



ENOUGH FOR AN ARMY—Streams of pretty Round Red potatoes are flowing along the different grade channels in the Dimmitt Produce Co. processing plant this week, and the peak of the harvest is still to come. The potatoes are being packed and shipped under the Sugar Sweet brand in 10-ound retail bags and under the Big D brand in 100-pound sacks. Activity will reach a frantic pace at the local processing plant when the harvest of early carrots and onions begins within the coming week.

# Good potato yields mark harvest's debut

Things look good so far for the county's potato harvest (which started last week. THE YIELD is about average but the price is better than average so far, according to Homer West, Dimmitt manager of La Mantia, Oullum, Collier & Co., Inc., which operates the Dimmitt Produce Co. plant here. Potato harvest marks the debut of the long vegetable season in Castro County. The first Round Reds for the Dimmitt plant were dug June 30, and Norgold Russets will start coming in soon. The harvest will hit its peak about July 18 and will last until the end of August, West said. The vegetable harvest and processing will mushroom during the coming week as onions and carrots overlap the potatoes. The first onions of the season were expected to be harvested and processed to-day or Friday, and the digging of early carrots will start next week while the planting of late carrots is still underway.

LETTUCE planting will begin July 20 for harvest from late September through Mid-November. Lettuce is the only crop contracted here by LMCC Co. that is processed in the field instead of the Dimmitt Produce Co. plant. With the peak of the potato harvest still more than a week away, 50 persons already are working at the Dimmitt plant, processing thousands of potatoes an hour for bagging under the brand names of Sugar Sweet, Big D, and others. Employments at the local processing plant will rise to 90 persons when the potato and onion harvests hit their peaks, then will jump to 160 during the carrot harvest, West estimated. LMCC Co. has 750 acres of potatoes contracted with 18 growers in the area, virtually all in Castro County. In addition, large acreages are contracted in the county by H&S Produce Co. of Hart and by the 12 or more processing firms in Hereford.

"We started clipping onions Monday morning and will start processing them some time this week," West said. "The quality of the onions looks good, and we expect an average yield of about 500 50-lb. bags per acre." With 200 acres under contract with 11 growers, that means five million pounds of Castro County onions will be harvested, packed and shipped from the Dimmitt plant within the next few weeks. They'll all go to market under the Sugar Sweet brand. PROSPECTS are bright for the carrot harvest, too. "The quality on carrots looks real good, and it looks like we're going to have good tonnage," West said. As growers start digging their 800 acres of early carrots next week, other growers will be planting late carrots — mostly on wheat land. LMCC Co. has 600 acres of early carrots ripening now, and is still contracting with growers for late carrots, West said.

Funeral services for Henry Eugene Wright, former Dimmitt resident, were conducted at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt. MR. WRIGHT, 58, died Saturday in Galveston. Jennings, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Olton, officiated at Wednesday's funeral. Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens, directed by Parsons Funeral Home of Olton.

## Sewage plant gets good bid

With a low bid of \$166,387, Wes-Tex Construction Co. of Borger apparently has won the contract to build Dimmitt's new sewage treatment plant. THE WES-TEX bid was the lowest of five opened Tuesday by the city commission. Bids ranged up to \$209,877, according to City Manager E. B. Noble. The Texas Water Quality Board also must approve the low bid before the city can award the contract, Noble said. After the contract is awarded, the builder will have 180 calendar days to complete the new plant. Construction of the new sewage treatment plant was authorized by Dimmitt's voters in a \$200,000 bond election May 20, 1969. The plant is designed to accommodate the needs of a city of 10,000. NOBLE SAID the bond money not spent for construction will be used to extend sewer lines to the Parkway and Kirkum Heights additions near the "Y" intersection of US 385 and State 194 in Southeast Dimmitt.

## Car-cycle wreck injures Bruegel

Carl Bruegel of Dimmitt received a broken leg, broken ankle and crushed foot when a car struck his motorcycle last Thursday night in Plainview. THE ACCIDENT occurred at the intersection of US 70 and State 87 in Plainview. Bruegel, 35, had taken his motorcycle to Plainview for repairs. Finding the repair shop closed, he arranged to leave the cycle at a nearby service station. He was circling a traffic island near the station when an oncoming car struck the motorcycle, hitting Bruegel in the leg and foot. Damage was only slight to the motorcycle, a Honda 750. Bruegel's wife, Gail, was following him in the family car but was watching other traffic and didn't see the accident, she said. Bruegel was brought home from Plainview Monday afternoon after three days' hospitalization. Physicians said his crushed foot will require extensive treatment.

## 'Baseball Family of Year' named

The Donald Wright family was named this week as Dimmitt's "Baseball Family of the Year." THE WRIGHTS are the first family to be honored under a new program started by the Dimmitt Baseball Association Auxiliary. A different family will be named each year to recognize those who make their participation in the junior baseball programs a family project.

