**1960 Traffic Loss Over 3½ Million**

In 1960 there were 2,254 human lives battered, smashed, torn and thrown upon Texas streets and highways. Another 127, 980 were sent to doctors and hospitals, some of these injured are maimed for life. Some 400,000 automobiles were damaged or demolished. Our economic loss came to an astounding figure of \$350,022,500. Our liability and collision insurance premiums came to a sum in excess of two hundred and thirty million dollars.

Now for a descriptive look at the three hundred and fifty million dollars cost of the traffic accidents. The playing area of a football field measures 300 feet by 160 feet, or 48,000 square feet. United States currency measures about 2 5/8 inches by 6 1/8 inches. If a football field was completely covered with one dollar bills, then a layer of two dollar bills, then a layer of five dollar bills, then a layer of ten dollar bills, then a layer of twenty dollar bills, then a layer of fifty dollar bills, then a layer of one hundred dollar bills, then a layer of five hundred dollar bills and on top of these eight layers of paper money, dump 1,595 tons of silver dollars, this would represent the economic loss we suffered in Texas for the year 1960.

The three hundred and fifty million dollars would have bought 10,000 homes at \$20,000 each; 10,000 refrigerators at \$400 each; 10,000 cooking ranges at \$350 each; 10,000 TV sets at \$350 each; 10,000 dishwashers at \$300 each; 10,000 automobiles at \$3,000 each; 10,000 central air conditioning units at \$1,400 each and furnish the head of each of the 10,000 households with a bank account of \$9,202.

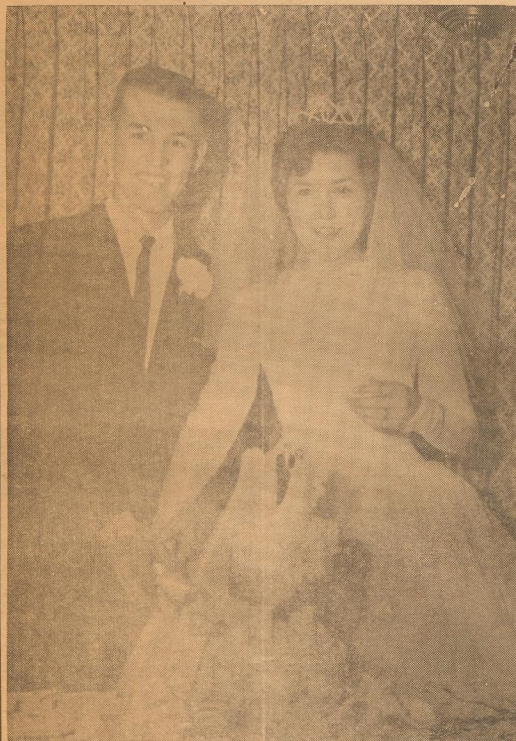

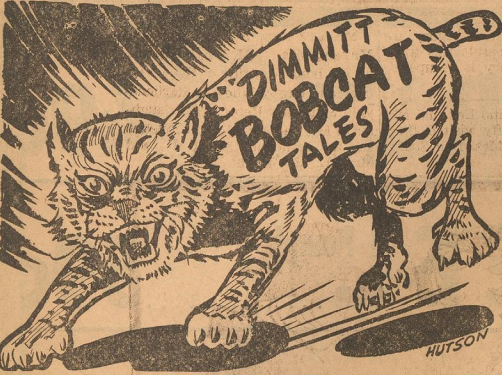

## Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

### Dear Fellow Texan:

President Kennedy has handed to the Congress a balanced national budget for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1962. The President's estimate of a balanced budget is based upon a hoped-for business upturn and on the proposed postal rate increase. I don't think the President is being overly optimistic because business did pick up very sharply in 1961, from the 1960 recession, and it is reasonable to expect that this improvement will continue. It is my belief also that a bill for new postal rates will pass this session of the Congress.

The budget contains many expenditures for projects in Texas, most of which represent years of planning and work by local groups and by their elected representatives. The list of Texas projects is a long one, but it includes for this year:

\$10 million for the Waco Reservoir, \$4.6 Million for the Proctor Reservoir on the Leon River in Comanche County, \$2,080,000 for the Navarro Mills Reservoir near Corsicana, in Navarro County; \$850,000 for the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi Waterway; \$450,000 for the Guadalupe River Channel to Victoria; \$1.5 Million for the Sabine-Neches Waterway; \$3.2 Million for the Canyon Reservoir on the Guadalupe, \$10.2 Million for the great McGee Bend Dam in East Texas; \$1.7 Million for the Still house Hollow Reservoir in Lampasas County; \$1.5 Million for the Somerville Reservoir in Burleson County; \$500,000 for the Bardwell Reservoir between Waxahachie and Ennis;

ued growth of government. Those who would fail to accept this as a fact deceive themselves. We cannot stop this advance, but it can be guided to satisfy our own best interests. Rationality, with unequivocal rejection as well as acceptance of proposals based on their individual merits and compatibility with Constitutional rule can accomplish a government for our complex society that will be both servant and focal point of the national will and ambition.

Accomplishment by a democratic government is not evil, no more than accomplishment by the individual, so long as reasonable limits are observed.

Anyone who thinks Americans do not have something to prove to the world and future generations of her own must have missed the boat somewhere. This something is that free men and free enterprise, working with their government of laws can accomplish more for themselves as individuals and as a nation than the wildest hopes of our founding forefathers.

Anytime you hear anyone advocating a systematic reduction of the federal government to simply an organization for defense and diplomacy, just remember he would deny us our tool for our advance as a people and a nation.


