Somebody is all mixed up. People from Dimmitt, we're told, go to competitive towns, all too often, to do at least part of their shopping. If this is a fact it must stop. It is unbelievable that people in Dimmitt, or a large radius around Dimmitt, would go some place else to get skinned when it can be done here so much better and thoroughly. And too, Dimmitt merchants know you personally and sympathize with you as you suffer. The very idea of going some place where you don't get any sympathy while having the financial boom lowered on you. It is downright inconsiderate, nor is it fair to your relatives to have to see you suffer away from home. The reason we say somebody is all mixed up is because that while, maybe, some of our folks are unthoughtfully trading in a neighboring city, people from neighboring cities are trading in Dimmitt. It's a fact. Every Monday morning a cafe operator from Amarillo drives down to Dimmitt and buys a week's supply of meat for his cafe at Wilson's Super Market. It's all right for people from Amarillo, or any other place, to come to Dimmitt to trade, that is the proper thing to do. But for people from this area to go any place besides Dimmitt to trade just won't be tolerated. If Dimmitt merchants don't have what you want just tell your columnist and he will use his influence.

Despite the drouth Dimmitt business firms report the largest volume of sales for the first five months of this year in their history. Not only that, but a number of firms report that the volume of business in May has already surpassed any month of which they have a record. Apprehensions concerning the dropping off of business because of the drouth seem to have been unfounded. There is no doubt that irrigation in this area is responsible for the fine healthy business condition which exists despite the longest and driest drouth in the area's history. As proof of the area's prosperous condition Hays Implement Company ranks second in the sale of IHC Deep Freeze units for the year in the Amarillo district, and were only one unit behind the leading dealer, Plainview. Naturally that record does not only indicate a prosperous trade area, but also speaks well for the aggressive sales policy of the local dealers.

The Castro County Chamber of Commerce is going to do something about the awkward rural mail service in many sections of the county. Work is already under way to secure re-designation of routes in the county so that the patrons can have a better mail service and regular. John McFarland, Chamber Secretary, will do a major part of the work, but he will have to have some help. This is an important matter and deserves the support of everyone. Ask John what he wants you to do on the project, then do it.

An important election will be held in Dimmitt Saturday, May 27. The City of Dimmitt is a large and important business, and every resident of the city should be, and probably is, interested in the proper handling of municipal affairs. The head of the City Government for the coming year will be selected at the election Saturday and the occasion is of sufficient importance to justify the taking of time necessary to cast a vote. Regardless of who is elected citizens should manifest their interest in city affairs by voting. Whoever is elected Mayor, and the City Commissioners, will appreciate your interest and will feel that their work is appreciated if the people of the town take an interest in the city government.

The Chamber of Commerce Street Carnival will get underway Monday and continue for the week. All Concessions will be locally operated, with the various civic organizations cooperating. There will be a dunking board, with the master dunker, Swain Burkett, barking his wares. Sports Afield

No one has a right to call himself a real catfish angler until he has concocted some bait unlike all others except for having an offensive stink, the secret of he refuses to divulge for less than a thousand dollars or so.

It would of course be disgraceful for any two cat fishermen to make bait alike, but angling authority Jason Lucas took a good grip on his nose and came up with the following, which is the base for all blood baits:

Go to a slaughter house and get a bucket of fresh blood of anything from chickens to elephants. Put this into a tight closely woven cloth sack and hang it up for five or six hours until all the plasma has drained out and what's left is about as thick as liver. This can be cut in pieces, placed in glass jars and stored in the refrigerator.

From there it's up to you. Some fishermen mix feathers or cotton wool in the blood so it will be tougher; some use a half cup of powdered alum. But the scent it the big secret. You can have your choice of oil of rhodium, spoiled cheese, asafetida, rotten eggs or skunk "musk"—and this isn't even a beginning of a list of the odiferous articles compounded. It does seem to be a fact that the more horrible the smell, the better the catfish like it.

The term stink bait distinguishes oother bait from blood baits. Not that they smell any worse—how could they? Here, you start out with abucket of minnows and let it sit until there's nothing left but a thick, oily mess. Sliced bananas are considered a fine ingredient for this mess but some prefer oil of anise; there's as much room for creative genius as in blood bait. A piece of sponge or rag dipped in this seems to be a catfish's notion of an epicurena haven.

Some cat fishermen are so totally lacking in pride that they use nothing but plain liver. Others use "beef melts" which in an archaic terms for spleen. Some swear by chicken entrails and other things, which are considered best when they have reached the most advanced stage of decomposition that will permit their user to remain conscious.

