Pork Points Cut To Stabilize Market, Says OPA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—The Office of Price Administration Wednesday night announced a temporary two-point reduction in the ration value of all cuts of pork after the Food Administration had announced a new program intended to stabilize the price of live hogs.

The cut, which also applies to 100 per cent pork sausage is effective Friday, and will be continued for a limited period only, OPA Administrator Chester Bowles said.

The move is intended to prevent a jam of storage facilities resulting from the heavy run of hogs to market in recent weeks which is expected to continue next month.

WFA Administrator Marlin Jones said the price stabilization program, effective Nov. 29, will apply at all major markets, assuring producers a price \$1 a hundredweight below OPA ceilings. Every power of the government will be used to prevent a threatened price collapse and glutting of markets, he said.

The support price of good to choice hogs weighing 200 to 275 pounds will be \$13.75 a 100 at Chicago, \$1 below the current OPA ceiling. The price at other markets will be somewhat lower, but are intended to reflect the customary differential between those markets and Chicago.

Bowles emphasized the reduction in point values is only a temporary expedient and should not be interpreted as meaning a sudden improvement in the overall rationed meat picture.

The revision, he said, will also serve to take the premium off black market operations.

The point reductions will mean that a number of items, including fat backs, hocks and bacon ends, may be purchased ration free. The point value on center chops was cut from ten to eight points while rined bacon was cut from six to four.

Jones said the Reconstruction Finance Corporation has been asked to withhold slaughter subsidy payments of \$1.30 a hundred pounds from any packing house paying farmers less than the support price.

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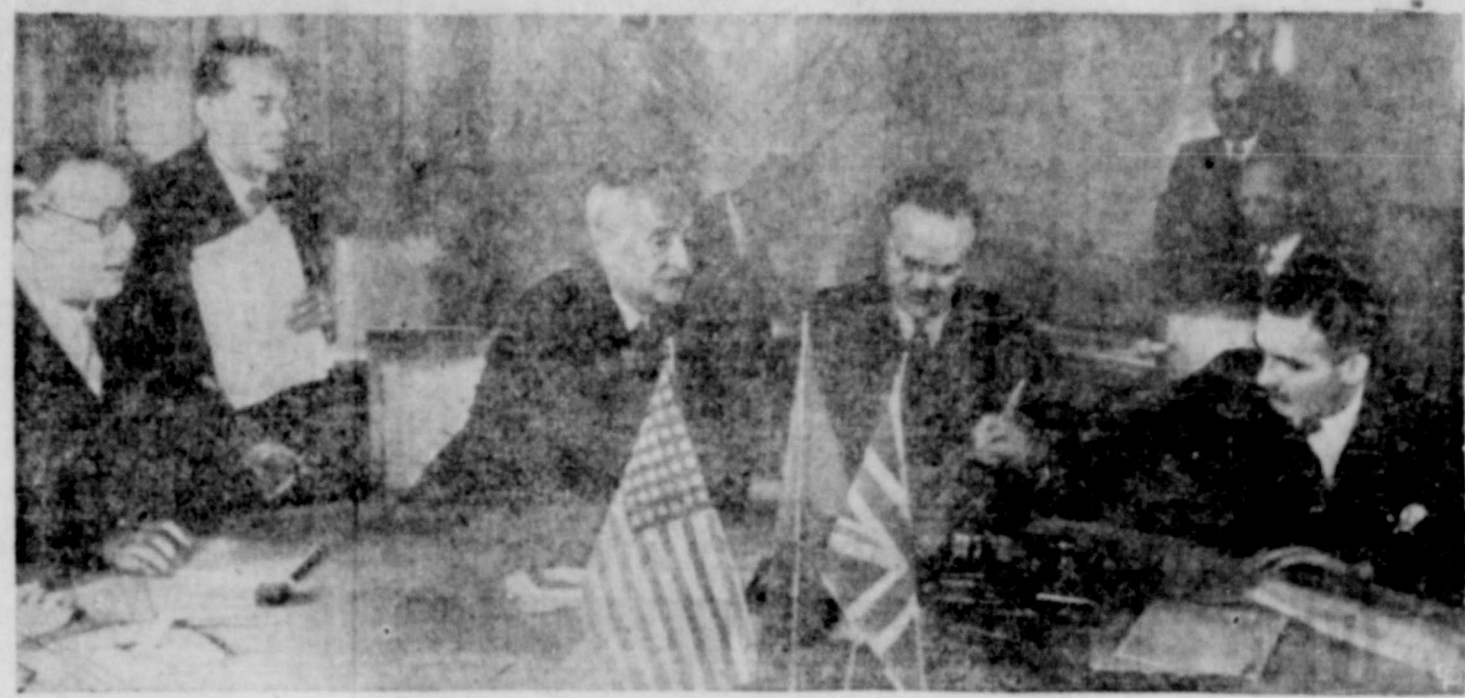
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As Historic Four-Power Pact Was Signed in Russian Capital

