Urging approval today for the amendment, Euclid Hudson of Port Arthur, new president of the Texas Society for Crippled Children, said that more than 15,000 needy Texans are victims of crippling conditions which make them unable to support themselves.

make them unable to support themselves.

"There are many things which can so disable a person that he or she becomes permanently and totally disabled, and unable to earn a living," Hudson explained.
"Besides the tragic results of traffic and household accidents which can strike any of us at any time, there are diseases of the bones, muscles, heart and nerves which disable thousands of Americans daily."

Hudson paid tribute to the research work of such organizations as the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the Easter Seal Research Foundation and others, but pointed out that research studies are necessarily slow and are not always rewarding.

"There are thousands of disabled persons living today for whom the wonderful medical discoveries of the last few years came too late." he said, "and many others will be disabled by other conditions before methods of prevention or cure are found. We never know but what we or someone we love will be next." Noting that many men and women are stricken by crippling conditions in the productive years between 25 and 60, Hudson explained that at present only those Texans who are either younger than 18 or older than 65 receive state and for disabilities, through the programs of ald to dependent children and old age assistance.

Passage of the proposed amendment will enable the Texas Legislature to draft legislation to take advantage of federal assistance available under the Solical Security act of 1950, already in effect in 41 states and Puerto Rico.

The proposal limits to \$20 per

ical Security act of 1950, already in effect in 41 states and Puerto Rico.

The proposal limits to \$20 per month the maximum amount that can be paid to any disabled person from state funds and bars from its aid anyone who receives other forms of assistance, such as aid to the needy blind, old age assistance, ald to dependent children, or anyone resident in a completely state-supported institution. Federal funds would increase the maximum amount of assistance to approximately \$55 per month.

Applicants for aid must meet residence requirements and undergo careful medical examination and determination of their ability to make a living. Any who would benefit from medical or curative measures will be helped to get such care.

Submitted to the last session of the Legislature by State Representative Will L. Smith of Beaumont, co-author in 1945 of the present highly regarded special education act for handicapped children, the proposed amendment has received the endorsement of the Texas Society for Crippied Children and other health and welfare organizations of the state.

Hudson pointed out that benefits of HJR 30 will be more than just financial.

"As this amendment will aid particularly that age group of

men and women who may have families which were started before they were disabled, it will strengthen family life and raise the dignity of the person who has been disabled," he said.

"This is a prime consideration in the future strength of our state and nation, where we are already fighting disintegratin of family life on many fronts."