## Little League All-Stars named

The league champion Astros landed five boys on Dimmitt's Little League All-Stars to lead in the selections for the team to represent the city in the playoffs. AND THE ASTROS' coach, Bill Birdwell, was chosen to guide the All-Stars along the tournament trail, starting with the area tourney in Hereford July 17-18. Selected as manager of the All-Stars was Jody Minnick, who coached the Braves to a second-place finish. The All-Star Team was announced last Thursday night after the final game of the regular season. Helping the five Astros carry Dimmitt's banner into the playoff will be three Cardinals, three Dodgers, three Braves, a Tiger and a Yankee. The All-Star squad includes 14 players and two alternates. MAKING UP the Dimmitt Little League All-Stars are Jim Birdwell, Gaines Howell, Lorry Robb, Victor Saenz and Wade Traylor of the Astros; Angel Acevedo of the Tigers; Carl Coggins and Brad DuLaney of the Cardinals; Keith Crum, Johnny Hampton and Thompson Mayberry of the Dodgers; and Ronnie Lawson, Jody Minnick and Terry Young of the Braves. Alternates are David Mizon of the Cardinals and Randy Wilson of the Yankees. Five of the All-Star players are primarily pitchers and five others are mainly catchers. "But all are good, all-around ball players," Minnick said as he and Birdwell worked with the boys Tuesday to place them in their tournament positions. THE ALL-STARS have a good clutch of long-ball hitters in Ronnie Lawson, who hit eight home runs during his 14 regular season games; Thompson Mayberry, who put seven out of the park; Keith Crum, who sent six over the fence; and Carl Coggins, who clouted three homers during the season.



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# New grain loan system outlined

No longer is there a terminal loan rate system for "terminal price oriented grains." The old system has been replaced by a more efficient, more economical county loan rate structure, John J. Seibert, Extension grain marketing specialist, said.

**THE NEW** system eliminates terminal loan rates and establishes county rates that consider terminal market price relationships, cash prices received by farmers, export marketing patterns and other factors which involve grain marketing.

The system will be in effect for the 1970 crop of grain sorghum, wheat, barley, rye and flaxseed.

Such a system will have the concept of "county plus" with respect to determining loan and settlement values for grain. This is in contrast to the "terminal minus" previously used, the specialist said. County loan rates are available through the county ASCS and county agents.

A U.S.D.A. release on grain sorghum stated that in past years, county price-support rates for grain sorghum were established by subtracting from the applicable terminal rate the domestic interstate rail freight rate or export freight rate and truck receiving and loading out charges listed under the Uniform Grain

Under the new system, grain sorghum moved by rail to warehouse storage will be subject to the freight paid-in plus USA truck-receiving and rail loading-out charges which will be added to the rate for the county of origin. When it is shipped by truck or barge, the loan will be based on the county rate where stored; and, when shipped by truck or barge to a designated terminal warehouse, the rate will be that of the county in which the warehouse is located plus seven cents per hundredweight.

The revision in the seven-cent minimum price markup will bring the minimum resale price for grain sorghum and corn more nearly in line with the anticipated future relationship between the national average loan rates for these two crops.

**ADJUSTMENTS** of county loan rates from the 1969 level were made to more nearly reflect historical price relationships, to minimize sharp price breaks between counties, and because of various freight rate changes. For the most part, the 1970 county loan rates are unchanged from the 1969 rates in the major producing areas of Nebraska and Texas, while some county rates are decreased one to two cents in Oklahoma and Kansas, and increased one to six cents in California.

### Why didn't all stores close during war victim's funeral?

Dear Editor:

I feel very disturbed as I write this letter. I only hope I can bring out my feelings without sounding resentful.

**THIS ISN'T** a letter to question the pros and cons of recent letters published on the Vietnam War or any of the present-day issues in our daily papers or on television. But my question is: What has happened to the patriotism of my hometown of Dimmitt, the town I love and which has the finest people in the world? Has progress torn this down?

Last Wednesday, Dimmitt buried one of her sons who died in the Vietnam War, and she was still a busy, progressive town on the go. Her people were too involved in practicing free enterprise to fly their flags in the proper manner and to close their businesses for one hour while services were conducted for this young man.

I remember coming to town when I was a kid, and up until a few years ago, and finding a note stuck to every door of every business, saying "Closed for Funeral, Open at 4:30." I realize the argument that is made for not closing, and it is the same old thing that rules our lives — money! But all the money that was made in that one hour could never buy the respect that could have been shown to this young man and his family.

**REMEMBER**, this boy believed in what he fought and died for — freedom — freedom of free enterprise, the enterprise that was being practiced while this boy was being laid to rest.

