# U. S. Subs Get Ten More Jap Ships

## MIGHTIEST AIR FORCE FROM U. S. EIGHTH HITS NAZI TARGET

LONDON, Nov. 4. (Thursday). (UP)—The largest raiding force ever sent aloft by the United States Eighth Air Force bombed the naval base of Wilhelmshaven and other targets in northwest Germany by daylight Wednesday and the Royal Air Force followed on a few hours later by attacking Cologne in a mighty re-echo of the Allied aerial offensive on Germany.

A little more than an hour after announcement of the mightiest American air effort of the war from British bases, possibly by as many as 1,000 planes, the British radio broadcast at 11 a. m. that RAF planes had bombed Cologne Wednesday night.

It was the 12th British raid of the war on Cologne, Germany's third largest city and target of the RAF's first 1,000-plane assault on May 30, 1942.

The hour at which Berlin announced the Cologne raid was unprecedentedly early and, indicating that they hoped to make propaganda of it, the Germans claimed bombs were dropped in residential areas of the city of 748,000 on the Rhine River. Berlin said the Cologne Cathedral was hit particularly heavily, one bomb tearing a fifty-foot hole in the main portal. It claimed heavy damage also to the interior of the cathedral, where precious ornaments were smashed.

The last RAF attack on Cologne—300 miles from Britain—was the night of Oct. 22 when it was bombed by Mosquito bombers while heavy bombers were battering Kassel and Frankfurt. The RAF's heavy bombers had been idle since then.

The American force which hit by daylight threw out such a devastating curtain of fire that the Germans were able to shoot down only five heavy bombers—the lightest American loss in more than a month.

## Subsidy Payment To Me Made To County Dairyman

The Government has recently announced a Dairy Feed Payment Program for the last quarter of 1943 in order that the producer may not suffer from the sharp advance in feed prices. Payment will be made on the following schedule:

Whole Milk—50c per hundred weight.  
Butterfat—6c per pound.  
Butter—4 8-10c per pound.

Application for payment will be made at the Eastland County AAA Office by those who are to receive payment. Payment will be made direct from the AAA office to producers who furnish in person satisfactory evidence of sale. Receipts showing date, name of seller, name of buyer and amount of sale will be considered satisfactory evidence. Those who are unable to furnish written evidence may make a personal certification of the amount sold, number of cows milked, amount and type of feed used, and customers served. This type of evidence may be accepted by the committee if consistent with the committee's knowledge of the producer's business.

All applications must be submitted to the AAA Office during the month of November. No payment for less than \$1.00 will be made. If you have sold either or all of the above mentioned dairy products to ensure to place your application with the office during November, for your October payment.

## Childish Prank Aids Officers In Making Arrest

AMARILLO, Tex. (UP)—Here's one case where a childish prank aided rather than aggravated the law.

An irate man threatened to use a razor strap on a boy who amused himself by chucking rocks at the man's trailer house.

Undaunted, the lad continued to toss rocks at the house.

One day the tormented owner snatched up his razor strap and belted the boy a light lick. An then the fireworks began.

The man was arrested and taken to jail when the boy's mother filed a charge of aggravated assault against him. At the police station, the man showed some hesitancy at having his finger prints taken.

An then came a telegram from Sheriff Bill Adams at Austin. It seems the man is a fugitive from the Texas prison where he was serving a two-year sentence for stealing more than \$50 in cow hides. He escaped in 1928.

Apparently the man had been doing alright. Almost two thousand dollars was found on his person in worn tobacco sacks.

## Safety Councils To Be Organized In Major Towns

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Plans to organize safety councils in Texas' major cities and towns by the Texas Safety Association have been announced here.

The association also has called a meeting of the organization's industrial section in Beaumont Dec. 3.

R. O. Smith, formerly of Congress, has been named field representative of the association, and will carry on organization work in cities over 25,000 population, according to R. B. Rooper, president of the association.

Some 500 representatives of Texas industries are expected at the Beaumont meeting. Frank Werner of Houston is program chairman.

