

"LIKE CHANGING A LAMP BULE"



A blownout fuse is nothing mysterious. Fuses are safety valves of your electrical system. When a cord becomes worn or an appliance develops a defect, the fuse "blows" to prevent more serious trouble. Too many lamps or appliances on one circuit may also cause a blown fuse.

Replacing a fuse plug (the common type) is as easy as screwing in a light bulb. Make the replacement yourself-

The first thing to do is to disconnect the lamp or appliance that caused the fuse to blow. Then, take a new fuse of the right size, go to the fuse box and carefully follow the three steps outlined below.
