

Blackout for News on Radar | McNutt Clings to Voluntary

Caused by Its Possibilities | War Plant Labor Supply Plan

• WASHINGTON-All media for the written word and the voice have before them a request by the Office of Censorship NOT to present statements on the secrets of radar.

Censorship does not forbid, in fact it encourages, telling the customers that the reason for the blackout is that radar has great possibilities and obviously we do not want the enemy to gain any ideas from speculative discussion in the United States.

Insistent clamoring by manufacturers and the press generally forced the Army and Navy to relent somewhat last spring from its original hush-hush policy. The brief, carefully edited official announcement did little more than confirm

existence of radar. However, that disclosure evoked growing adverlisements and news stories, each a bit more revealing than the last,

But there was another reason for the blackout on radar. It stemmed from concern that the rash of publicity was placing an unfair burden upon the thousands of workmen in radar, and even more secret electrical devices, who really know the still hidden man for 21 months of war. secrets and have loyally kept a pledge of utter silence almost to the

• PAUL V. McNUTT, war manpower director, continues to adhere to voluntary procedure to supply labor for war plants. His refusal to say that compulsory legislation must be passed now coincides with views of many legislators that there are still some other things that can be done to augment the army of war workers.

The recent orders of Economic Stabilization Director James Byrnes to relieve the war plants" manpower shortage on the west coast are believed to be in the nature of an experiment.

If Byrnes' plan to co-ordinate employment agencies, selective service and the efforts of managements of war plants succeeds in mobilizing the west coast for the added burden that will fall to it when the war against Japan goes into high gear, the formula will be applied to other "tight" labor spots.

• UNINFORMED AVIATION enthusiasts got some cold water poured on their dreams of post war air transportation when it was learned that conversion of the thousands of Army bombers into peace-time flying planes is considered impractical by the experts. Army bombers, according to their designers, are so constructed that their balance is achieved by placement of guns, armor and other wartime equipment. To strip these ships would destroy the balance of the planes and make them unairworthy.

But there is a bright side, too. Already, major aircraft plants are planning rapid conversion to peace-time plane production as soon as



HOW TO CURE THAT STICKY IRON

Don't "cuss" at a sticky sole plate on your electric iron. Here's an easy cure. Heat the iron, then rub the iron over a piece of paper sprinkled with salt. This removes starch or other substances. Then wax the sole plate by rubbing paraffin or beeswax over it. Finally remove the excess wax by running the iron over a clean piece of paper. Burnt starch may be removed with fine steel wool when iron is cool.

OTHER HINTS ON IRON CARE

1 Never iron over buttons, snaps, zippers or hooks and eyes. Hard objects scratch the sole plate of the iron



2 Use extreme care to avoid dropping your iron. You may break some vital part that is impossible to replace. 3 Be sure iron is cool before putting it

away. And don't wrap cord around the hot iron. 4 Take good care of your iron cord.' Don't let it kink. Pull out plug by grasping plug, not the cord.



How to reline a lamp shade

Roll your own. Lighting benefits can be noticeably increased by relining existing dark-on-the-inside shades with good white paper. Roll the lamp shade on white paper, and pencil mark to cut. Fit this lining inside the shade and fasten seam with Scotch tape.

Arrange furniture so one lamp serves two or more people.

NAVY HERO IN **SOLOMONS WINS**

HEADQUARTERS, U. S. South Pacific Forces, (Delayed) (UP)-Lt. Commander William Heald Groverman, USN, 33, veteran destroyer officer of the Solomons ampaign and skipper of a new 2,100 ton destroyer, won the Silver Star today for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity" during the Battle of Kula Gulf on the night of July 5-6.

Groverman, who hails from Huntington, W. Va., and Covington, Ky., received the medal from Capt. Francis X. McInerny of Cheyenne, Wyo., representative of the ommander destroyers, Pacific Fleet, in the South Pacific area.

During the Battle of Kula Gulf Groverman was executive officer of a destroyer and acted in the capacity of evaluating officer. "Lt. Comdr. Groverman, by his skillful and intelligent evaluation of information was able to supply his commanding officer with coninuous tactical information which ermitted the selection of targets for both torpedo fire and gunfire during the initial battle in which at least five enemy ships were

unk," the citation said. 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
