Military Strategy Challenged By Senator Downey

WASHINGTON, (UP)—Sen. Sheridan Downey, D., Calif., today challenged military strategy developed by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill and declared that if the Allies would make proper use of air power, they could bomb Germany out of the war "in four months."

Speaking in the senate in support of a bill by Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., to defer drafting of pre-Pearl Harbor fathers until Jan. 1, Downey denounced plans to "build a vast land army most of which never can, and never will be used."

JAP ATTEMPT TO BUILD AIR POWER HALTED

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS in the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 29 (Wednesday) (UP)—Allied bombers, smashing heavily at a Japanese attempt to bolster weakened air forces in New Guinea, destroyed at least fifty-eight enemy aircraft at Wewak on the north coast Monday and shattered a newly arrived supply convoy in Wewak harbor, leaving seven vessels sunk or sinking.

Heavy and medium bombers, in force, with strong fighter escort, attacked the Wewak, Borom, Dagua and But airdromes around Wewak, 250 miles northwest of Finshhafen where Australian forces are battling to eject the Japanese from their principal hold on the Huon Peninsula of New Guinea.

The fliers found the bulk of the enemy's air force on the ground, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's daily communique revealed.

"Some fifty parked aircraft were destroyed and many fires were started in fuel and supply dumps, and destruction was widespread," said the communique. Eight Japanese fighters were shot down when the enemy made a weak attempt at interception, and three more probably were destroyed.

"The enemy's efforts to re-establish operational air bases in Northeast New Guinea appear to have been again effectively countered," said the communique.

At mast-top height, the Allied fliers swept over the Wewak Harbor and left three tankers afire and sinking, and four merchant vessels, ranging up to 5,000 tons, sunk or destroyed, the communique said. They sank or severely damaged twenty-nine barges and luggers which the Japanese need to sneak supplies down the coast at night to their Huon Peninsula garrisons.

Three Allied bombers were lost and others damaged by intense anti-aircraft fire.

A headquarters spokesman revealed that more than 200 planes, including four-motored Liberators and two-motored Mitchell bombers participated in the raid, one of the heaviest made to date in New Guinea, where the left arm of the Allied South Pacific offensive are driving back the Japanese and threatening their main base in that area at Rabaul on New Britain Island.

Around Finshhafen, where the principal land fighting of the New Guinea campaign now is under way, Australian forces inflicted heavy casualties on the Japanese troops dug in on high ground south of the Bumi River, three-fourths of a mile north of Finshhafen. Losses of Allied ground forces were light the communique said.

Pair Arrested Here Being Held On Theft Charges

Chief George Murphy reported this morning that two young boys who were wanted in Black Foot, Idaho to face charges of theft, had been arrested by local police and are being held for Idaho officers who are enroute to Ranger to take the pair into custody.

The boys are charged with breaking into a filling station in the Idaho town and taking \$75 in cash, a supply of automobile accessories and gasoline stamps. The boys were first encountered by Chief Murphy as they attempted to locate the Western Union Office in the Paramount Hotel. Chief Murphy was joined by Policeman W. G. Pounds and the two made the arrest.

One of the boys is 14 years of age and the other is 17.

RANGER OVERSUBSCRIBES QUOTA FOR THE THIRD WAR LOAN DRIVE

With only three more days before the deadline of the Third War Loan Drive, Ranger has gone over the quota of \$150,000 and now has a total of \$152,900 subscribed in bonds during the drive.

W. F. Creager, chairman for the drive in Ranger, in making the announcement, stated that the market is still open for the sale of bonds and that it will be until midnight Saturday, October 2. It is expected that many purchases of both small and large denominations of bonds will make purchases before the deadline and that in all probability Ranger will subscribe an amount well beyond the quota.

The total subscribed by the county has not been announced but Cies has reported a total of \$180,372 sold to date and that with the amount sold in Ranger is well over half the quota for the county which is \$397,300.

Businesses in Ranger serving as agents for the sale of the bonds are the Arcadia Theatre, the Post Office, C. E. May Insurance and Real Estate, and the Commercial State Bank. School students have also acted as selling agents and chalked up a total of nearly \$5,000 in bonds and stamps sold during the drive.

NYA EQUIPMENT ASSIGNED TO LOCAL SCHOOLS THOUSANDS OF NAZI KILLED FLEEING REDS ALONG DNEIPER

Equipment valued at \$262,000 formerly used by the National Youth Administration center here has been released to the Ranger Public Schools and Ranger Junior College and will be used for vocational classes which the school authorities purpose to establish in connection with the school system.

The material was formerly signed over to the schools at a meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the office of Dr. G. C. Boswell, Jr., and attended by Mayor J. J. Kelly, Dr. Boswell, A. E. Crawley, secretary of the school board, Pleas Moore, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Tony Ziegler of Ft. Worth, formerly district supervisor for the NYA and J. L. Latimer, formerly associated with the NYA center here.

