LONDON, July 8. (UP)- In what Germany termed a defensive and the Allies labeled as the third offensive against Russia, the Nazi have suffered the most devastating losses of the war-30,000 dead, 1,539 tanks destroyed or damaged and 649 planes shot down. So far the offensive through of any size.

The German aim in starting the huge drive last Monday was the quick encirclement and annihilation of Russian forces, holding the Kursk salient above Belgorod, the statement added, but it said that plan had been fustrated by the Red army.

"It is clear that the Germans hoped to crush the Soviet defenses and achieve big operational successes in the first days of the offensive," said the announcer in commenting on Germany's silence at the outet of the drive.