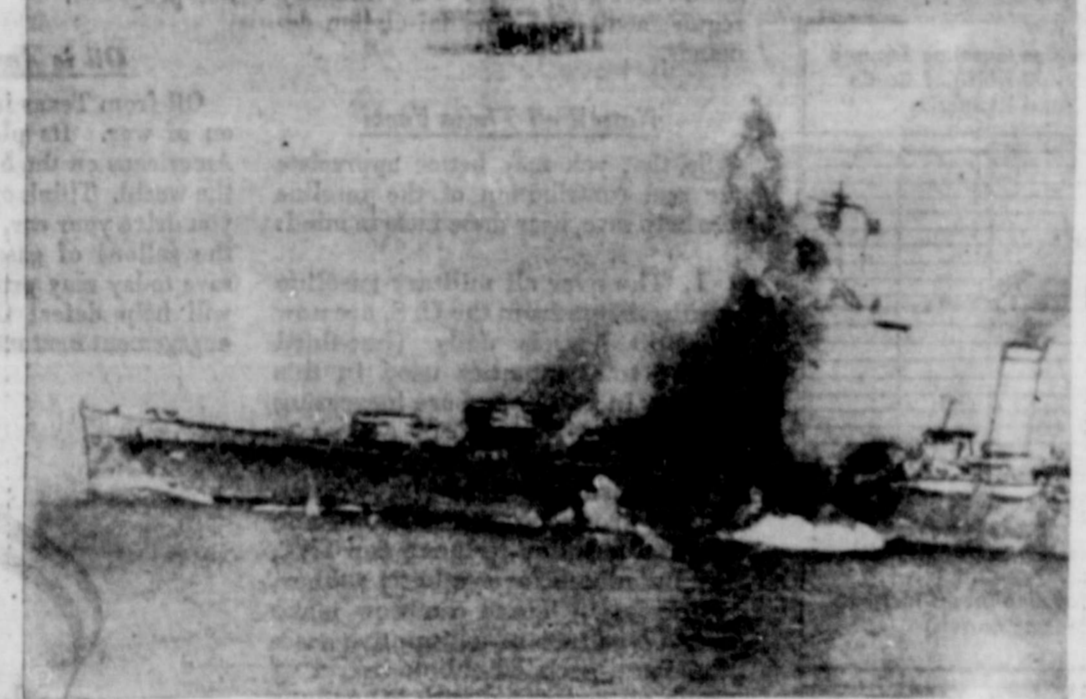

## Senate's Foreign Relations Committee Acts To Embrace Part Of Moscow Pact In Post War Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (UP)—The Senate impresses on a statement of postwar foreign policy was broken Wednesday when the foreign relations committee agreed at a hastily called special meeting to include part of the Moscow four-power agreement in its own resolution and promptly reported the revised measure to the floor.

It also specifically guarded the Senate's treaty-ratifying rights by adding a Republican-sponsored provision stipulating that any treaty made to effect the purposes of the resolution—preservation of peace through international co-operative action—must be ratified by a two-thirds vote.

Accepted by the committee, virtually verbatim, was Point No. 4 of the Moscow declaration which recognizes the necessity of establishing "at the earliest practicable date" what amounts to a league of nations to maintain postwar peace and security.

The break in the eight-day Senate battle came after a fourteen-man group had held out determinedly for a more specific resolution putting the Senate on record in favor of a definite international organization rather than the committee's proposed "international authority with power to prevent aggression."

The revised measure represents a compromise between this group and the committee. It was acceptable to both as well as to Raymond E. Wills (Rep.) of Indiana, who had insisted that treaties concluded under the terms of the resolution be submitted for Senate ratification.

The compromise likewise was acceptable to Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan, a leading Republican spokesman on foreign policy. He said it contained nothing which ran contrary to the original resolution which he helped draw up.

There was no immediate reaction from the pre-Pearl Harbor isolationist bloc, which opposes any kind of resolution.

Burton K. Wheeler (Dem.) of Montana, a leader of the bloc who had opposed Senate commitments at this time, said he had not decided whether he would vote for the compromise.

"It doesn't mean much," he said. "Everybody is for collaboration for peace. Whether the United States will join depends on the kind of treaty that is written, whether it will be one which means future wars or peace." He said that raised the question whether European nations "are to be divided so they can't exist economically."

As soon as the committee acted Chairman Tom Connally of Texas took the amendment to the floor and obtained unanimous consent to have it considered as part of the original resolution.

Listed Hill (Dem.) of Alabama, one of the so-called B2H2-Ball, Burton, Hill, Hatch—which originally demanded a postwar international police force to preserve peace, joined with Connally in requesting a speedy vote.

Point 4 states that the four signatories, the United States, Russia, Britain and China, "recognize the necessity of establishing at the earliest practicable date a general international organization, based on the principle of the sovereign equality of all peace-loving states, and open to membership by all such states, large and small, for the maintenance of international peace and security."

## NOVEMBER 11 TRIP TO WAC BASE PLANNED

November 11 has been declared WAC Day at the Blackland Field at Waco and in order that interested persons may see the life of the Women's Army Corps in actual process a field trip has been arranged for that day.

According to Lt. Virginia Williams, of the Abilene Recruiting Office, a Government vehicle will leave Ranger early in the morning of the 11th and will arrive at the base in time for lunch. A tour of the base following lunch will allow the guests to see the WAC's at work, where they live and how they play. The company will stand formal retreat, which is one of the most impressive ceremonies of the army. This ceremony will close the inspection for the guests.