The department of the Treasury under whose supervision the equipment has been since the closing of the NYA, was represented at the meeting by W. C. Moss, Jr., of the Ft. Worth office of the collector of internal revenue.

Dr. Boswell stated today that plans are under way for the enrollment of students for the classes and that a full schedule will get under way just as soon as all arrangements can be completed.

The equipment taken over includes all materials in all the work shops as well as the equipment in the residence center. The buildings at the center are the property of the city of Ranger.

Moss explained that at the end of ninety days representatives of his office will come back to Ranger to take an inventory of the property.

Fighter Pilot Attains Fastest Speed By Man

A THUNDERBOLT BASE somewhere in England, Sept. 28 (UP)—Possibly the fastest speed ever attained by man, believed by intelligence officers here to have been 840 miles an hour, was achieved accidentally Monday over London, Germany, by the young American pilot of a Thunderbolt fighter, Second Lieut. Robert H. Knapp, Norwich, N. Y., had the experience and lived to describe how it felt.

A Yank team mate had dived to pounce on a German fighter. "I started down after him," Knapp said, "I gave Percy—that's my plane—full throttle and pointed the nose straight down. At about 17,000 feet I tried to pull out, but nothing happened.

"I thought about bailing out, but knew I would be killed if I tried it at that speed. "I didn't remember any noise—just a sensation of increasing speed and seeing the earth coming up to me. I couldn't even fix the stick.

"But at about 10,000 feet the plane started coming out of the dive, gradually. I didn't black out at all. It took about 5,000 feet more to really level off." When Knapp returned to this base it was found the paint was literally peeled from the ailerons by the terrific wind his speed had created. The plane showed no structural strain.

The instruments on a Thunderbolt will register a speed no greater than 600 miles an hour and some engineers hold that a plane cannot fly faster than the speed of sound, about 785 miles an hour, but intelligence officers here said Knapp exceeded the record of 780 miles an hour made last spring by a test pilot in another P-47.

September 29, 1943

RATION REMINDER

Sugar Stamp No. 14 good for 5 pounds through October. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning through October 31.

Shoes Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Validity has been extended indefinitely.

Meats, Fats-Red stamps X, Y and Z good through October 2. Brown stamps A and B good through October 2. Brown stamp C good through October 30. Brown Stamp D becomes good October 3 and remains good through October 30.

Processed Foods-Blue stamps U, V and W expire October 20.

CUT EXPECTED IN SHOE RATION

The new shoe stamp, No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in War Ration Book Three, which becomes valid November 1, probably will have to last six months, OPA has announced. At the same time OPA said the stamp 18, originally scheduled to expire October 31, is extended indefinitely and will overlap the next stamp. OPA's present plan is to eliminate expiration dates on shoe stamps and to make new stamps valid as soon as supplies warrant. This enables a person to save shoe stamps until shoes are needed.

MORE SOAP PROVIDED

Consumers will have greater soap supplies within a few weeks. The War Food Administration has announced a program to provide a 25 percent increase in soap production for civilian use. WFA emphasized that there will still be no excess and urged soap saving by every possible method.

MARKET TURKEYS NOW

Farmers are urged to market their turkeys as soon as possible so that the American Armed Forces overseas can have typical Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. In a joint statement, Maj. Gen. E. B. Gregory, Quartermaster General, and Marvin Jones, War Food Administrator, appeal to farmers to "go over with turkey flocks carefully now with a view to offering as many as possible for sale to the government as early as possible. If you don't know where to market them, contact your nearest war board office."

MORE HEAVY UNDERWEAR COMING The War Production Board has acted to increase production of certain types of men's and boy's heavy knit underwear in which a shortage loomed.

TO ISSUE RATION BOOK FOUR War Ration Book Four, which will last approximately two years, will be issued to more than 120 persons through schoolhouse distributions during the last 10 days of October, OPA has announced. The book combines point and unit stamps. It has eight pages containing 384 stamps, printed in blue, red, green and black.

GIVE SOLDIER'S SERIAL NUMBER The public is asked to use a soldier's army serial number in every case where inquiries are made to official agencies concerning either officer or enlisted personnel. Much time and material is wasted if the number is not given, according to the War Department.

OPA SETS GRAPE PRICES Maximum prices for Concord grapes and California juice grapes have been set by OPA at levels substantially lower than prices that had prevailed. Meanwhile the War Food Administration allocated processed Concord grapes as follows: 60 percent for jams, jellies, and fruit butters; 20 percent for grape juice; and 20 percent in reserve for future allocations.

U. S. CASUALTIES TO DATE

Announced casualties of the United States Armed Forces from the outbreak of the war to date (those next of kin have been notified) total 195,205, according to War and Navy Department reports. This total includes: dead, 20,104; wounded, 28,226; missing, 32,905; prisoners of war, 23,970.