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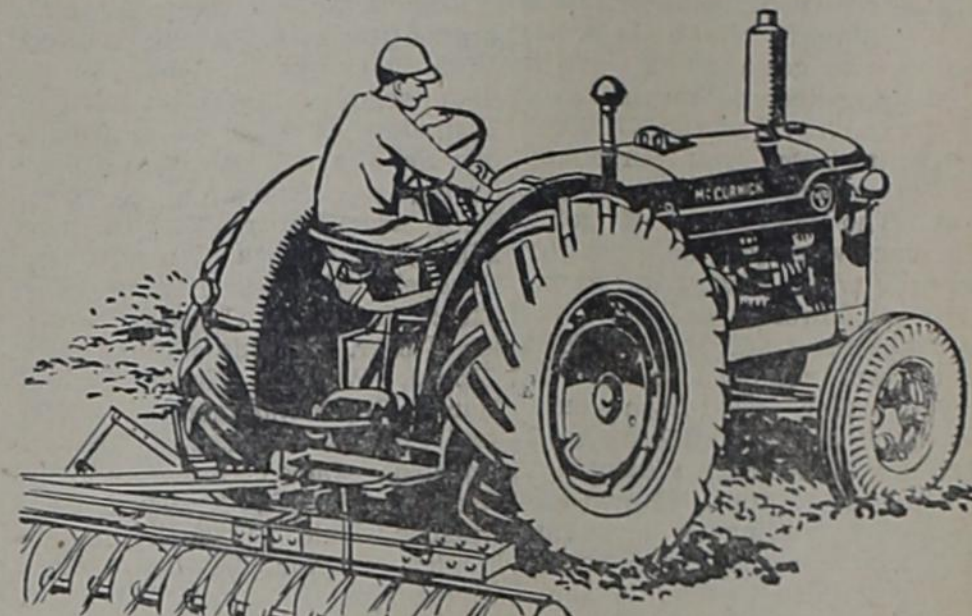
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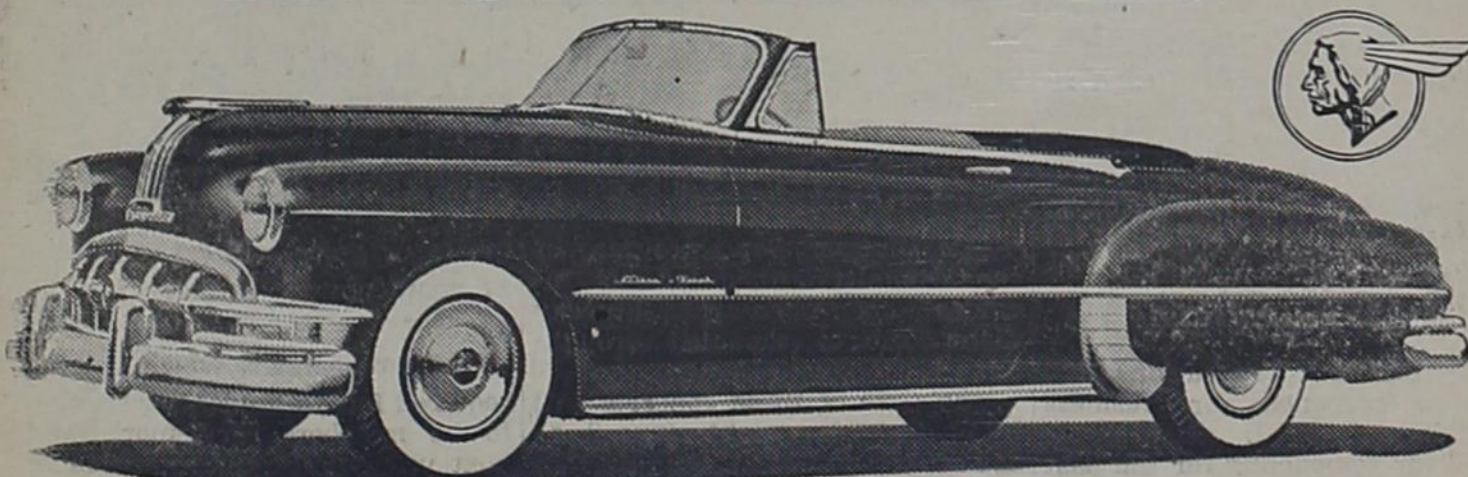

DO YOU KNOW what the "Blue Sky Law" was? Blue Sky Law was the name given to some of the earlier laws whose purpose was to restrict and control the sale of stocks of corporations. Prior to the enactment of the Blue Sky Law, there was little, if any, regulation, which would help protect the purchaser of stock in a corporation. Under such a condition, many brightly colored, fancy appearing certificates were sold which had no value. By the time the purchaser existed in name only, and that his stock certificates was worthless, the promoter or salesman had moved on to parts unknown. At the present time, the sale of stocks and bonds is closely controlled in Texas by "The Securities Act."

