixon advises using the following procedure:

Place all necessary material within easy reach. Draw an outline of the sweater on the piece of paper before wetting it. This will save considerable time in shaping the garment after it has been laundered.

Use both hands in the washing process. Cup the hands and squeeze the suds through the garment. Mild soap and lukewarm water are the best agents for cleaning a sweater.

Rinse the sweater in water that is the same temperature as used for washing. After the sweater is rinsed, remove the excess water by gently squeezing—rather than by wringing.

Spread the sweater on the paper and shape it on the outline. Spread a towel on the sweater, and turn the whole works—towel, sweater, and paper—over. The sweater will be left on the towel in perfect shape.

Leave the sweater on the towel while it dries. Allow it to dry in a moderate temperature. Do not dry it in hot air or before an open fire. An electric fan may be used for drying if one is available.

Press the sweater lightly after it dries to give it a new look. Miss Dixon cautions that the usual sliding motion for pressing will stretch the knitted material. To prevent this, pick the iron up and set it down gently to press the sweater.
