**Knives For Lives Campaign Started**

ABILENE, Tex. (UP)—A Knives For Lives campaign has been inaugurated by the Abilene Navy Recruiting Station.

Recruiting officers have asked citizens to contribute hunting knives, or similar weapons that can be used by Navy men and Seabees.

Chief Tom O. Gaston, explaining the need of the knives, told the following story:

"Second Class Seaman Edward Fry was a pointer for the gun crew aboard the U. S. S. Astoria, when the cruiser on surface ships near Savo Island.

"A salvo hit the superstructure and sheared off the gun. Fry found himself sailing through the air. He fell in the water and started swimming.

That's the story, comments Chief Gaston who adds: "See we need knives for the boys."

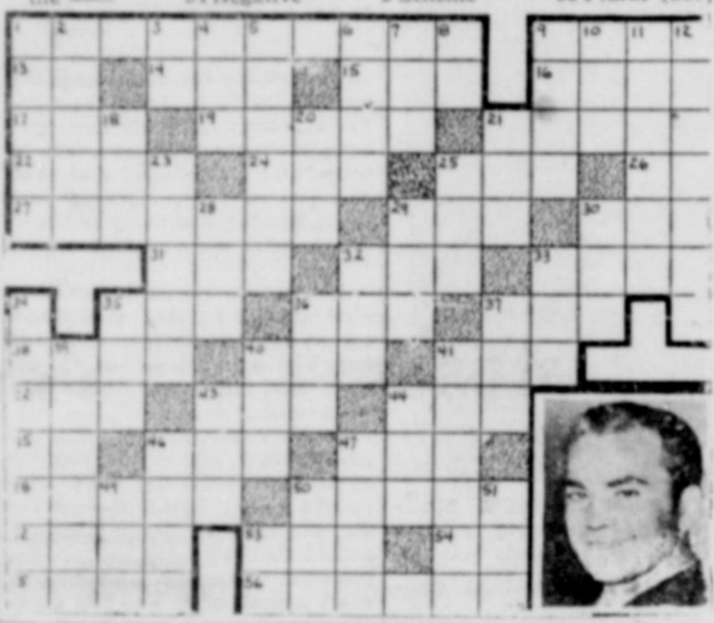

**COFFEE**—Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) is good through June 30. Stamp 21 becomes valid for one pound July 1 and expires July 21.

**MEATS, ETC.**—Red Stamps J, K, L, M, N expire June 30. Red stamp P becomes valid June 27 and Q becomes valid July 4.