Lt. Williams stated that women between the ages of 20 and 49 years of age may make the trip provided they have no dependents and may have the day off. Mothers of eligible women may make the trip with their daughters.

Women wishing to make the trip may arrange to do so by contacting Lt. Williams or Mrs. John Ducker at the Ranger Times.

## Air Wardens In Area To Resume Manning of Posts

According to information just received by Air Wardens in Ranger, and issued by Major Phillip B. Scott of the Signal Corps, of the San Antonio region, manning of the local posts will be resumed for alert periods with wardens subject to emergency call.

The Air Warden Service was partially abandoned for a time but the new orders call for a return to use of the "Army Flash" as well as "Red Flash." Air wardens will be subject to call to report the passage of any planes over this area, as well as to report unnecessary aerial performance over an area of any accident involving planes.

Chief air warden in Ranger is A. J. Rutledge and assistant chief is W. A. Leith. Vance Blauer and C. J. Moore serve on the staff.

## A & M Athlete Is Given Commission

PORT SILL, Okla. (UP)—One of Texas A. & M.'s star athletes, Robert W. (Jitterbug) Henderson of Houston, has been commissioned a second lieutenant of field artillery at Fort Sill.

Lt. Henderson completed a 17-week officer candidate course and has been assigned to the Field Artillery Officer's Replacement pool. "Jitterbug" left an enviable record when he graduated from A & M in June. He was the only student to earn 13 letters in sports. These included three letters in football, three in basketball, three in track, three in swimming and one in football. He also won the intercollegiate boxing championship in 1941 and 1942.

Henderson is the son of Mrs. R. E. Henderson of Houston. His wife, the former Evelyn Gray Kearns, was national baton-twirling champion from 1938 to 1941.

## Boy Makes First Entries In Show

CHICAGO, (UP)—An 11-year-old boy, E. W. Schoenberg of Shoenberg, has made the first entries from Texas for the Chicago Fat Stock and Carlot Competition to be held at the Chicago Stock Yards November 29 through Dec. 2.

He will exhibit pure-bred Duroc-Jersey barrows in both the open and junior swine classes. The junior classes are open to exhibitors between the ages of 10 and 20.

Entries for the individual classes close on Dec. 7 while carlot divisions will close Nov. 20.

## Poppy Day To Renew Pledge Of Faith In Forces

Faith in America with those who have died in the nation's service will be pledged anew on Poppy Day, November 6, Mrs. E. C. Ward, American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Chairman, said today as the Auxiliary continues preparations for its annual distribution of memorial poppies.

"The wearing of the poppy is a personal pledge that we will not 'break faith' with those who died but will carry on to the achievement of the things for which they gave their lives," said the Poppy Chairman.

"Millions of Americans will wear the poppy this year as a tribute to the dead of both World Wars and a mark of their determination to conclude this war with complete victory. The flower is the symbol of life given in service for America. The wearer makes an unspoken pledge to the nation's heroic dead that he will live as they died, serving America."

Poppies will be offered to everyone in Ranger by the women of the Auxiliary on Poppy Day. No price will be asked for the flowers, the pennies of children being just as welcome as the dollars of the wealthy. A poppy over every heart is the goal.

Contributions given to the Auxiliary's volunteer nosey workers will go in their entirety to the rehabilitation and child welfare funds of the American Legion and Auxiliary where they will help support the Legion's and Auxiliary's efforts for the disabled fighting men of both wars and for the children of the dead and disabled.

## ALLIED FLIERS BREAK UP BIG ENEMY CONVOY NEAR RABAU

Far-ranging American submarines were credited today with the sinking of 10 more Japanese ships, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur revealed that Allied fliers had wrecked a big enemy convoy assembling at Rabaul, New Britain, for a counter-attack against newly won American positions in the Northern Solomons.

The Navy announced that U. S. submarines operating in the Pacific and far east destroyed two tankers, six freighters, a large cargo transport and a patrol craft and damaged two freighters and a medium-sized tanker.

The new victories raised the American submarine score in the Pacific to 53 Japanese ships sunk, 36 probably sunk and 112 damaged. The time and place of the latest sinkings were not revealed.

It was announced that a Navy reconnaissance plane on Tuesday sank a 1,000-ton Japanese freighter near Ocean Island, 130 miles east of Japanese-occupied Nauru Island in the Gilbert group.

The smashing Allied raid on Rabaul apparently shattered the last Japanese hope of saving their remaining outposts on the Northern Solomons.

Ordered by Gen. Douglas MacArthur to smash the Rabaul convoy regardless of weather, 150 Allied warplanes knocked practically every ship in the harbor and defeated a handful of Japanese fighter planes in an hour-long running fight.