If this is what progress does to people, I say, "Slow down, and take a long, long look." Is it worth it? Is it worth the loss of respect for this boy and all the other boys from Castro County who are fighting for us and our children? If progress is worth it, I say, "Their fighting and dying are in vain."

I thought other towns were too busy to fly their flags, but not my town where I was born, raised and am now raising my children.

I may be making too much of this, but this is my way of expressing my love for my flag and the country it represents. I guess I want people to feel the same. I love the country every day, but Wednesday I felt ashamed of the manner in which my town expressed her patriotism.

Thanks, Editor, for publishing a paper that has given me a chance to sound off. This is another one of the freedoms I mentioned. I hope I ruffle a few feathers, because those with the ruffled feathers are the ones I'm talking to.

(Editor's Note: A quick survey of the city's businesses showed that most of them did close during Capt. Russell Slough's funeral, but it was done on an individual basis and not through an organized effort. Also, all city, county and state offices closed, but federal offices weren't authorized to. There is no consistent policy here about closing for such occasions, although there should be. For instance, more businesses closed for Capt. Slough's funeral than did for July 4 — a circumstance that seems odd to us. As for the flags, the Jaycees set out almost 100 flags at half-mast Wednesday, including one in front of the Slough family's home. Also, the post office and other public offices flew their flags at half-mast from Tuesday noon until Wednesday evening, and flags were flying at half-mast in front of a few Dimmitt homes. However, your letter points up a situation that seemed especially noticeable last Wednesday and again on July 4 — that most of Dimmitt's homeowners and many of its business houses don't have flags, or don't use them.)

# Loan rates, certification date announced

Aug. 3 is the final date to certify to 1970 grain sorghum, corn and diverted acreage. When reporting acreage, report exactly as the crop exists on the farm. A number of producers who certified early have received their checks.

## BURNING OF CROP RESIDUE

Burning of any crop residue has been determined to be a violation of good conservation principles. Therefore, any ACP cost-share due any producer will be withheld or required to be refunded if residue is burned.

## LOAN RATES FOR 1970 ANNOUNCED

The basic county price support rate for wheat grading No. 1 is \$1.27 per bushel less storage.

The basic county price support rate for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better is \$1.62 per cwt. When you certify to your program acreages, you also certify to other program provisions including the offsetting compliance provision. If you participate in the wheat, feed grain, or cotton programs on one farm, you must not permit any other farm to have more acreage planted than the base or allotment. A person is considered to have an interest in a farm owned or operated by either the husband, wife, or minor children.

## DIVERTED ACRES

Sweet and forage sorghums and crosses are not eligible cover for diverted acres for 1970. If you have a cover of soybeans on diverted acreage, be sure to report this at the time of certification. These beans must be destroyed by Sept. 30, and another certification made to this office. Weeds must be controlled and the acreage designated as diverted acres must be of average productivity of cropland on the farm.

The Coalition here voted to (1) support the GSPA-Coalition Amendment concerning grain legislation; (2) oppose any limitations of farm subsidy payments; and (3) favor the lowering of interest rates to make capital more available for farm operating loans.

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## State to receive \$793,500 to aid wildlife program

The State of Texas will receive \$793,500 in federal money for its wildlife restoration program, it was announced this week by Acting Regional Director W. O. Nelson Jr., of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife in Albuquerque.

**THESE** funds come from the 11 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition levied by the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act of 1937 (Pittman-Robertson). The Dept. of Interior distributes the funds using a formula based on the number of hunting license holders and the area of each state.

An additional apportionment will be made in the fall. The sum announced this week will enable states to continue their wildlife restoration program from July 1 until the fall payment.

Under the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration program, states are reimbursed for up to 75 percent of the cost of approved projects, including acquisition of land suitable for wildlife habitat, development and manipulation of wildlife habitat, and research to aid in the management of game species.

These funds became available July 1, according to Nelson.