Public Urged To Attend Memorial Services Sunday

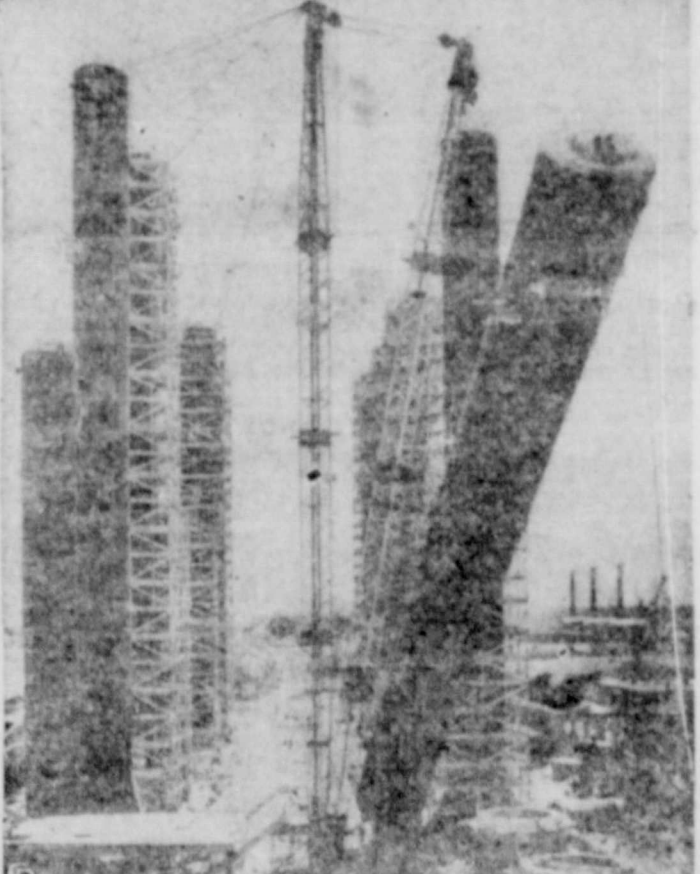

Famous Writer Of Songs Scores Hit With Queen

LONDON, Nov. 17 (UP)—Irving Berlin's latest song hit, "My British Buddy," brought tears to the eyes of Queen Elizabeth Wednesday when she attended a matinee of the United States Army musical revue, This Is the Army.

"I have never seen anything like this before. Your song brought tears to my eyes," she told Berlin when she and King George went backstage after the performance to meet the American song writer who rose to fame from a singing waiter.

As a further tribute to Berlin, the King and Queen and the Princess Elizabeth and Margaret joined the audience in singing the composer's first real success, Alexander's Ragtime Band. Berlin recalled later that it was the tune Londoners were singing when he first visited the British capital in 1911. He added that he wrote "My British Buddy," which has taken London by storm, in just a few minutes and that he got the inspiration while he was in the bath tub. The song was not in the show during its American engagements.

TEN THOUSAND DRESSINGS ARE MADE 4 DAYS

It is believed that the surgical dressings workers for the Ranger Red Cross unit have broken all records for speed in completion of quotas, having finished 10,000 dressings in four days.

About a week ago chairmen for the work appealed for workers to assist in turning out a part of the December quota in five specified days. A total of 53 workers, working Tuesday and Wednesday of last week completed 5,631 dressings and in two days this week the quota of 10,000 has been completed. On Tuesday there was a total of 27 women who worked at the room and turned out 2,931 dressings and on Wednesday 30 women made 2,969 dressings which made the quota.