The enemy lost included 15 ships and 200 crew members, including three destroyers and two large cruisers, an escort and two tankers.

One of the Japanese was left listing heavily, with a hole in its hull.

Sixty-seven Japanese planes were shot down in the air battle. 23 others were listed as probably destroyed, and 18 were smashed around at a cost of 19 Allied planes—the heaviest Allied loss of war in this theater.

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The congressional committee chairman, Clarence Cannon, 24, 49, told the house today that no committee has been given "positive assurance" that a new war front will be opened "in the near future."

## San Francisco, (UP)—Demands for a thorough investigation of conditions in the Tule Lake Japanese segregation center mounted today as the War Relocation Authority admitted that WRA national director Dillon Myer and 75 other white persons had been held virtual prisoners there for four hours Monday.

## Louisville, Ky. (UP)—Republican Simon S. Willis of Ashland, apparently was the winner today in his race with J. Lyler Donaldson, Democrat, for the governorship of Kentucky in the nation's most important "border line" state political tests.

## Pvt. Pearson Goes To Keesler Field

**Reports Show 7,000,000 Barrel Decline In Automotive Gasoline**

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 4.—Stocks of automotive gasoline in Texas during the past several months have declined more than 7,000,000 barrels, and have now reached critically low levels, according to a Texas petroleum industry sponsored advertisement in today's paper.

One of the reasons given for this decline, according to the ad, is the high demand of the armed services. "The overall military gasoline requirements are now 600,000 barrels daily (one-third of the total quantity used in this country in 1941) and are increasing constantly," it states. "The petroleum industry is straining all its resources to deliver these products but it needs the help of motorists to meet the military requirements."

for TNT and butadiene for synthetic rubber, refineries in Texas can now make only 11 gallons of automotive gasoline from each 42-gallon barrel of crude oil compared with 20 gallons in 1941. The advertisement also explains that the flow of oil from Texas wells already has been increased by more than 50 per cent since last year, which means, in terms of barrels, an increase of about 750,000 barrels per day.

Similarly, refinery facilities are operating at capacity, with some emphasis on war products. "Texas refineries are producing more 100-octane and other aviation gasoline," the ad states, "than refineries in any other state, and they are also carrying a large part of the load in the toluene and synthetic rubber programs."

Charts appearing in the advertisement show graphically the decline in Texas gasoline stocks; the decline in the amount of gasoline being made from a barrel of oil; the marked increase in oil production from Texas wells; and the increased runs of crude oil through Texas refineries.

In appealing to every Texan to help ease the critical gasoline shortage situation, the joint industry statement makes these five suggestions:

1. Make sure your car is properly serviced to use gasoline efficiently.
2. Do only essential driving.
3. Favor gasoline by driving slowly.
4. Buy only gasoline authorized by government coupons.
5. Give away no coupons so that motorists can do unessential driving.

**HOW TO CHANGE A BLOWN OUT FUSE**

"LIKE CHANGING A LAMP BULB"



A blownout fuse is nothing mysterious. Fuses are safety valves of your electrical system. When a cord becomes worn or an appliance develops a defect, the fuse "blows" to prevent more serious trouble. Too many lamps or appliances on one circuit may also cause a blown fuse.

Replacing a fuse plug (the common type) is as easy as screwing in a light bulb. Make the replacement yourself—save yourself inconvenience and get your lights back on quicker.

The first thing to do is to disconnect the lamp or appliance that caused the fuse to blow. Then, take a new fuse of the right size, go to the fuse box and carefully follow the three steps outlined below.



- STEP ONE**—Locate the main cut-off switch near your meter box, and standing on a dry surface, turn off the electricity.
- STEP TWO**—Unscrew the "blown out" fuse, touching only its top. You can tell it by the burned patch in the window on top of the fuse.
- STEP THREE**—Replace burned fuse with new fuse of proper size. Then turn on main electric switch.

**How to conserve eyesight and light!**



Eyesight and light are both vital to the winning of the war. Conserve both by following these six easy suggestions:

1. Clean lamp bulbs and reflectors regularly with a damp cloth. Dry thoroughly before using.
2. Use shades with white linings to reflect light instead of absorbing it.
3. Keep all lights properly shaded to avoid glare.
4. Arrange furniture so one lamp serves two or more people if necessary.
5. Always turn off lights in unoccupied rooms.
6. Have eyes examined regularly by a competent eyesight specialist.

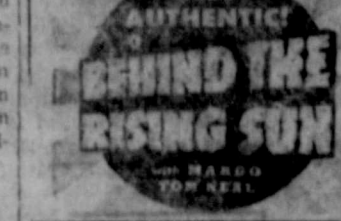