The name "Blue Sky Law" was generally applied to these regulations because the promises of the early promoters were "as boundless and alluring as the blue sky." 



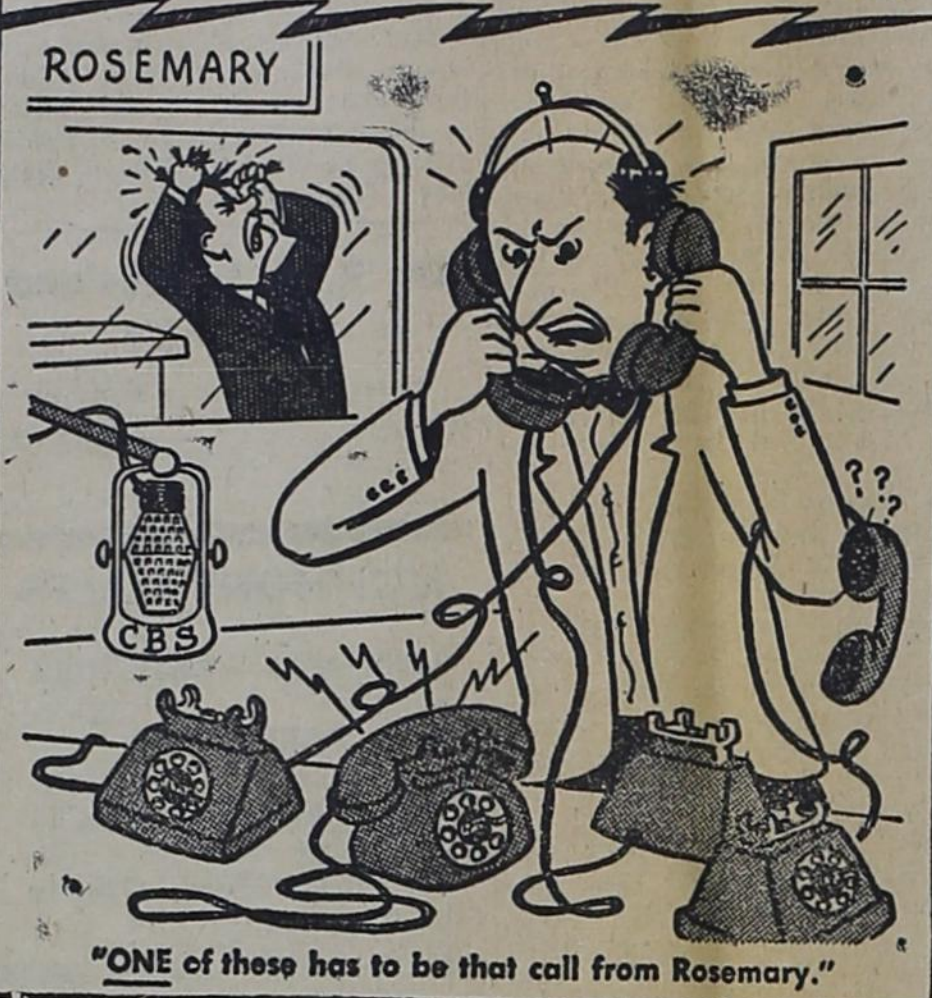

How To Keep A Cyclotron Cool



SAXONBURG, PA.—The cyclotron of Carnegie Institute of Technology—one of the world's most powerful—receives the first 16 drums of "cyclotron oil". Developed and donated by Gulf Oil laboratories, the oil will cool the 90-ton circular magnet coils seen to the left. Circulated at the rate of 600 gallons a minute, it will prevent destruction of these coils during their generation of a magnetic field 40,000 times stronger than that of the earth. The cyclotron, still under construction, is expected to begin its "atom-smashing" work next year.

HIGH PLAINS WATER

A revival of interest in underground water conservation, and in organizing one or more underground water conservation districts, is reported by the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association.

With Water conservation association in 14 counties as associate members, the High Plains Association is taking the lead in an educational campaign on conservation. The group estimates that 12,000 wells are now scattered over the 4,000,000 acres of irrigable land which covers one huge underground reservoir in the High Plains area.

The increase in use of irrigation wells—it has more than doubled in the past decade—and continued new drilling activities are bringing pumping figures to a record high.

They are talking about arginization of districts because they know that it won't do any good for part of the irrigation farmers to save water if the rest of the