This response from the women of Ranger is typical and chairmen of the surgical dressings work, today, extended their appreciation to all who assisted in turning out the work in record time.

HULL REPORTS AS CONGRESS MEETS HIM WITH OVATION

WASHINGTON, (Nov. 18 (UP))—Secretary of State Cordell Hull told an historic meeting of Congress today that the Moscow declaration will "assure Allied victory and help to create a post-war world free of the conflict-breeding power politics of the past."

The 72-year-old Hull, making the first recorded appearance of a Cabinet member before a joint meeting of Senate and House, asserted:

"As the provisions of the four-nation declaration are carried into effect, there will no longer be need for spheres of influence, for alliances for balance of power or any other of the special arrangements through which, in the unhappy past, many nations strove to safeguard their security and to promote their interests."

As Hull entered the jammed House Chamber, Senators and representatives rose cheering and applauding. The ovation, as lusty as any ever given a returned hero, lasted two full minutes and would have continued longer had not speaker Sam Rayburn cut it short with his gavel.

Hull's statement appeared to be the administration's answer to proposals which have been voiced in this country that the United States and Great Britain enter into a military alliance as the key-note of future security.

Appearing by invitation at the crowded meeting, Hull outlined the background, purposes, and problems of the conference at which the United States, Russia, Britain and China agreed upon the necessity for a permanent, international organization to maintain peace.

Hull asserted that basic policy of international cooperation for peace and security must be carried forward "in the principles and spirit of the Atlantic Charter and the Declaration by United Nations."

Unless that is done, he said, the nations again will become "victims of the destructive forces of international anarchy which in the absence of organized international relations will rule the world."

Ranger Man Is Graduated From Naval School

DALLAS, Tex. Nov. 18—The Navy Department today announced the names of twenty-three Texan who have just completed their instruction at the Naval Air Technical Training Center at Norman, Okla. They received training as aviation machinist's mates or aviation ordnance men.

Graduates have been ordered to duty either at sea or to another shore station for further training and work, the Navy said.

The list included: William Lee Thomas, Route 3, Ranger, who was rated Seaman First Class; Seaman Thomas is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Williams R. Thomas of Greerton.

Mother of 5 In Service Takes School Course

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UP)—A Milwaukee mother is taking an occupational therapy course at the Milwaukee Downey girls school while her five off-springs may help the United Nation on scattered war fronts.

Mrs. Melvin Wilcox, a junior student at the exclusive girls' school aspires to get a well rounded education which will enable her to take in postwar rehabilitation measures.

Among her five sons in uniform are 29-year-old twins, Capt. John and Lt. Leland. The others are Capt. Melvin, Jr., 31, flight sergeant in C-47; Lt. David, 30, in the South Pacific; and Lt. Allan, 25, year-old "big" of the group, flying bombers for the Navy.

Rabbit Does Are Doing Job In U. S. War Effort

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The lovely back-yard bunny is doing her part for the war effort—and more too—although she may never get a service medal.

Not only is she providing food for millions, but her pelt is used for furs and felts. Rabbit blood is employed in making serum for 23 types of pneumonia. Skins are used for glue. And, of course, the rabbit's foot is in demand—as a good luck charm.

Three months from mating young rabbits are ready for the table. And the average meat-producing doe is bred for four litters a year, according to George S. Templeton, director of the United States Rabbit Experiment Station at Fontana, Cal.

The litters number from four to eight young and on a few occasions a doe has been known to produce as many as 15.

Translated in terms of meat—a 10-pound doe will produce 50 pounds of meat annually. Some does at the experimental station have produced as much as 180 pounds of meat yearly.

And in Los Angeles, the rabbit capital of America, this is good news. Angelenos consume 10,000 trays weekly and last year 7,000,000 pounds of rabbit were consumed in the city.