## HD notes

### Here is July's garden calendar

- By IRENE KEATING
- It is again time to share the Garden Calendar for July with you. You can get copies of the publications mentioned from the extension office.
- FERTILIZE** lawn using five pounds of ammonium sulfate or three pounds of ammonium nitrate per 1000 square feet of lawn area. Water thoroughly after applying. If soil is dry we suggest watering the evening before applying fertilizer as well as watering again after the application.
  - Check mulch on flower beds and shrub borders. Add or replace where needed.
  - Keep close check on recently transplanted plants. The combination of inadequate root system and drought conditions can be damaging.
  - Watch for spider mites, thrip, aphids and leaf eating insects. Apply controls as outlined in L-193.
  - Continue preventive measures for black spot on roses and for mildew on crepe myrtle, euonymus, and roses. Use materials suggested in MP-574.
  - MAKE** second application of chinch-bug control insecticide in early July.
  - Make last pinch on chrysanthemums no later than mid-July. Continue to fertilize and water.
  - Dig, dry, and store Gladiolus corms after foliage has turned brown.
  - Continue to fertilize, water and spray roses to assure maximum fall flowering.
  - Check Azaleas and Camellias for iron chlorosis. Refer to L-435 for treatment if needed. Keep beds well watered as they are initiating flower buds for next spring's show.
  - Clean iris beds but do not cut off foliage until dead.
  - SOW SEEDS** of the following annuals for fall flowers: Cosmos, Zinnia, Marigold, Periwinkle Petunia, etc.
  - Water lawn, flower beds, and shrub borders as needed. Remember a few thorough soakings are much better than frequent light applications of water.
  - Fight off "Summer Garden Slump." A little care and attention now will pay great dividends this fall.
  - Turn compost pile, keep moist.
  - Spade up beds where plants have finished blooming and prepare to replant with potted mums or fall flowering annuals.
  - MAKE** second application of chinch-bug control insecticide in early July.
  - Make last pinch on chrysanthemums no later than mid-July. Continue to fertilize and water.
  - Dig, dry, and store Gladiolus corms after foliage has turned brown.

Donna Hudson, organist, provided traditional wedding music and accompanied Jo Ann Stone, soloist, who sang "The Twelfth of Never."

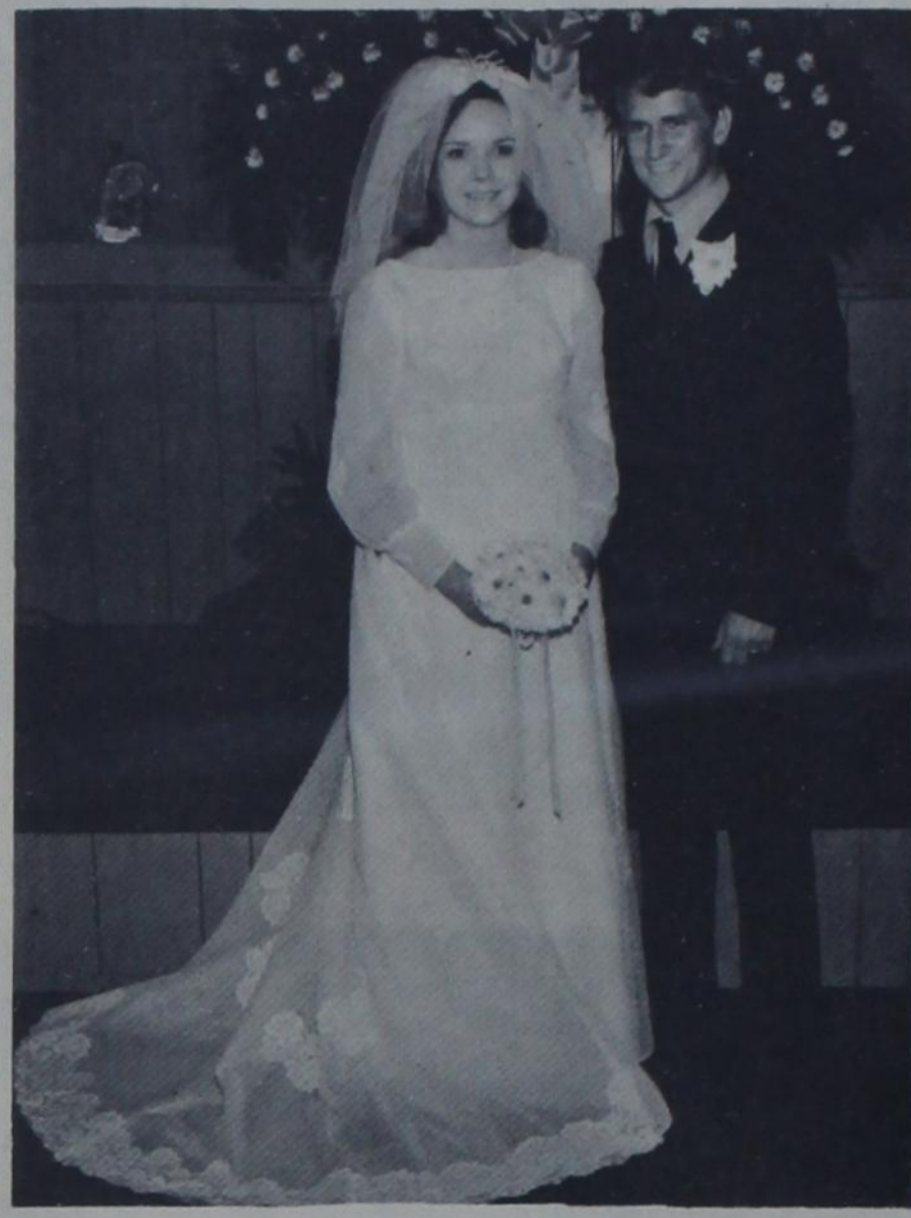