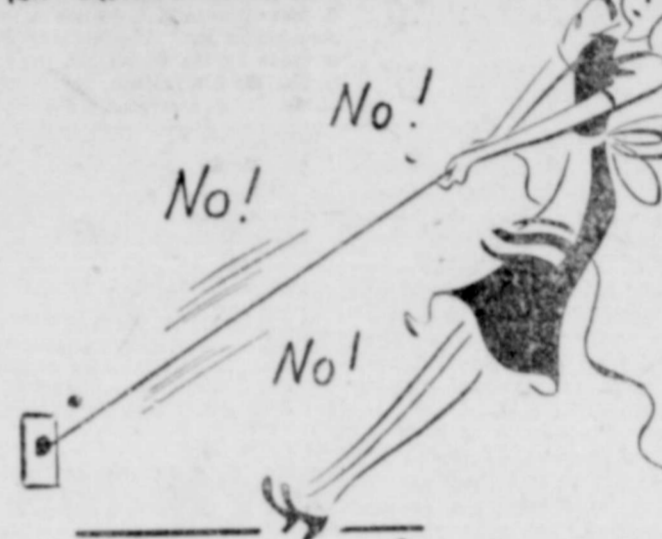

HELPFUL HOUSEHOLD HINTS



WAR demand for rubber and copper means your electric cords must last for a long time. So give them proper care. Don't play "tug of war" like the young lady above. Take a firm grasp on the plug itself and pull it out quickly.

How to INCREASE the LIFE of Your ELECTRIC CORDS



When you're finished with appliances with detachable cords—irons, toasters, etc.—pull out wall plug first, then appliance plug.



Coil cord loosely over hooks of vacuum cleaner. Be sure cord is free of knots or kinks. Avoid bends; they break insulation.



Don't run cords under rugs where they'll be walked on. Keep cords away from radiators and steam pipes. Don't wrap them around hot appliances.



Take care of little troubles before they become big. Repair frayed cords with friction tape. Bend prongs of loose-fitting plugs to make them fit securely.

How to conserve eyesight and light!



Eyesight and light are both vital to the war effort. Use them wisely by following these suggestions.

1. Clean lamp bulbs and bowls regularly with a damp cloth. Dry thoroughly before using.
2. Use shades with white linings that reflect light, not absorb it.
3. Keep all lights properly shaded to avoid harmful glare.
4. Arrange furniture so one lamp serves two or more people if necessary.
5. Always turn off lights in unoccupied rooms.

Cigaret Credited With Saving Life Of Yank Soldier

ABILENE, Tex. (UP)—Somewhere in Italy a cigarette may have been the difference between life and death to Lt. Charles E. Kemp of Abilene.

Kemp gave the cigarette to a German prisoner who returned the favor by treating Kemp's wound and helping him to get back to the American lines.

In a recent letter, Kemp said: "We found a German outpost of two men and took them prisoner. I sent one of the Germans back to the company and told my runner to bring up my men. I kept the other German to question."

"When no one showed up after waiting half an hour, I started back with my little German corporal in front of me. We had gone a short way when we were fired upon. Both of us hit the ground and I tried to find out where the shot came from.

"The next shot hit me so we divided for the other side of a nearby wall. That made me the prisoner since I no longer was armed and the German was unhurt. He must have been tired of the war, and he must have liked me for I had given him a cigarette.

"Anyway, he sprinkled my sulfa powder on my wound, fed me my pills, bandaged my arm, helped me back to my company and gave himself up."

Kemp was commissioned in February, 1942, at the infantry officer candidate school at Fort Benning, Ga., and sailed for Africa last June. His wife is the former Marie Helen Carroll of Abilene.

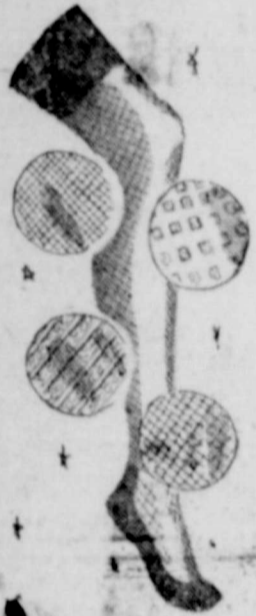

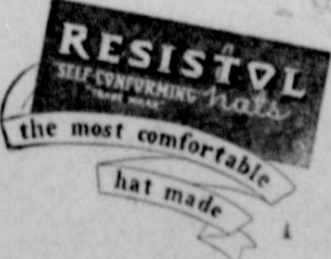
